#### INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

We have audited the accompanying basic financial statements of the governmental activities and the major fund, the major fund budget comparison and the aggregate remaining fund information of the State of New Mexico Department of Health (the Department) as of and for the year ended June 30, 2006, which comprise the Department's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. We also have audited the program budget comparison of the department presented as supplementary information as of and for the year ended June 30, 2006, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Department's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and the significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

As discussed in Note 1, the financial statements of the Department are intended to present the financial position and results of operations of only that portion of the financial reporting entity of the State of New Mexico that is attributable to the transactions of the Department.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Department as of June 30, 2006, and the respective changes in financial position thereof, and the budgetary comparison for the

major governmental fund for the year then ended, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. In addition, in our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective program budget comparisons of the Department as of June 30, 2006, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated December 13, 2006, on our consideration of the Department's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be read in conjunction with this report in considering the results of our audit.

The accompanying management's discussion and analysis is not a required part of the basic financial statements but is supplementary information required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming opinions on the basic financial statements and the budgetary comparisons of the Department. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*, and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Also, the schedules listed as other supplementary schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements of the Department. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

# Management's Discussion and Analysis For the Year Ended June 30, 2006

The following Management's Discussion and Analysis, or MD&A, for the State of New Mexico, Department of Health (the Department) introduces the basic financial statements and provides an analytical overview of the Department's financial condition and results of operations as of and for the year ended June 30, 2006. Additionally, the MD&A provides a discussion of significant changes in the account categories presented in the entity-wide Statement of Net Assets and Statement of Activities. This summary should not be taken as a replacement for the basic financial statements.

The MD&A is an element of the new reporting model adopted by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) in GASB Statement No. 34, Basic Financial Statements - and Management's Discussion and Analysis - for State and Local Governments, issued June 1999; GASB Statement No. 37, Basic Financial Statements - and Management's Discussion and Analysis - for State and Local Governments: Omnibus, an amendment to GASB Statements No. 21 and No. 34 issued in June 2001; and GASB Statement No. 38, Certain Financial Statement Note Disclosures issued in 2001.

#### OVERVIEW OF THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Although the Department is one of several agencies within the government of the State of New Mexico, the focus of this financial report is only on the Department and not the State of New Mexico taken as a whole. The financial statements include the following three elements: (1) Management's Discussion and Analysis, (2) the Basic Financial Statements, and (3) Other Supplementary Information. The basic financial statements include two kinds of statements that present different views of the Department:

- The first two statements are entity-wide financial statements that report information about the Department's overall financial condition and results of operations, both long-term and short-term, using accounting methods similar to those used by private-sector companies. The Statement of Net Assets includes all of the Department's assets, liabilities, and net assets. All revenues and expenses are accounted for in the Statement of Activities regardless of when cash is received or disbursed. The remaining statements are fund financial statements.
- Governmental funds statements, including the Balance Sheet and the Statement of Revenues, Expenditures, and Change in Fund Balance, focus on individual parts of the Department, reporting the Department's financial condition and results of operations in more detail than in the entity-wide statements, and tell how general government services were financed in the short term as well as what remains for future spending. Emphasis is on the general and major funds. Other governmental funds are summarized in a single column.
- Statement of Revenues and Expenditures Budget and Actual Modified Accrual (GAAP Budgetary Basis) reports the original approved budget, final approved budget, and actual results presented on the modified accrual budgetary basis of reporting for the general fund and all major funds. A separate column is presented to report any variances between the final budget and actual amounts.
- Statement of Fiduciary Net Assets provides information about the financial relationships in which the Department acts solely as a trustee or agent for the benefit of others, to whom the resources in question belong.
- Additional details about the basic financial statements are found in the Notes to the Financial Statements, Required Supplementary Information and the Other Supplementary Information sections.

- Current Assets decreased by \$11,924,477 or 15.57 percent. Cash declined due to multi-year appropriations for FY 06 as a result of Laws of 2006 appropriations being \$8.3 million less than FY 05. We also realized more timely billing by Human Services Department for our Developmentally Disabled Medicaid waiver payables which were paid earlier. Beginning with fiscal year 2005, the General Appropriation Act established the modified accrual basis of accounting for governmental funds as the budgetary basis of accounting. Because of a change in accounting policy DOH requested vendors to submit invoices for goods and services for payment before July 30<sup>th</sup> of each year. This resulted directly in \$20 million less in cash and an off-set of \$20 million reduction in Accounts Payable. Our accounts receivable (and due from other organizations) saw an increase of \$14 Million from the prior year or 29.79%. There was a \$9 million increase in funds due from federal grants and \$5 million is an increase due from patient receivables. Future periods should reflect a normal level of activity once the full effect in the change of our accounting basis is completed. Similar improvements were also realized in the following categories:
  - o Current Liabilities,
  - Total Liabilities,
  - o Restricted Net Assets,
  - o Total Net Assets, and
  - Increase In Net Assets.
- Capital Assets and Investment In Capital Assets decreased by \$2,901,541 or 10.26 percent due to \$4,694,955 in depreciation expenses that were off-set by \$1,927,564 in additional capitalized assets.
- Total Assets decreased by \$14,826,018 or 14.19 percent due to two major items of: \$2,901,541 decrease in capital assets. Along with a reduction in multi-year appropriations in FY 06 of

\$8,300,000 that were not carried over into FY 07 as restricted cash. See discussion under Current Assets above.

- Current Liabilities decreased by \$19,778,149 or 26.62 percent due to a reduction of our Accounts Payables from the prior year as explained before. See discussion under Current Assets above.
- Long-Term Liabilities increased by \$51,314. The increase represents the estimated long-term portion of our compensated absences as calculated based upon usage in prior years of our estimated liabilities.
- Total Liabilities decreased by \$19,726,835 or 26.55 percent. See discussion under Current Liabilities above.
- The Department's Restricted Net Assets declined by \$11,204,962 or 28.85% from \$38,838,893 in June 30, 2005. This decline is related to the reduction of Capital Assets by \$3 million and \$8.3 million in multi-year appropriations decline at year-end in restricted cash. See discussion under Current and Capital Assets above.
- Unrestricted Net Assets increased by \$16,105,779 or 185.41 percent this increase is related directly to the reduction of restricted Net Assets and the change in fund balance by \$9 million that was the direct result of the Department Income being larger than Expenses in fiscal year ending June 30, 2006.
- Total Net Assets increased by \$4,900,817 or 16.25 percent. See discussions under Current Assets, Restricted Net Assets and Unrestricted Net Assets above.
- Program Revenues increased by \$35,357,404 or 16.46 percent which reflect \$16 million in increased funding awarded by the federal government primarily in the area of immunization and vaccines. Another \$21 million increase in patient service charges from increased patient loads and higher rate charges. There was \$13.3 million dollars and \$2.9 million that was recovered from recoveries through Maximus. These were off-set by a reduction of \$2 million in Fees, penalties, rentals and other revenue sources. These revenue sources are expected to continue into the future.
- Program Expenses increased by \$35,304,777 or 7.25 percent, attributable to increased provision of services to the people of New Mexico. The increased cost of these services breakdown as follows: Personal Services & Benefits increased by \$6.6 million dollars of which \$4.6 million or 2.5 % was from average annual raises of 2.5% and \$2 million was from an increase in the cost of benefits related to state government picking up a larger portion of employee health insurance and other benefits. The Department saw an increase of \$6.5 million dollars related to additional contract and service costs with General Services Department (\$2 million) \$3 million for Developmentally Disabled and \$1.5 million for Bio-Terrorism services. Other increased expenses include \$18 million for immunization and vaccines, \$3 million for Public Health Division in Aids treatment and prevention and Women, Infant and Children expenses and \$1.5 million for prior year expenses that were billed by and paid to the General Services Department.

- The excess of Program Expenses over Total Revenues of \$14,776,453 or 41.85% is explained in the Program Revenues and Program Expenses comments above.
- General Fund Appropriations increased by \$15,709,568 or 6.11 percent over the prior year's appropriations. The increases were related to \$5 million in contingency funding for Developmentally Disabled Medicaid waivers program; \$6 million for Developmentally Disabled services over the prior year. \$1.3 million for raises. \$2 million to cover additional Health Care costs; another \$1 million was appropriated for the Family, Infant and Toddlers program; and \$2 million in School Based Health Care.
- Special appropriations totaling \$11,569,216 were fairly flat from fiscal year 2005 with a small decline of \$976,345.
- Other Sources, including Transfers In decreased by \$2,039,554 or 7.28 percent as the result of Federal Tax Relief funds and Special Appropriations not received in the current year.
- Total Reversions to State General Fund, related to current and prior special appropriations, of \$1,729,717 was recorded. See discussion under Current Liabilities above.
- Change in Net Assets increased by \$13,178,213 or 159.21 percent due, in part, to an additional \$5 million for Developmental Disabled, \$3.3 million for additional appropriations for Personnel Services and Benefits, along with additional revenue due to higher patient billings and an increase in clients. See discussion under Current Assets above.

#### GENERAL BUDGETARY HIGHLIGHTS

Original budgeted revenues and expenditures for Federal and Other State Funds were increased by \$24,076,234 during the year ended June 30, 2006, from \$503,733,000 to \$527,809,234 primarily because of revenue increases in federal funding of \$16 million, \$5 million in contingency for Developmentally Disabled in the State General Fund, rebasing and additional patient billings for \$13.3 million. Along with an increase in budgeted expenses in Personnel and Other Benefits of

\$3.3 million Contract Services of \$6.5 million. Additionally the department received \$3,081,427 in revenue from severance tax bonds and tobacco settlement funds for infrastructure improvements.

The five percent increase limitation placed on other state funds as set forth in the Laws of 2005, Chapter 33, Section 10 was met with an overall increase of \$939,900 or less than one percent due to increased revenues from private insurances.

#### PERFORMANCE MEASURES

The Department collects data to measure success in meeting performance measure targets to address the requirements for the Accountability in Government Act (AGA), Sections 6-3A-1 through 6-3A-8 NMSA 1978. Performance measures outlined in the General Appropriation's Act, Laws of 2005, Chapter 33, Section 4 for the year ended June 30, 2006 were:

#### CAPITAL ASSETS AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION

Total capital assets, net of depreciation, for the Department make up 28.3 percent of the Department's total assets. The Department has no infrastructure assets.

Total compensated absences at June 30, 2006 are \$7,356,618. The estimated amount to be paid from General Fund appropriations within one year is \$7,305,304 or 99.3 percent, with \$51,314 or 0.7 percent expected to be paid after one year. There was no significant activity to report for compensated absences during the year ended June 30, 2006.

#### **NEXT YEAR'S BUDGET AND RATES**

The Department depends primarily on appropriations from the New Mexico State General Fund. The State Legislature appropriated \$295,334,500 for the fiscal year 2007 operating budget in the Laws of 2006, Chapter 109, Section 4 comprised of \$288,048,500 for operations, \$3,552,700 for

compensation packages, and a total of \$2,405,000 non-recurring appropriation in the Laws of 2006, Chapter 109, Section 5. Additionally, Laws 2006, Chapter 110, Section 23 appropriated \$4,881,000 for recurring expansion items with the most significant being: \$1,000,000 to create the Trauma Fund; \$659,000 for the STOP program at NMBHI; \$500,000 for School Based Health Centers; and \$500,000 for childhood immunizations.

The Department requested \$300,155,500 in general fund operating budget for fiscal year 2008 - an increase of \$17,640,900 or 6.2 percent over fiscal year 2007 – to offset the cost of a salary increase (\$2,935,600); \$7,850,000 for base increases (\$5,800,000 for the Developmentally Disabled program); \$9,860,000 for base program expansion (\$3,500,000 to reduce the Developmentally Disabled program waiting list); \$7,650,000 for new program initiatives (\$1,400,000 for immunizations; \$1,750,000 for Autism training and multi-disciplinary evaluations; \$1,250,000 for the Family, Infant & Toddlers program). Additionally, the Department requested \$4,300,000 in special appropriations (\$1,000,000 for Obesity, and \$2,800,000 for Anti-Viral); and \$15,150,000 in supplemental appropriation requests for fiscal year 2007 (\$14,400,000 for the Developmental Disabilities program, and \$750,000 ResCare).

#### **CURRENTLY KNOW FACTS, DECISION OR CONDITIONS**

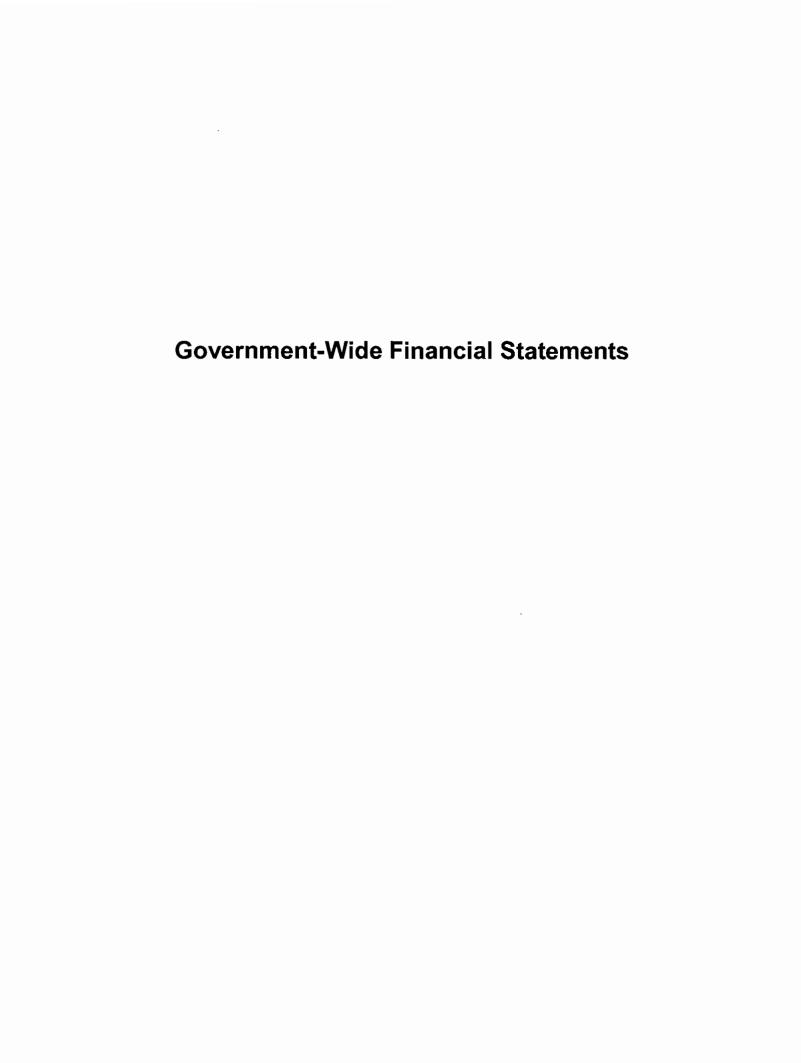
The State as whole implemented the SHARE accounting system on July 1, 2006. This implementation required the Department to develop a new reporting structure, and new procedures for processing transactions through the State's control agencies. This implementation included the implementation of a Federal Grants Module; however, training for the module implementation has not yet been completed, and is scheduled to be completed in January 2007. As a result the Department had to request extensions to normal reporting deadlines

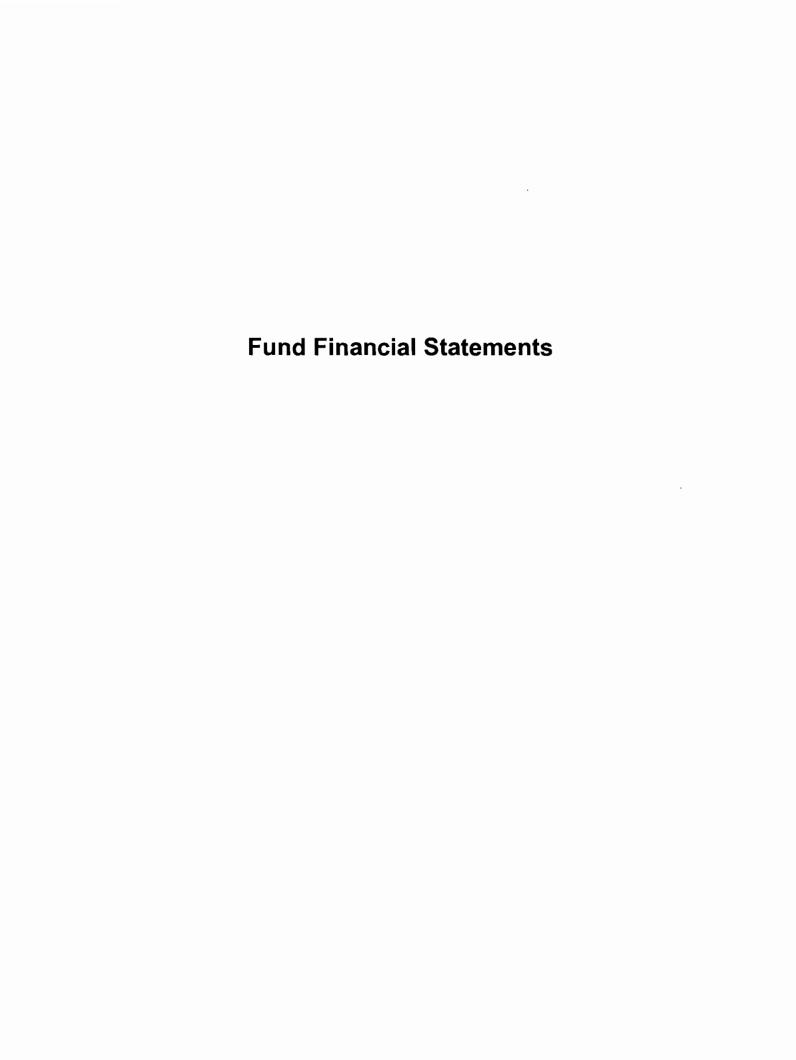

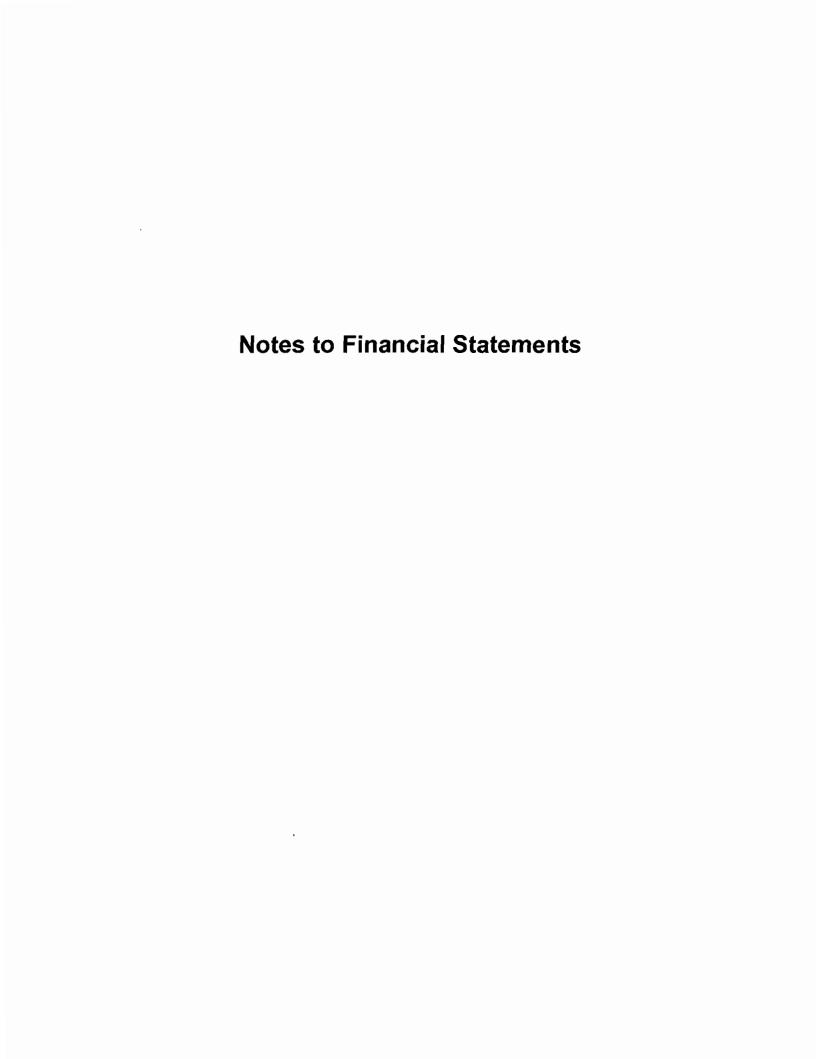

#### Note 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements of the State of New Mexico Department of Health (Department) have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) as applied to governmental units as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB), which is the accepted standard setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting standards.

The GASB has issued Statement 34 Basic Financial Statements - and Management's Discussion and Analysis - for State and Local Governments, Statement 37, Basic Financial Statements - Management's Discussion and Analysis - for State and Local Governments, and Statement 38 Certain Financial Statement Note Disclosures. These standards establish new financial reporting requirements for state and local governments throughout the United States of America. The statements require new information and restructuring on much of the information presented in past audited financial statements.

The Department is responsible for the fair presentation of the accompanying financial statements in conformity with accounting principals generally accepted in the United States of America. The Department has implemented these standards beginning with the fiscal year ended June 30, 2002. With the implementation of GASB Statement 34, the Department has prepared required supplementary information titled Management's Discussion and Analysis, which precedes the basic financial statements. The more significant of the Department's accounting policies are described below:

#### A. Reporting Entity

The State of New Mexico Department of Health (Department) is a cabinet department of the executive branch of government created by state statute under Chapter 9, Article 7 NMSA 1978. The Department's administrative head is the Secretary who is appointed by the Governor with the consent of the Senate and serves in the Governor's executive cabinet.

The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) has set forth criteria to be used in determining financial accountability. These criteria include the State of New Mexico's ability to appoint a voting majority of an organization's governing body and either the ability of the State to impose its will on that organization, or the potential for the organization to provide specific financial benefits to, or impose specific financial burdens on, the State.

The Department is part of the primary government of the State, and its financial data should be included with the financial data of the State. However, the State does not at present issue an audited Comprehensive Annual Financial Report inclusive of the various state departments, agencies, institutions and organizational units which are controlled by or dependent upon the New Mexico legislature or its constitutional officers that make up the State's legal entity.

Chapter 12, Article 6 1978 NMSA, requires the financial affairs of every agency to be thoroughly examined and audited each year and a complete written report to be made.

For financial reporting purposes the Department has been defined as an integral part of the State's Executive Branch, and the accompanying financial statements include all funds over which the Secretary has the following oversight responsibilities:

Included with the Department's General Fund and meeting all five of the oversight responsibilities listed above are the Department's administrative offices and operating divisions.

The Programs are subdivided into bureaus for management control purposes but for financial reporting and budgetary accounting purposes are subdivided into "Activities".

Services provided by the seven medical and long-term care facilities are:

Behavioral Health Institute – Las Vegas - Inpatient treatment for mentally ill and substance abuse patients as well as long term nursing home care for the geriatric and chronically ill.

Fort Bayard Medical Center - Nursing care for geriatric, chronically ill and patients in need of intensive treatment for chemical dependency. Management for the Fort Bayard Medical Center was contracted to Geo Care, Inc. in FY 2006.

Los Lunas Community Programs - Treatment and training for the developmentally disabled in a community setting.

New Mexico State Veterans Home - State home for veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States.

New Mexico Rehabilitation Center – Providing vocational training and rehabilitation therapy to physically handicapped persons.

Sequoyah Adolescent Treatment Center - Inpatient rehabilitation treatment for adolescents who have committed statutory offenses.

Turquoise Lodge - Inpatient treatment center for substance abuse patients.

In May 2002, Governmental Accounting Standards Board issued Statement No 39. The statement established standards for identifying a component unit through evaluation of the reporting entity and significance of certain related party transactions, defined as potential component units. Depending on the results of the GASB 39 evaluation, financial information of related parties determined to be component units could be required to be included in the financial statements of the reporting entity.

In evaluating how to define the Department for financial reporting purposes, management has evaluated the Department's potential component units. The basic, but not the only, criterion for including a potential component unit as part of the reporting entity is the governing body's ability to exercise oversight responsibility. The most significant aspects of this responsibility are the selection of governing authority, the designation of management, the ability to significantly influence operations, and the accountability for fiscal matters. A second criterion used in evaluating potential component units is the scope of public service. Application of the criterion involves considering whether the activity benefits the Department. A third criterion used to evaluate potential component units for inclusion or exclusion from the reporting entity is the existence of special financing relationships, regardless of whether the Department is able to exercise oversight responsibilities. In the financial statements, discrete presentation entails reporting component unit financial data in a column separate from the financial data of the Department. Based on the application of these criteria, there are no component units included in these financial statements.

#### B. Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Basis of Presentation

The financial statements of the State of New Mexico Department of Health (Department) conform to generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB).

The basic financial statements include both government-wide (based on the Department as a whole) and fund financial statements. While the previous model emphasized fund types (the total of all funds of a particular type), in the new model focus is on either the Department as a whole or major individual funds (within the fund financial statements). Both the government-wide and fund financial statements (within the basic financial statements) categorized primary activities as either governmental or business type. The Department is a single purpose government entity and has no business type activities. In the government-wide Statement of Net Assets, the governmental activities are presented on a consolidated basis and are presented using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting, which incorporates long term assets and receivable as well as long-term debt and obligations.

The Department's governmental activities follow FASB Statements and interpretations issued on or before November 30, 1989, Accounting Principles Board Opinions, and Accounting Research Bulletins, unless those pronouncements conflict with GASB pronouncements. The Department has elected not to follow FASB Statements and interpretations issued after November 30, 1989.

The government-wide Statement of Activities reflects both the gross and net cost per functional category, which are otherwise being supported by general government revenues. The Statement of Activities reduces gross expenses (including depreciation expense on capital assets) by related program revenues, operating and capital grants. The program revenues must be directly associated with the function. All internal activity has been removed from the financial statements.

The net cost by function is normally covered by general revenue. The Department utilizes nine programs and does employ indirect and direct cost allocation as applicable in the financial statements.

The government-wide focus is more on the sustainability of the Department as an entity and the change in aggregate financial position resulting from the activities of the fiscal period.

Emphasis is on the major funds of the governmental category. Non-major funds are summarized into a single column. The Department's only governmental fund is its General Fund which is considered a major fund.

The governmental fund in the fund financial statements is presented on a current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. This is the manner in which these funds are normally budgeted. This presentation is deemed more appropriate to demonstrate legal and covenant compliance, to demonstrate the source and use of liquid resources and to demonstrate how the Department's actual experience conforms to the budget or fiscal plan. Since the governmental fund statements are presented on a different

measurement focus and basis of accounting than the government-wide statements governmental column, a reconciliation is presented on Exhibit 4 and Exhibit 6, which briefly explains the adjustment necessary to transform the fund based financial statements into the governmental column of the government-wide presentation.

The Department's General Fund is a reverting fund.

The focus of the revised model is on the Department as a whole and the fund financial statements, including the major individual fund of the governmental category.

The financial transactions of the Department are recorded in the General fund, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of the fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund balance, revenues, expenditures or expenses and other financing sources or uses. Government resources are allocated to, and accounted for, in the fund based upon the purpose for which they are to be spent and the means by which the spending activities are controlled.

The following fund types are used by the Department:

#### GOVERNMENTAL FUND TYPES:

All governmental fund types are accounted for on a spending or financial flow measurement focus. Only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on their balance sheets. Their reported fund balance (net current assets) is considered a measure of available spendable resources. Governmental fund operating statements present increases (revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (expenditures and other financing uses) in net current assets.

Accordingly, they are said to present a summary of sources and uses of available spendable resources during a period. Due to their spending measurement focus, expenditure recognition for governmental fund types is limited to exclude amounts represented by noncurrent liabilities. Since they do not affect net current assets, such long-term amounts are not recognized as governmental fund type expenditures or fund liabilities. The following is a description of the Governmental Funds of the Office:

#### General Fund

The General Fund is the general operating fund of the Department. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund. The General Fund is funded from appropriations from the State of New Mexico General Fund, special appropriations and Federal grants.

#### Special Revenue Fund

Special revenue funds are used to account for revenue sources that are legally restricted to expenditures for specific purposes. The Department currently has no special revenue funds.

#### Agency Fund

The Department also has Agency Funds which are trust accounts that are held for clients. They are not available for use by the Department but are held for clients. They use the full accrual basis of accounting.

#### C. Measurement Focus and Classification of Funds

Individual funds have been established as stipulated by legal provisions or by administrative direction. The funds presented are classified as follows:

Governmental Fund accounts for the acquisition, use and balances of expendable financial resources and the related current liabilities. Governmental fund types use the flow of current financial resources measurement focus. Included in this classification is the General Fund, which is the Department's operating fund that accounts for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

<u>Fiduciary Funds</u> account for assets held by the state in a trustee capacity or as an agent for individuals, other governmental units or other funds. Included in this fund category are the Department's expendable trust and agency fund types. Expendable trust funds are classified for accounting purposes in essentially the same manner as agency fund types, using the same measurement focus and basis of accounting. Agency funds are custodial in nature; thus, they do not measure results of operations. The expendable trust fund is comprised of the five long-term care facilities trust funds from which the patients buy personal items. The primary funding sources are canteen sales and contributions. The agency fund is composed of the five long term care facilities trust funds for their patients' checking, savings and burial accounts. These funds are not incorporated into the government-wide financial statements. Fiduciary funds use the accrual basis of accounting.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the Department's policy to use restricted resources first, and then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

#### Non-Current Governmental Assets/Liabilities

GASB Statement 34 eliminates the presentation of Account Groups but provides for these records to be maintained and incorporates the information into the government-wide Statement of Net Assets.

#### D. Basis of Accounting

Basis of accounting refers to the point at which revenues or expenditures are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. It relates to the timing of the measurements made, regardless of the measurement focus applied.

The government-wide financial statements are presented using the "economic resources" measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Under the accrual method of accounting, revenues are recognized when earned and expenditures are recognized when the liability is incurred or economic asset used. Revenues, expenses, gains, losses, assets and

liabilities resulting from exchange-like transactions are recognized when the exchange takes place. Revenues, expenses, gains, losses, assets and liabilities resulting from non-exchange transactions are recognized in accordance with the requirements of GASB 33. The governmental funds in the fund financial statements utilize the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under this method, revenues and other governmental fund financial resource increments are recognized in the accounting period in which they become susceptible to accrual — that is, when they become both measurable and available to finance expenditures of the current fiscal period; available meaning collectible within sixty (60) days or soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current period.

Contributions and other monies held by other state and local agencies are recorded as a receivable at the time the money is made available to the specific fund. All other revenues are recognized when they are received and are not susceptible to accrual.

Expenditures are recorded as liabilities when incurred. An exception to this general rule is that accumulated unpaid annual, compensatory and certain sick leave are not accrued as current liabilities but as non-current liabilities. Expenditures charged to federal programs are recorded utilizing the cost principles described by the various funding sources. When an expenditure is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net assets are available, the Office first uses restricted resources and then unrestricted resources.

When all applicable requirements are met, revenue is recognized when money is disbursed.

#### E. Reservations and Designations

The accounting for the actual revenue and expenditures for budgetary purposes beginning July 1, 2004 were changed to the modified accrual method of accounting from the budgetary non-accrual basis of accounting. In conjunction with this change in the basis of accounting, encumbrances are no longer reflected in the expenditures of the Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balance — Budget and Actual, beginning July 1, 2004.

Reservations of fund balance are created to either (1) satisfy legal covenants that require that a portion of the fund balance be segregated or (2) identify the portion of the fund balance that is not appropriated for future expenditures. Under the guidance provided by Office of the State Auditor – Audit Rule - 2.2.2.12 A (5) (a), (b) NMAC 2005, encumbrances are to be reflected as a reservation of fund balance but are not to be reflected as restricted in the governmental wide financial statements. Specific reservations of fund balance accounts are summarized below:

Reserved for special monies-These reserves were created to restrict the use of all resources contributed to or earned by these funds through laws created by the State legislature.

Reserved for inventories and prepaid expense-This reserve was created to represent the portion of fund balance that is not available for expenditures because the Department expects to use the resources within the next budgetary period.

#### F. Assets, Liabilities and Equity

#### 1. Cash

The Department maintains cash accounts with the Office of the State Treasurer and at various commercial institutions statewide. Amounts on deposit with the commercial institutions are fully insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$100,000. Amounts over \$100,000 must be secured in accordance with 6-10-17, NMSA 1978.

The Department is required by statute to deposit any money received into the State Treasury. Balances maintained at the end of each day are pooled and invested by the State Treasurer in repurchase agreements. The State Treasurer issues separate financial statements, which disclose the collateral pledged to secure these deposits, categories of risk involved and the market value of purchased investments, which may differ from the cash deposited by the Department (refer to Schedule 3 – Pledged Collateral and Schedule 2 – Schedule of Cash Accounts.) All pledged securities for the Department are held in the name of the New Mexico State Treasurer by the Federal Home Loan Bank of Dallas, Texas an independent custodian. Custodial credit risk is the risk that, in the event of failure of the counterparty, the Department will not be able to recover the value of its cash that is in the possession of an outside party. The Department's cash balances are not exposed to custodial credit risk. All are fully collateralized and the collateral is held in the Department's name.

#### 2. Inventory and Prepaid Items

Inventory is valued at cost using the first-in, first-out method. Inventory consists of expendable supplies held for consumption and pharmaceuticals held for patient use at the medical and long-term facilities.

The costs are recorded as expenditures when consumed rather than when purchased. Reported inventory of the General Fund is equally offset by fund balance reserve, which indicates that it does not constitute "available spendable resources" even though they are a component of current assets.

Certain payments to vendors reflect costs applicable to future accounting periods and are recorded as prepaid items.

#### 3. Capital Assets

Property, buildings and equipment purchased or acquired at a value of \$1,000 or greater prior to July 1, 2005 are capitalized. Capital Assets acquired after June 30, 2005 are only capitalized if they acquisition amount was \$5,000 or more. Assets are carried at historical cost or estimated historical cost. Contributed assets are recorded at fair market value as of the date received. Additions, improvements and other capital outlays that significantly extend the useful live of an asset are capitalized. Other costs incurred for repairs and maintenance are expensed when incurred. Depreciation on all assets including software is provided on the straight-line basis over the following estimated useful lives with no salvage value:

Effective July 1, 2005 a change in policy implemented by the State of New Mexico concerning Capital Assets occurred. The State changed the value for which an asset maybe capitalized from \$1,000 to \$5,000. The Department of Health concurred with this policy change and is currently only capitalizing those items acquired after June 30, 2005 costing \$5,000 or more. Those assets acquired and capitalized prior to July 1, 2005, are still being depreciated under the previous policy.

In addition to the assets owned by the Department, it utilizes buildings, furniture and equipment that are owned by the Property Control Division of the State of New Mexico General Services Department. These assets and the related depreciation expense are not included in the accompanying financial statements. GASB 34 requires the recording and depreciation of infrastructure assets, such as roads, bridges, etc. The Department does not own any infrastructure assets. There is no debt related to the Department's capital assets.

#### 4. Compensated Absences

Vacation, compensatory and sick time is reported as a liability in the government-wide financial statements, with expenses being reported during the period that leave is accrued. It is the policy of the Department to permit employees to accumulate earned but unused vacation and sick pay benefits The fund financial statements reports expenditures during the period that employees are actually paid, or when compensated absences are liquidated with expendable financial resources from the operational portion of state general fund appropriations. These expenditures are paid from the Department's General Operating Fund 100 (CAS 061).

Qualified employees are entitled to accumulate vacation leave according to a graduated schedule of 80 to 160 hours per year, depending upon the length of service and the employee's hire date. A maximum of thirty working days (240 hours) of such accumulated annual leave may be carried forward into the beginning of the calendar year and any excess is lost.

When employees terminate, they are compensated for accumulated unpaid annual leave as of the date of termination, up to a maximum of thirty days.

Qualified employees are entitled to accumulate sick leave at the rate of one day for each calendar month of service. There is no limit to the amount of sick leave which an employee may accumulate. Once per fiscal year in either January or July, employees may elect to be paid for 50% of accrued sick leave in excess of 600, up to 720 hours, not to exceed 120 hours (net 60 hours can be paid). In the case of retired employees, up to one-half of 400 hours exceeding 600 can be paid. Sick leave balances related to general fund operations in excess of 600, but not more than 1000, hours have been recorded at 50% of the employee's hourly rate in the general fund.

Compensatory time may be granted by the Department to employees when overtime is needed. Employees not exempt from the FSLA may accrue up to 240 hours at the rate of one and one-half (1 ½) hours for each hour worked. The time will either be paid or taken as time off at the employee's election unless notified by the employer that it will only be taken as compensatory time off.

FSLA exempt employees may only accrue up to 80 hours a year at a rate of one times (1.0) the hours worked. The exception for this will be supervisory nurses who will accrue their hours at the rate of one and one-half the normal rate (1 ½). The Department of Health policy is to also permit the exempt employees to elect to be reimburse by cash or take time off unless notified by the employer that it will only be taken as compensatory time off.

In addition to the basic current hourly pay rate, the accrual of compensated absences includes the Department's estimated costs of payroll taxes.

#### 6. Net Assets

The government-wide financial statements utilize a net asset presentation. Net Assets are categorized as investment in capital assets less outstanding liquid assets (net of related debt), restricted and unrestricted.

Investment in Capital Assets (net of related debt) - is intended to reflect the portion of net assets which are associated with non-liquid, capital assets less outstanding capital asset related debt. The net related debt is the debt less the outstanding liquid assets and any associated unamortized cost. The Office has no debt related to capital assets.

Restricted Assets - are liquid assets (generated from revenues and not bond proceeds), which have third-party (statutory, bond covenant or granting agency) limitation on their use.

County-Supported Medicaid Fund created by Section 27-10-3 NMSA 1978 to institute or support primary care health care services in underserved areas. These funds are restricted by law and do not revert in any fiscal year.

Licensure of Health Facilities Civil Monetary penalties authorized by Section 24-1-5 NMSA 1978 to be used for proceedings pursuant to the Health Facilities Receivership Act. These funds are restricted by law and do not revert in any fiscal year.

Vital Statistic fees created by Section 24-14-29 NMSA 1978. These funds are restricted by law and must be transferred to the CYFD Day-Care Fund and the State General Fund in proportions set forth in Section 24-14-29.D. Any remaining funds are monies that have not been disbursed to the appropriate entity.

Computer Systems Enhancement Fund, Laws of 2005, Chapter 33, Section 24. These funds are restricted by law and do not revert in any fiscal year.

For start up of School Based Health Centers, Laws of 2005, Chapter 33, Section 5 for the planning and implementation of a school based health centers. These funds are restricted by law and do revert in any fiscal year.

To cover budget shortfalls/restorations, Laws of 2005, Chapter 33, Section 6. These funds are restricted by law and do revert in any fiscal year.

Capital Projects, Laws of 2005, Chapter 347, Section 42, tele-health capital projects, school-based/DOH health facilities Improvements, web-based 24-hour health care

hotline, health facilities renovate statewide. These funds are restricted by law and do revert in any fiscal year.

Senate Bill 190 – Laws of 2005, Chapter 34, Section 7, equestrian program services for DD children and adults in Dexter; establish stroke centers in hospitals statewide; suicide prevention programs; to review, establish and monitor public health and social services delivery programs for low income residents; to implement an expanded diabetes education program in NW New Mexico; for the very special arts program; gather data on gambling addiction; to establish a clinical teaching institute for nurses, to expand screening tests for newborn infants. These funds are restricted by law and do revert in any fiscal year.

Hospital Integration Program and INPHORM Project, Laws of 2001, Chapter 64, Section 8. These funds are restricted by law and do revert in any fiscal year.

Hospital Integration Program and INPHORM Project, Laws of 2002, Chapter 4, Section 7. These funds are restricted by law and do revert in any fiscal year.

Hospital Integration Program and INPHORM Project, Laws of 2003, Chapter 76, Section 7. These funds are restricted by law and do revert in any fiscal year.

Emergency Medical Services Fund authorized by Section 24-10A-3 NMSA 1978 to make monies available to municipalities and counties for use in the establishment and enhancement of local emergency medical services. These funds are restricted by law and do not revert in any fiscal year.

Facilities Systems Enhancement Project authorized by Laws of 2003, Chapter 76, Sec. 7, (17). Any funds not expensed or encumbered are to revert in FY04. A partial reversion is to be made in FY 06 for unencumbered and unspent funds in FY 05. The remaining amount is encumbered in FY05 and was carried over to FY 06 budget.

Jobs and Growth Tax Relief Reconciliation Act of 2003. This is federal funding passed through from the Department of Finance and Accounting. The funds were awarded by the U.S. Department of the Treasury pursuant to Section 401(b) of the Jobs and Growth Tax Reconciliation Act of 2003. This was authorized by the legislature in Laws of 2003 Chapter 76, Section 3, Subsection I. Monies provided from federal funds for programs specified by the Department and approved by the state budget division. These are federal funds and do not revert. Fund, however, that remain unspent can be reassigned by the Department of Finance and Administration to another project or department as needed.

Unrestricted Assets are assets that do not have third-party (statutory, bond covenant or granting agency) limitations on their use.

#### 7. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of

the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### 8. Intra-fund Activity

Intra-fund receivables or payables at year-end are netted as part of the reconciliation to the governmental-wide financial statements.

#### Note 2. STEWARDSHIP, COMPLIANCE AND ACCOUNTABILITY

#### A. Budgetary Data

The state legislature makes annual appropriations to the Department. Legal compliance is monitored through the establishment of an annual budget for the General Fund.

The following are the procedures followed in establishing the budgetary data presented in the financial statements:

- The Department submits a proposed budget to the New Mexico state legislature for the fiscal year commencing the following July 1. The state legislature must approve the budget prior to its legal enactment.
- The expenditures and encumbrances of each category may not legally exceed the budget for that category. Budgets are controlled at the "category" level within activities (personal services and employee benefits, professional services and other expenditures).
- Any adjustment to the budget must be submitted to and approved by the State of New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration in the form of a budget adjustment request.
- 4. The budget is adopted on a modified accrual basis of accounting that is consistent with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). This change was implemented with the Laws of 2004, Chapter 114, Section 3, paragraph N and paragraph O. This change is effective for fiscal years beginning July 1, 2004. In prior years the budgetary basis of accounting was not considered a GAAP basis of accounting. Budgetary comparisons presented in the financial statements are now presented on a basis which is consistent with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP).
- 5. The Department has been designated as a "reverting agency" by the New Mexico state legislature and, therefore, unencumbered balances in state agency accounts remaining at the end of the fiscal year from appropriations made from the State General Fund shall revert to the State General Fund, unless otherwise indicated in the General Appropriation Act or otherwise provided by law.

#### B. Revenue Recognition

State General Fund appropriations are recognized in the year the appropriation is made. Receivables are recognized as revenue in the year the transfers for services which gave rise to the receivable are provided.

#### C. Program Revenue

Program revenues include program specific operating grants from federal sources or other state agencies. No allocation of indirect expenses is made by function as costs not accounted for by activity are considered immaterial.

Federal Grants - revenues are recognized when appropriate expenditures are incurred or accrued by the Department.

Patient Service Revenue and Contractual Adjustments - patient services revenues are recorded at the established rates of the medical facilities and hospitals but are reduced by "contractual adjustments" to recognize allowances for charity services, provisions for uncollectible accounts and charges that otherwise exceed payments from Medicare, Medicaid, private or other resources. Medicare and Medicaid payments accounted for approximately 90% of net patient service revenues received in 2005.

Amounts receivable and payable under reimbursement from "third-party payor" agreements, primarily Medicare and Medicaid, are subject to examination and retroactive adjustment by a third-party payor. Provisions for estimated retroactive adjustments by the third-party payor are provided in the period the related services are rendered. Any difference between the amounts accrued and settled is reflected in operations in the year of settlement.

The facilities are paid for substantially all inpatient services rendered to Medicaid and/or Medicare program beneficiaries under prospectively determined rates-per-discharge. Accordingly, to the extent that costs incurred (exclusive of other defined capital costs and certain education costs of the rehabilitation centers which continue to be paid on the basis of reasonable costs) for services rendered to Medicare and Medicaid patients exceed the determined payment rates, they are not recoverable from the Medicare and Medicaid programs or their beneficiaries. The facilities' payment classification of patients under the prospective system is subject to review based on validation audits by third parties.

The revenue recognition policies for special state appropriations are such that when monies are received they are classified as deferred revenue until wholly or partially spent.

Most of the time, monies relating to special state appropriations are received at the beginning of the fiscal year or during the year. As expenditures occur, the amounts originally posted as deferred revenue are re-classified as earned revenue.

Most, if not all, special appropriations contain legislative guidelines to ensure the money is being spent in concert with its intended purpose. There may also be time limitations on the period in which the money may be spent. For instance, some 'special appropriations contain language that mandate that any unspent, unencumbered balance must revert to the general fund by a specified date.

Found in the equity section of the balance sheet, reserved fund balance includes reserves for encumbrances, prepaid postage, and inventory so that left over balances will not be spent inappropriately and is contracted to legislative intent.

#### **FUNDS HELD IN TRUST BY OTHERS**

The Department is an income beneficiary of a portion of the State Permanent Fund designated specifically for the Behavioral Health Institute in Las Vegas and receives 2/7 of the income from investments in the State Permanent Fund derived from the Charitable, Penal and Reformatory Act for the Behavioral Health Institute in Las Vegas and the Los Lunas 'Community Programs (1/7 of \$72,554,735 each). The trust principal is managed by the State Investment Council and, because the funds are not controlled by the Department, they are not reflected in the accompanying financial statements. #### Note 4. OTHER INFORMATION

#### A. Retirement Plans, Deferred Compensation Plan, and Post Employment Benefits:

#### **Retirement Plans**

#### Public Employees Retirement Association (PERA)

**Plan Description**. Substantially all of the Department's full-time employees participate in a public employee retirement system authorized under the Public Employee's Retirement Association Act (PERA) (Chapter 10, Article11 NMSA 1978). The PERA is the administrator of the plan, which is a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit retirement plan. The plan provides for retirement, disability benefits, survivor benefits and cost-of-living adjustments to plan members and beneficiaries. PERA issues a separate, publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. That report may be obtained by writing to PERA, P.O. Box 2123, Santa Fe, and N.M. 87503-2123.

Funding Policy. Plan members are required to contribute 7.42% of their gross salary. The Department is required to contribute 16.59% of the gross salary. The contribution requirements of plan members and the Department is established under Chapter 10, Article 11 NMSA 1978. The requirements may be amended by acts of the legislature. The Department's contributions to PERA for the years ending June 30, 2006, 2005 and 2004 were \$20,321,350, \$19,843,174, and \$19,075,449, respectively, equal to the amount of the required contributions for each year.

#### Educational Retirement Act (ERA)

**Plan Description.** Some of the Department's full-time employees participate in a public employee retirement system authorized under the Educational Retirement Act (ERA) (Chapter 22, Article 11 NMSA 1978). The ERA is the administrator of the plan, which is a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit retirement plan. The plan provides for retirement, disability benefits, survivor benefits and cost-of-living adjustments to plan members and beneficiaries. ERA issues a separate, publicly available financial statements and required supplementary information. That report may be obtained by writing to ERA, P.O. Box 26129, Santa Fe, N.M. 87502.

**Funding Policy.** Plan members are required to contribute 7.6% of their gross salary. The Department is required to contribute 8.65% of the gross salary. The contribution requirements of plan members and the Department are established under Chapter 22, Article 11 NMSA 1978. The requirements may be amended by acts of the legislature. The Department's contributions to ERA for the year ending June 30, 2006 and June 30, 2005 were \$166,034, and \$219,249.

#### **Deferred Compensation**

The State of New Mexico offers state, local government, and school district employees a deferred compensation plan created in accordance with the Internal Revenue Code, Section 457. The plan is available to all state employees and those local government and school district employees whose employers have elected to participate in the plan. The plan permits

participants to defer a portion of their salary until future years. The deferred compensation is not available to employees until termination, retirement, death or unforeseeable emergency.

All amounts of compensation deferred under the plan, all property and rights purchased with those amounts, and all income attributable to those amounts, property, or rights are the property of the participant.

Employees of the Department are making contributions to the Deferred Compensation Plan. Neither the Office nor the State of New Mexico make any contributions to the Deferred Compensation Plan. All contributions withheld from participants by the Office have been paid to PERA who administers the plan.

#### Retiree Health Care Act (RHCA)

The Retiree Health Care Act (RHCA) (10-7C-1 to 10-7C-16, NMSA 1978) provides comprehensive core group health insurance for persons who have retired from certain public service in New Mexico. The purpose is to provide eligible retirees, their spouses, and surviving spouses and dependents with health insurance consisting of a plan, or optional plans, of benefits that can be purchased by funds flowing into the Retiree Health Care Fund and by copayments of eligible retirees.

Monies flows to the Retiree Health Care Fund on a "pay-as-you-go" basis from eligible employers and eligible retirees. Eligible employers consist of institutions of higher education, school districts, or other entities participating in the public school insurance authority and state agencies, state courts, magistrate courts, municipalities or counties, which are affiliated under or covered by the Education Retirement Act, the Magistrate Retirement Act or the Public Employees Retirement Act.

Eligible retirees are: (1) retirees who make contributions to the fund for at least five years prior to retirement and whose eligible employer during this time made contributions as a participant in the Retiree Health Care Act (NMRHCA) on the persons' behalf, unless that person retires before the employers NMRHCA effective date in which event, the time period for employees and employer contributions shall become the period of time between the employer's effective date and the date of retirement; or (2) retirees defined by the act who retired prior to July 1, 1990 as well as former state legislators who served at least two years.

Each participating employer makes employee contributions to the fund in the amount of 1.3% of each participating employee's annual salary. Each participating employee contributes to the fund an employee's contribution equal to 0.65% of the employees' salary. For the medical plus basic life plan and an additional participation fee of five dollars (\$5.00) if the eligible participant retired prior to the employer's NMRHCA effective date or is a former legislator. Participants may also enroll in optional plans of coverage.

Contributions from participating employers and participating employees become the property of the Retiree Health Care Fund and are not refundable under any circumstances, including termination of employment or termination of the participating employer's operation or participation in the NMRHCA. The employer, employee, and retiree contributions are required to be remitted to the Retiree Health Care Authority on a monthly basis.

## Notes to the Financial Statements June 30, 2006

The Retiree Health Care Authority issues a separate, publicly available audited financial report that includes post employment benefit expenditures of premiums and claims paid, participant contributions (employer, employee, and retiree), and net expenditures for the fiscal year. The report also includes the approximate number of retirees participating in the plan. That report may be obtained by writing to the Retiree Health Care Authority, 4308 Carlisle Blvd, NE, Suite 104, Albuquerque, NM 87109.

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006, the Department remitted \$1,597,452 in employer contributions and \$798,726 in employee contributions. In fiscal year ended June 30, 2005 the amounts remitted were \$1,559,223 in employer contributions and \$779,611 in employee contributions.

#### **Accounting for Termination Benefits**

The Department except for the benefits that are provided under the employees annual leave, sick leave and prepaid post-retirement insurance benefits that are disclosed in the notes above and recorded as a liability in the Governmental Wide Financial Statement no early retirement or post-retirement termination Benefits occurred in the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006.

#### B. Contingencies

The Department, as a State Agency defined in the New Mexico Tort Claims Act, is insured through the Risk Management Division of the General Services Department of the State of New Mexico. The Office of Risk Management Division pays annual premiums for coverage provided in the following areas:

- Liability and civil rights protection for claims made by others against the State of New Mexico.
- Coverage to protect the State of New Mexico's property and assets; and
- Fringe benefit coverage for State of New Mexico employees.

In the case of civil actions or claims against the Department for financial damages, the Department's certificate of insurance with Risk Management does not cover civil rights claims for back wages but does cover civil rights claims for other compensatory damages.

The Department of Health is engaged in litigation for declaratory and injunctive relief to obtain Developmental Disabilities and Disabled and Elderly home and community-based medicaid waiver services for three individual plaintiffs and other similarly situated persons. The trial court has ruled against the defendants on their main defenses. Even though the Department has lost this decision, in similar litigation in other jurisdictions in the United States the courts decisions are holding that states have limited or lack of liability in this area. In the event this decision is reversed, the plaintiffs could conceivably take appeals all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court. If the U.S. Supreme Court finds for the plaintiffs, the Department could be ordered to pay fees and costs associated with the decision as well as provide services to developmentally disabled and other disabled persons who are on waiting lists for services under an injunction. The range of potential loss cannot be reasonably estimated at this time.

The Department of Health is involved in a tort claim suit for damages against the Department arises from plaintiff's actions in picking up bio-hazardous waste. The potential loss cannot be reasonably estimated at this time.

The Department of Health is involved in a law suit where as the plaintiff is alleging that while a patient at the New Mexico Behavior Health Institute in Las Vegas he was physically and sexually assaulted, by possibly another patient. The Department has a potential loss in this case not to exceed \$60,000.

#### C. Subsequent Events

The Department of Health entered into an agreement in June 2006 where as the New Mexico Finance Authority would loan the department \$2,000,000, of which \$1,000,000 would be used for New Mexico Behavior Health Institute in Las Vegas, and \$1,000,000 for the New Mexico Rehabilitation Center in Roswell. The funds advanced in July 2007 are for the start-up cost for planning the renovating of old buildings and for new construction.

The Department received invoices after year-end from the Department of Human Services (HS) for Developmentally Disabled Waivers Program for prior years. The invoices were for the state matching portion that is paid by the Department to HS as the bills are paid by Medicaid. The invoices are for several prior years and the future amounts cannot be reasonably estimated. 6-10-4 B. NMSA 1978 states "Appropriations to the human services department for Medicaid payments may be expended by that department for Medicaid obligations for prior fiscal years." The appropriations are made to the Department for the purpose to pass through the funds to HS per a Joint Powers agreement specifically for the Medicaid Waiver.

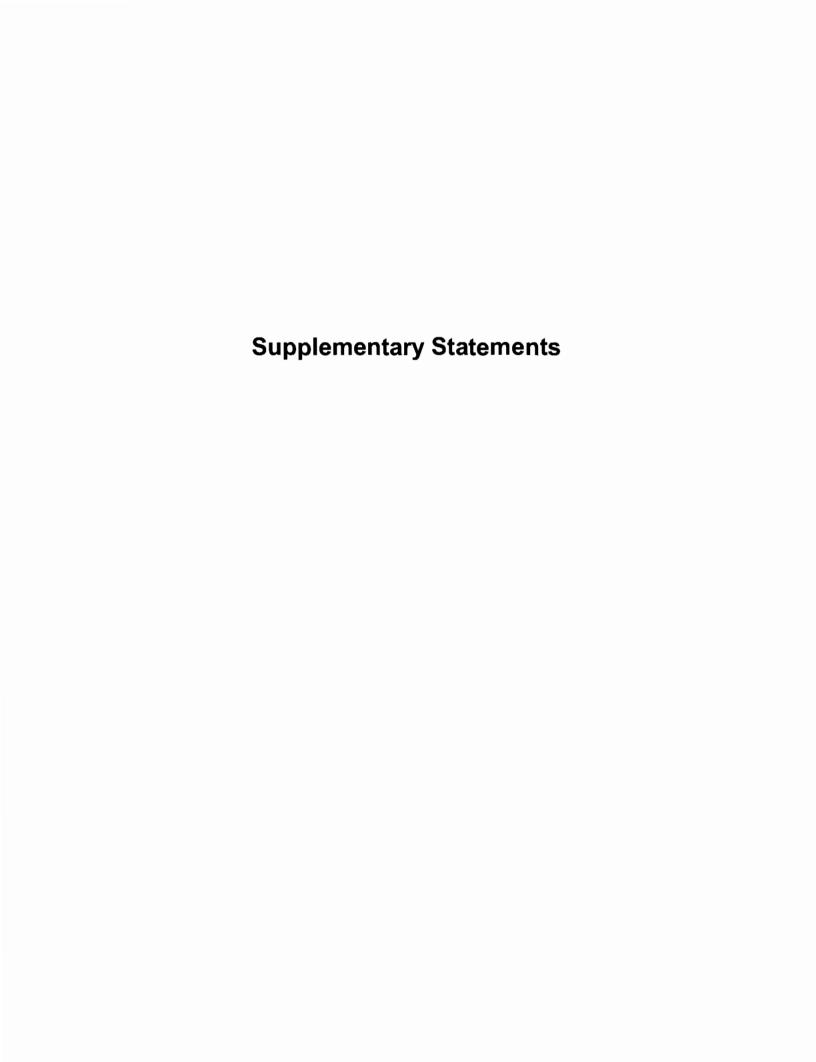
The Department received invoices for payment after July 31, for which there was sufficient budget to pay The State of New Mexico requires that they be charged to FY 2007 budget. GAAP requires these expenditures be charged to FY 2006 therefore they are recognized as FY 2006 expenditures in the Financial Statements. Other invoices not received by December 13, 2006 could not be reasonably estimated and were not projected. The following amounts are expenditures and payables received by December 13, 2006 that were posted to our accounting records in FY 2007 and therefore will require a reversal in FY 2007 for the Financial Statements.

#### D. Risk Management

The Department is exposed to various risks of loss related to tort, theft of, damage to, or destruction of assets, errors or omissions, employer obligations and natural disasters for which the Department carries insurance (Workers Compensation, Unemployment Compensation, Employee Liability, Transportation Property and Bond Premium) with the State of New Mexico Risk Management Division (RMD) of the General Services Department. Insurance premiums are allocated to and paid by all budgeted activities within the general fund. During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006, total insurance premiums paid to the Risk Management Division were \$3,013,679.

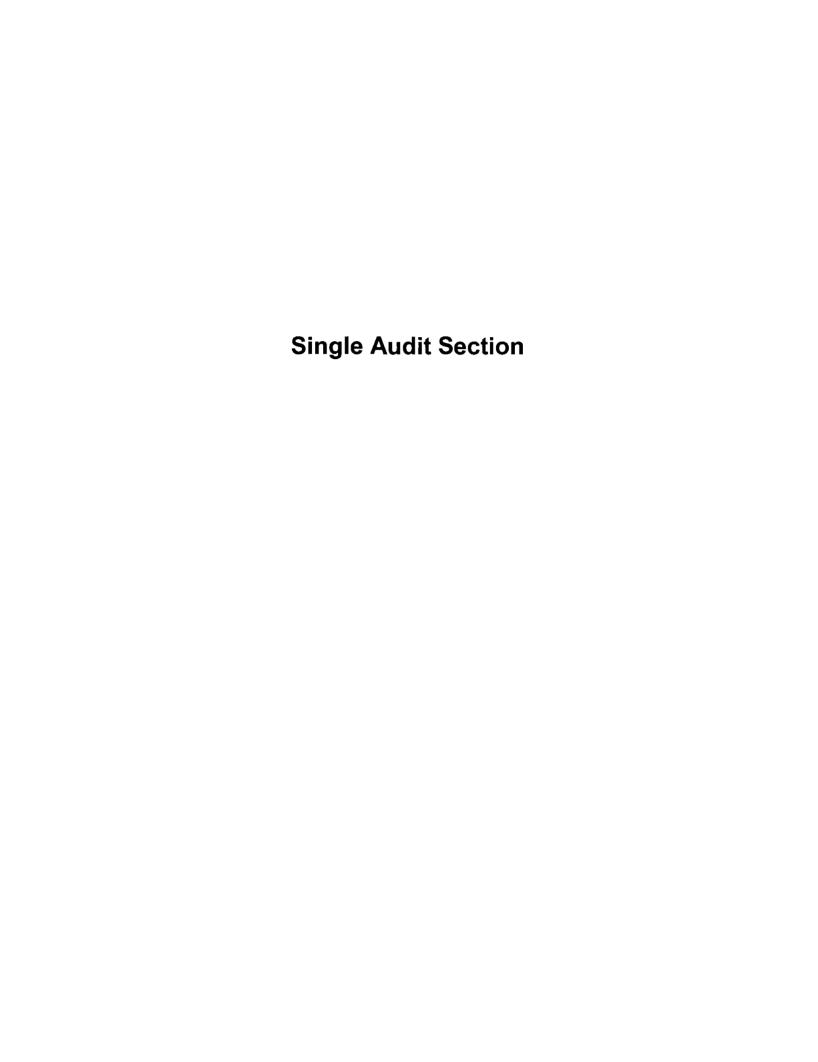

We also have audited the financial statements of each of the Department's fiduciary funds as presented in the individual fund financial statements, and the program budget comparisons of the Department presented as supplementary information as of and for the year ended June 30, 2006, and have issued our report thereon dated December 13, 2006. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

## Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

#### A. SUMMARY OF AUDIT RESULTS

- 2. There were no instances of noncompliance material to the financial statements disclosed during the audit of the Department.
- 3. There was one reportable condition identified during the audit of the Department that is not considered to be material to the financial statements of the Department.
- **4.** There were no reportable conditions in the internal control over major programs disclosed by the Department.
- **5.** There were no audit findings that the auditor is required to report under 510(a) of Circular A-133.
- **6.** The auditors' report on compliance for the major federal award programs for the Department expresses an unqualified opinion.

# B. Findings - Financial Statement Audit

#### 04-7 CAS Funds

**Statement of Condition -** The Department's financial statements do not comply with the State Auditor's rule 2.2.2.12(2)

Criteria - The State Auditor's rule 2.2.2.12(2) requires that "The individual central accounting system funds be shown in the combined financial statements.."

**Cause -** The current accounting system is over twenty years old and is not capable of providing the flexibility required by the State Auditor rule.

Effect - The Department is not in compliance with State Auditor's rule 2.2.2.12(2).

**Recommendation** - The Department needs to determine if other options are available to allow management to create the schedule required by the State Auditor or possibly purchase new accounting software capable of providing the information to comply with the rule.

**Response** - We concur with this finding but due to time constraints and implementation of SHARE we were unable to extract the data from our records to reflect the information as required.

The Department did not keep its books by state treasurer's account in the past, but will be doing so beginning July 1, 2006 in the new People Soft accounting system.

#### 06-1 Federal expenditure, drawdown and receipts reconciliation

**Statement of Condition -** The grant department did not reconcile the federal expenditures and the federal drawdowns and receipts

*Criteria* - The grant department is to reconcile all expenditures, drawdowns and receipts on a timely basis in order to have financial information that is relevant and reliable.

**Cause** - The department did not reconcile the grants due to internal turnover and lack of personnel trained in the process.

**Effect** - Financial reports issued are likely to contain errors and may not contain reliable information

**Recommendation** - We recommend the Department implement and enforce a policy that requires all grants to be reconciled quarterly at a minimum. The policy should include a system of review to insure the data is correct.

**Response -** The department concurs, and the Grants Unit with review all reconciliations on a monthly basis and the Financial Accounting Bureau will review the reconciliations monthly to ensure timely reconciliation.

### 06-2 Free Rent Non Profit Organizations - Women's, Infants and Children

**Statement of Condition -** While performing test work associated with the audit of the Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program, we discovered one non-profit organization is utilizing space at the Northwest Valley Public Health WIC Office in Albuquerque, NM without a formal joint powers agreement or a formal lease agreement.

**Criteria -** Per Section 12-6-6 NMSA 1978, governments cannot donate goods and services except for those items that are disposed of under the guideline of the procurement codes. Based upon the test work performed, there are no joint power agreement, formal lease agreements nor payments made for rent by the non profit organization that use space at a Department facility.

**Effect -** The Department is not in compliance with Section 12-6-6 NMSA 1978. That resulted in a loss of revenue for the Department.

**Cause -** An employee circumvented the Property Control Division (General Services Department) rules established for state agencies maintaining property.

**Recommendation** - We recommend that the Department establish a review process monthly or quarterly for their off-site facilities to ensure greater internal control over property management. This process could be performed by the internal audit function.

**Response-** 24-4-2 NMSA, 1978 requires counties to provide office space to the health department for operation of the county health office. The space in question belongs to Bernalillo County and not the Department. This finding is more appropriately addressed to Bernalillo County.

### 06-3 Improper Write-Off of Accounts Receivable - New Mexico Rehabilitation Center

**Statement of Condition -** The Department wrote-off the amount of accounts receivable for the New Mexico Rehabilitation Center.

Criteria - The New Mexico Constitution, Art. IV, Sec. 32, provides that:

No obligation or liability of any person, association or corporation held or owned by or owing to the state, or any municipal corporation therein, shall ever be exchanged, transferred, remitted, released, postponed or in any way diminished by the legislature, nor shall any such obligation or liability be extinguished except by the payment thereof into the proper treasury, or by proper proceeding in court.

Cause - Lack of a uniform account receivable policy or procedure.

**Effect -** Non-compliance with the New Mexico Constitution, ART.IV Sec 32 and incorrect balances in the financial statements for accounts receivable and allowance for uncollectibles.

**Recommendation** - Implementation of strict policies and procedures to obtain an accurate amount of accounts receivable and allowance for uncollectibles, which prohibit the write-off of amounts deemed uncollectible.

Response - The department concurs and will implement the recommendation immediately.

### 06-4 Fixed Asset Accounting - Fixed Asset Deletions

**Statement of Condition -** Fixed asset deletions require the authorization of the governmental entity through a written notification to the State Auditor duly sworn and under oath.

**Criteria -** Per NMAC, Audit Rule 2006, Sec. 2.2.2.10W a written notification to the State Auditor must be submitted at least 30 days prior to any disposition, of the proposed disposition duly sworn and subscribed under oath by each member of the authority approving the action.

**Cause** - Lack of a formal fixed asset disposition policy or procedure.

Effect - Non-compliance with NMAC SEC 2.2.2.10W.

**Recommendation -** Policies and procedures should be implemented by the Department to ensure compliance with the New Mexico State Auditor Rule.

Response – The department concurs and will implement the recommendation immediately.

#### 06-5 Procurement of goods and services

**Statement of Condition -** The Office of Health Emergency Management requested a warrant be issued to a vendor before the goods were delivered or services rendered.

Criteria - Non-compliance with Authority to Issue Warrants, 2.20.6.8(8) NMSA 1978 that states "All payments to vendors shall be accurate and timely and be for services already rendered or goods received and accepted by the state agency as complying with the contract or purchase order."

**Cause -** The Office of Health Emergency Management did not ensure that the goods and services were delivered before a request for payment was issued.

Effect - The Department was not in compliance with 2.20.6.8 NMSA 1978.

**Recommendation** - Management should ensure that all goods and services have been received or rendered before a preparing a payment voucher.

Response - The department concurs and the matter has been appropriately addressed.

### Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2006

#### 06-6 Procurement of Goods and Services

**Statement of Condition** - Per examination of two deposits related to patient service charges at the New Mexico Behavioral Institute, a certain amount of revenue (\$1,256,657) that was received during the month of July 2006 was not posted to SHARE until the month of December 2006.

Criteria - Per Department of Finance and Administration's Model Accounting Practices, Volume 1, Chapter 3B, Section 3.1D, agencies must recognize and record revenue in the accounting period in which they become susceptible to accrual to meet management's needs, meet federal reporting requirements, and comply with State law. Revenues become susceptible to accrual when they are measurable and available (the cut-off for revenue recognition should not exceed ninety days).

**Cause -** Due to the confusion and complexity surrounding the implementation of SHARE by the Department, revenue was not recorded in a timely manner

**Effect** - The Department did not properly record revenue in a timely manner, thus revenue was not accurately stated until December 2006.

**Recommendation -** To ensure that revenue is posted timely, the Department should ensure that its personnel are adequately trained in the complexity of SHARE in order to perform their duties.

**Response** - The Department concurs that the revenue was not transferred to the State Treasurer within the 24 hour turn around time required by law.

#### 06-7 Invalid Encumbrances and Reversions

**Statement of Condition** - During budget testwork we noted that there were numerous invalid encumbrances as of June 30, 2006 not removed from the budget.

*Criteria* - Per Section 6-5-10, NMSA 1978 states that all invalid encumbrances be included in the reversion calculation.

**Cause -** The Department did not record the reversion due to their negative cash balance at year end.

**Effect** - The Department has invalid encumbrances at the end of June 30, 2006. The Department did not record a reversion to the State General Fund due to their negative cash balance at year end.

**Recommendation -** We recommend that the Department work with Department of Finance and Administration, and Legislative Finance Committee to assist in obtaining additional appropriations.

**Response** - The Department in FY 05 reverted over \$6 million dollars to DFA that was for future bills from Department of Human Services related to Developmental Disabled waivers

program. We had also budgeted our available cash from FY 1999 through FY 2006 without taking into account the account payables that were to be paid from the prior years' budgeted appropriations. This resulted in a negative fund balance of over \$8 million as of June 30, 2005. We also anticipate receiving several million dollars in additional billings from the Department of Human Services related to Developmental Disabled waivers for prior years.

Due to these reasons and the fact that we have asked at this time for a supplemental appropriation to cover prior years' shortfall, we do not feel that it is appropriate to make a reversion for the unexpended appropriations until we have adequate funds on hand to make the reversion to the State General Fund.

### 06-8 Expenditures In Excess Of Approved Budget

**Statement of Condition** - During budget test work we noted Program Area 7, Developmentally Disabled Community Services' expenditures exceeded the approved budget by \$1,543,768.

**Criteria** – The Department's accounting system should have the ability to continuously compare the expenditures including the estimate of accrued Medicaid billings to the approved budget.

Cause - The Department did not accrue the Medicaid billings..

**Effect** - The Department exceeded the approved budget due to the receipt of those Medicaid billings.

**Recommendation** - We recommend that the Department reconcile the program expenditures and estimate the accrued expenses on a timely basis, this will eliminate budget overruns. It should also have a better understanding of expenditures are going to be billed in order to get a better accrual.

**Response** - The Department is billed for at least 18 months after the expenditures are incurred by Developmentally Disabled providers to the Medicaid program. Section 6-10-4 B NMSA 1978 permits the Department to pay for current year's Medicaid billings out of future year's budgeted revenue sources that are not received by June 30<sup>th</sup> of that year. The Department feels that despite the fact we exceeded our budget we were still in compliance with the law because of the exception granted by Section 6-10-4 B NMSA 1978. The Department is going to request a meeting with the State Controller and the State Auditor's Office to resolve this issue before fiscal year-end 2007

CFDA No. 93.268 Immunization Program

CFDA No. 93.917 Ryan White Title II HIV Care

CFDA No. 93.958 Community Mental Health Service

**Statement of Condition** — One of the vendors used for purchases of goods and services for a federal program was not tested for suspension and debarment.

**Criteria -** Per OMB A-133, Section I, programs receiving federal funds are prohibited from contracting with or making sub-awards under covered transactions to parties that are suspended or debarred or whose principals are suspended or debarred. Covered transactions included procurement contracts for goods or services equal to or in excess of \$100,000 and any non-procurement transactions.

**Cause -** Inconsistent use and retention of Suspension and Debarment forms occurred due to lack of centralized control over vendor selection for purchase of goods and services for a federal program.

Effect - Non - compliance with procurement, suspension, and debarment requirements.

**Recommendation** - Management should ensure that vendors are not included in the suspension and debarment list by either requesting certification statements from vendors or examining the list of suspended and debarred parties provided on the Internet.

**Department Response Update** - In fiscal year 2005 it was determined that a centralized Contracts & Grants Bureau was needed to oversee the Department's federal grant and contracting processes. This Bureau was put in place in July 2005 and revised policies and procedures will be issued in early 2006 that will include providing evidence to the Contracts & Grants Bureau of completion of the Suspension and Disbarment form to ensure compliance.

#### 06-1 Federal expenditure, drawdown and receipts reconciliation

#### **All Federal Awards**

**Statement of Condition -** The grant department did not reconcile the federal expenditures and the federal drawdowns and receipts

*Criteria* - The grant department is to reconcile all expenditures, drawdowns and receipts on a timely basis in order to have financial information that is relevant and reliable.

**Cause -** The department did not reconcile the grants due to internal turnover and lack of personnel trained in the process.

Effect - Financial reports issued are likely to contain errors and may not contain reliable information

# Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2006

**Recommendation** - We recommend the Department implement and enforce a policy that requires all grants to be reconciled quarterly at a minimum. The policy should include a system of review to insure the data is correct.

**Response -** The department concurs, and the Grants Unit will review all reconciliations on a monthly basis and the Financial Accounting Bureau will review the reconciliations monthly to ensure timely reconciliation.
