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#### INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

We have audited the accompanying basic financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, the respective budgetary comparisons and the aggregate remaining fund information of the State of New Mexico Department of Health (the Department) as of and for the year ended June 30, 2007, which comprise the Department's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. We also have audited the major capital project fund and the program budgetary comparisons of the Department presented as supplementary information as of and for the year ended June 30, 2007, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Department's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and the significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

As discussed in Note 1, the financial statements of the Department are intended to present the financial position and results of operations of only that portion of the governmental activities, each major fund, the respective budgetary comparisons and the aggregate remaining fund information of the State that is attributable to the transactions of the Department.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Department as of June 30, 2007, and the respective changes in financial position thereof, and the respective budgetary comparisons each the major governmental fund for the year then ended, in

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated July 10, 2008, on our consideration of the Department's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be read in conjunction with this report in considering the results of our audit.

The accompanying management's discussion and analysis is not a required part of the basic financial statements but is supplementary information required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the basic financial statements and the budgetary comparisons of the Department. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations, and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Also, the schedules listed as other supplementary schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements of the Department. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Management's Discussion and Analysis Year Ended June 30, 2007

The following Management's Discussion and Analysis, or MD&A, for the State of New Mexico, Department of Health (the Department) introduces the basic financial statements and provides an analytical overview of the Department's financial condition and results of operations as of and for the year ended June 30, 2007 (FY07). Additionally, the MD&A provides a discussion of significant changes in the account categories presented in the entity-wide Statement of Net Assets and Statement of Activities. This summary should not be taken as a replacement for the basic financial statements.

The MD&A is an element of the new reporting model adopted by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) in GASB Statement No. 34, Basic Financial Statements - and Management's Discussion and Analysis - for State and Local Governments; GASB Statement No. 37, Basic Financial Statements - and Management's Discussion and Analysis - for State and Local Governments: Omnibus, an amendment to GASB Statements No. 21 and No. 34; and GASB Statement No. 38, Certain Financial Statement Note Disclosures.

#### OVERVIEW OF THE BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Although the Department is one of several agencies within the government of the State of New Mexico, the focus of this financial report is only on the Department and not the State of New Mexico taken as a whole. The financial statements include the following three elements: (1) Management's Discussion and Analysis, (2) the Basic Financial Statements, and (3) Other Supplementary Information. The basic financial statements include two kinds of statements that present different views of the Department:

- The first two statements are entity-wide financial statements that report information about the Department's overall financial condition and results of operations, both long-term and short-term, using accounting methods similar to those used by private-sector companies. The Statement of Net Assets includes all of the Department's assets, liabilities, and net assets. All revenues and expenses are accounted for in the Statement of Activities regardless of when cash is received or disbursed. The remaining statements are fund financial statements.
- Governmental funds statements, including the Balance Sheet and the Statement of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balances, focus on individual parts of the Department, reporting the Department's financial condition and results of operations in more detail than in the entity-wide statements, and tell how general government services were financed in the short term as well as what remains for future spending. Emphasis is on the general and major funds. Other governmental funds are summarized in a single column.
- Statement of Revenues and Expenditures Budget and Actual Modified Accrual (GAAP Budgetary Basis) reports the original approved budget, final approved budget, and actual results presented on the modified accrual budgetary basis of reporting for the general fund and all major funds. A separate column is presented to report any variances between the final budget and actual amounts.
- Statement of Fiduciary Net Assets provides information about the financial relationships in which the Department acts solely as a trustee or agent for the benefit of others, to whom the resources in question belong.

#### FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE DEPARTMENT AS A WHOLE - continued

Significant factors impacting the Department's financial position and results of operations during the year ended June 30, 2007 are as follows:

- Current Assets increased by \$39,424,819, or 64.5%. Restricted Cash, which is a result of enabling legislation that statutorily restricts the uses of cash for specific purposes, as well as bond appropriations for capital improvement projects, decreased by \$345,274, or 15.3%. The June 30 balances in the amount due from the federal government increased by \$25.6 million due to delayed billings for federal expenditures, which resulted from delays in posting personnel and other expenses for federal grants due to SHARE implementation issues. In addition, for the same reasons, the June 30 balances in the amounts due from other state agencies increased by \$10.8 million, primarily due to receivables at June 30 for patient Medicaid receivables.
- Capital Assets and Investment in Capital Assets decreased by \$2,872,957, or 11.0%, due to \$4,179,697 in depreciation expenses that were offset by \$1,351,740 in additional capitalized assets.
- Overall, Total Assets increased by \$36,596,862, or 42.3%, due to the factors noted above.
- Current Liabilities increased by \$24,386,623, or 44.7%, due primarily to an increase in Accounts Payable: amounts due to other state agencies increased by \$9,986,010 due primarily to the recording of a prior year payable to the Human Services Department (HSD) for the Developmentally Disabled Medicaid Waiver Program. Deferred Revenue also increased, by \$3.4 million, due to the recording of revenue received in FY07 for capital project appropriations that will be expended in FY08 and later fiscal years. Other Liabilities increased by \$3.2 million over FY06 ending balances due to DOH owing HSD \$1.0 million of behavioral health treatment expenses, and \$2.2 million for third party benefits payable due to the Department of Finance and Administration at June 30. Lastly, Long-term Liabilities decreased by \$51,314 with the elimination of balances in the long-term compensated absences account.
- Total Liabilities increased by \$24,335,309, or 44.6%. See discussion under Current Liabilities above.
- Unrestricted Net Assets increased by \$15,434,784. This increase is related directly to the reduction of Restricted Net Assets and the change in fund balance by \$15,072,686 that was the direct result of the Department Income being larger than Expenses in fiscal year ending June 30, 2007.
- The total Net Assets, including the restatement amount of \$3,152,806 increased by \$12,261,553, or 38.4%. See discussions under Current Assets, Restricted Net Assets and Unrestricted Net Assets above.

#### SUBSEQUENT EVENT

The Department received \$8,685,800 in Tobacco Settlement Revenue for FY07 from the Department of Finance and Administration during accounting period 1 in FY08. Had this cash transfer occurred in the fiscal year in which it should have been recorded, FY07, the cash deficit recorded in Fund 06100 for June 30, 2007, would have been reduced or eliminated.

#### BUDGETARY HIGHLIGHTS

For FY07, the Department's budget, as appropriated by the Legislature in the 2006 General Appropriation Act, increased from \$502,696,500 in total revenue and expenditures in FY06 to \$535,901,400 for FY07, an increase of \$33,204,900. The majority of the increase was due to a revenue increase of \$15,811,800 in the General Fund for a variety of purposes explained below and for serving additional clients under the Developmentally Disabled Medicaid Waiver Program, and a revenue increase of \$22,848,400 in Inter-Agency Transfers funds for Value Options revenue for facilities. The Department's appropriation also included a decrease of \$11,846,900 in Other State Funds over the FY06 level.

The expenditure increases associated with the FY07 budget consist of a \$6,751,900 increase in the Personnel Services and Employee Benefits category for compensation and staffing level increases; \$5,360,300 in the Contractual Services category for additional programs and services; and \$12,818,100, in the Other category. The individual cost objective increases related to the net category increase include increases for client care and support services (\$9,147,800), food cost increases (\$1,481,500), utilities cost increases (\$614,200), and grants and services for the hospital trauma system program (\$2,627,200). The Other Financing Uses category also increased by \$8,274,600, primarily to support additional services for clients in the Developmentally Disabled Medicaid Waiver Program.

In addition to the increases noted above, the Department also received \$4,881,000 in recurring General Fund special appropriations for a variety of new and expanded programs, including funding for stroke treatment (\$100,000), a nurse clinical teaching institute (\$95,000), adult suicide prevention (\$50,000), community-based cancer prevention (\$100,000), a sex offender treatment program (\$659,000), methamphetamine treatment (\$121,000), rape crisis treatment (\$50,000), prenatal and perinatal healthcare services for indigent women in Dona Ana County (\$100,000), women's health services in Santa Fe County (\$192,000), school-based health centers (\$500,000), hospital trauma services (\$2,000,000), telehealth services (\$190,000), childhood immunizations (\$500,000), rural healthcare (\$100,000), suicide prevention in northern New Mexico (\$19,500), substance abuse treatment in San Juan County (\$30,000), alcoholism treatment in Santa Fe County (\$55,000), and alcohol abuse treatment in Talpa in Taos County (\$19,500).

#### CAPITAL ASSETS AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION

Total capital assets, net of depreciation, for the Department make up 17.0% of the Department's total assets. The Department has no infrastructure assets.

Total compensated absences at June 30, 2007 are \$7,339,794. The estimated amount to be paid from General Fund appropriations within one year is \$7,339,794, or 100.0%; none of this balance is expected to be paid after one year. There was no significant activity to report for compensated absences during the year ended June 30, 2007.

#### **CURRENTLY KNOWN FACTS, DECISIONS OR CONDITIONS**

The State as a whole implemented the SHARE accounting system on July 1, 2006. This implementation required the Department to develop a new reporting structure and new procedures for processing transactions through the State's control agencies. This implementation included the implementation of a Federal Grants Module; however, training for the module was limited, and implementation of the module was delayed during FY07, which required the Department to request extensions to normal expenditure reporting deadlines.

#### 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements of the State of New Mexico's Department of Health (DOH) have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) as applied to governmental units as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB), which is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting standards. GASB Statement 34, Statement 37, and Statement 38 establish financial reporting requirements for state and local governments throughout the United States.

The Department is responsible for the fair presentation of the accompanying financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. The Department has implemented these standards beginning with the fiscal year ended June 30, 2002. The Department has prepared required supplementary information in the titled Management's Discussion and Analysis, (MD&A), which precedes the basic financial statements. The financial statements for the Department have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) as applied to governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the standard-setting body for governmental accounting and financial reporting. Pronouncements of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued after November 30, 1989, are not applied in the preparation of the financial statements of the proprietary fund type in accordance with GASB No. 20. The GASB periodically updates its codification of the existing Governmental Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards, which, along with subsequent GASB pronouncements (Statements and Interpretations), constitutes GAAP for governmental units. The more significant of these accounting policies are described below.

#### Reporting Entity

The State of New Mexico Department of Health (Department) is a cabinet department of the executive branch of government created by state statute under Chapter 9, Article 7 NMSA 1978. The Department's administrative head is the Secretary, who is appointed by the Governor with the consent of the Senate and serves in the Governor's executive cabinet.

The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) has set forth criteria to be used in determining financial accountability. These criteria include the State of New Mexico's ability to appoint a voting majority of an organization's governing body and either the ability of the State to impose its will on that organization, or the potential for the organization to provide specific financial benefits to, or impose specific financial burdens on, the State.

The Department is part of the primary government of the State, and its financial data should be included with the financial data of the State. However, the State does not at present issue an audited Comprehensive Annual Financial Report inclusive of the various state departments, agencies, institutions

and organizational units which are controlled by or dependent upon the New Mexico legislature or its constitutional officers that make up the State's legal entity.

Chapter 12, Article 6, NMSA 1978 requires that the financial affairs of every agency be thoroughly examined and audited each year and that a complete written report is made.

For financial reporting purposes, the Department has been defined as an integral part of the State's Executive Branch, and the accompanying financial statements include all funds over which the Secretary has the following oversight responsibilities:

- Financial interdependency
- Ability to significantly influence operations
- Accountability for fiscal matters
- Selection of governing authority
- Designation of management

The Department of Health's budget is appropriated by the Legislature during the State's annual legislative session. For fiscal 2007 (FY07), the Legislature appropriated the budget, and the Operating Budget was approved, in eight Program Areas, as shown below:

The Public Health Division is statutorily required to create and fund programs, services and policy to protect the health and welfare of the people of New Mexico. In doing so, the Division focuses on cost-effective early prevention programs, creating a safe and healthy environment, preventing and controlling infectious diseases, and increasing access to health care services.

The mission of the Epidemiology and Response Division is to monitor health, provide health information, prevent disease and injury, promote health and healthy behaviors, respond to public health events, prepare for health emergencies, and provide emergency medical and vital registration services to New Mexicans. This mission is achieved through six bureaus: Vital Records and Health Statistics, Infectious Disease Epidemiology, Injury and Behavioral Epidemiology, Environmental Health Epidemiology, Environmental Health Epidemiology, Health Emergency Management and Emergency Medical Services.

Scientific Laboratory Division

The Scientific Laboratory Division (SLD) provides clinical testing for infectious disease agents in support of public health programs operated by the Department; veterinary, food, and dairy testing for the Department of Agriculture; forensic toxicology (drug) testing in support of the Department of Public Safety and local law enforcement agencies for the Implied Consent Act (DWI) and for autopsy investigation performed by the Office of the Medical Investigator; and chemical testing for environmental monitoring and enforcement of law and environmental regulations for the Environment Department. SLD also provides clinical testing for state and local hospitals for infectious diseases that are rare or novel in New Mexico and provides training and certification of law enforcement officers to perform breath alcohol testing within New Mexico. The activities of SLD in support of these state agencies are mandated in statute and are essential for the successful missions of the programs it supports in these agencies.

#### <u>Program Area Five (P005) - Behavioral Health Services:</u>

Director's Office Mental Health Substance Abuse

The Behavioral Health Services Division leads and oversees the provision of an integrated and comprehensive behavioral health prevention and treatment system to foster recovery and support the health and resilience of all New Mexicans by contracting for mental health and substance abuse services including detoxification; inpatient, short-and long-term residential treatment; intensive outpatient, outpatient follow-up and medication-assisted treatment; forensic evaluation; jail diversion; housing; supported employment; disaster training, Women's outreach; rural psychiatry; school-based behavioral health; prevention and early intervention of alcohol, tobacco, drug abuse; intravenous drug use outreach; local collaborative initiatives; and other related services.

The Facilities Program provides chemical dependency and rehabilitation services, adult psychiatric services, forensic services, long term care services, community based services, developmentally disabled community services and adolescent treatment and reintegration services to New Mexico residents in need of such services in seven facilities across New Mexico.

The purpose of the Developmental Disabilities Support Program is to administer a statewide system of community-based services and supports in order to improve the quality of life and to increase the independence and interdependence of individuals with developmental disabilities and children with or at risk for developmental delay or disability and their families.

Division of Health Improvement Criminal Caregiver's Screening

The mission of the Division of Health Improvement is to assure safety and quality care in New Mexico's health care facilities and community-based programs in collaboration with consumers, providers, advocates, and other agencies. DHI promotes quality improvement by conducting surveys and program reviews, taking appropriate action, identifying trends and patterns, and procuring training.

Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement 39 established standards for identifying a component unit through evaluation of the reporting entity and significance of certain related party transactions, defined as potential component units. Depending on the results of the GASB Statement 39 evaluation, financial information of related parties determined to be component units could be required to be included in the financial statements of the reporting entity.

In evaluating how to define the Department for financial reporting purposes, management has evaluated the Department's potential component units. The basic, but not the only, criteria for including a potential component unit as part of the reporting entity is the governing body's ability to exercise oversight responsibility. The most significant aspects of this responsibility are the selection of governing authority, the designation of management, the ability to significantly influence operations, and the accountability for fiscal matters. A second criteria used in evaluating potential component units is the scope of public service. Application of the criteria involves considering whether the activity benefits the Department. A third criteria used to evaluate potential component units for inclusion or exclusion from the reporting entity is the existence of special financing relationships, regardless of whether the Department is able to exercise oversight responsibilities. In the financial statements, discrete presentation entails reporting component unit financial data in a column separate from the financial data of the Department. Based on the application of these criteria, there are no component units included in these financial statements.

#### • Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Basis of Presentation

The financial statements of the State of New Mexico Department of Health conform to generally accepted accounting principles as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board.

The basic financial statements include both government-wide (based on the Department as a whole) and fund financial statements. While the previous model emphasized fund types (the total of all funds of a particular type), in the new model focus is on either the Department as a whole or major individual funds (within the fund financial statements). Both the government-wide and fund financial statements (within the basic financial statements) categorize primary activities as either governmental or business type, and exclude fiduciary activities. The Department is a single-purpose government entity and has no business type activities. In the government-wide Statement of Net Assets, the governmental activities are presented on a consolidated basis and are presented using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting, which incorporates long-term assets and receivable as well as long-term debt and obligations.

The government-wide Statement of Activities reflects both the gross and net cost-per-functional category, which is otherwise being supported by general government revenues. The Statement of Activities reduces gross expenses (including depreciation expense on capital assets) by related program revenues, operating and capital grants. The program revenues must be directly associated with the function. All internal activity has been removed from the financial statements.

The net cost by function is normally covered by general revenue. The Department operates eight programs and employs indirect and direct cost allocation as applicable in the financial statements.

• Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Basis of Presentation - continued

The government-wide focus is on the sustainability of the Department as an entity and the change in aggregate financial position resulting from the activities of the fiscal period.

Emphasis is on the major funds of the governmental category. The Department utilizes governmental funds, all of which are considered major funds, and fiduciary funds.

The governmental funds in the fund financial statements are presented on a current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. This is the manner in which these funds are normally budgeted. This presentation is deemed more appropriate to demonstrate legal and covenant compliance, to demonstrate the source and use of liquid resources, and to demonstrate how the Department's actual experience conforms to the budget or fiscal plan. Since the governmental fund statements are presented on a different measurement focus and basis of accounting than the government-wide statements governmental column, a reconciliation is presented on pages 18 and 21, which briefly explains the adjustment necessary to transform the fund based financial statements into the governmental column of the government-wide presentation. The Department's General Fund is a reverting fund.

The focus of the revised model is on the Department as a whole and the fund financial statements, including the major funds in the governmental category.

The financial transactions of the Department are recorded in the General Fund and its other funds, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of the funds are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund balance, revenues, expenditure or expenses, and other financing sources or uses. Government resources are allocated to, and accounted for, in the fund based upon the purpose for which they are to be spent and the means by which the spending activities are controlled.

The following describes the individual funds used by the Department:

#### **Governmental Funds**

All governmental fund types are accounted for on a spending or financial flow measurement focus. Only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on their balance sheets. Their reported fund balance (net current assets) is considered a measure of available spendable resources. Governmental fund operating statements present increases (revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (expenditures and other financing uses) in net current assets.

• Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Basis of Presentation - continued

#### Governmental Funds - continued

Accordingly, the statements present a summary of sources and uses of available spendable resources during a period. Due to their spending measurement focus, expenditure recognition for governmental fund types is limited to exclude amounts represented by non-current liabilities. Because they do not affect net current assets, such long-term amounts are not recognized as governmental fund type expenditures or fund liabilities. The following is a description of the funds of the Department:

#### **General Fund**

The Department of Health General Fund (Fund 06100) is the general operating fund of the Department. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund. The DOH General Fund is funded from appropriations from the State of New Mexico General Fund, special appropriations, Federal grants, and other revenue.

### **Special Revenue Funds**

DOH maintains four Special Revenue Funds to account for funding and appropriations that are restricted by law. Those funds are:

- County Supported Medicaid Fund (Fund 21900) This fund was created by Section 27-10-3 NMSA 1978 to institute or support primary health care services in underserved areas. These funds are restricted by law and do not revert in any fiscal year.
- Trauma System Fund (Fund 25700) This fund was created by Section 24-10E-2 NMSA 1978.
   The purpose of this fund was to provide funding to sustain existing trauma centers, support the development of new trauma centers and develop a statewide trauma system.
- Medicaid Waiver Match Fund (Fund 55800) This fund had been used for deposits and
  expenditures of Medicaid match funds, but active use of this fund was discontinued prior to the
  beginning of FY07. However, limited payroll payable amounts were posted to the fund during
  FY07. This activity was reversed through correcting journal entries.
- Emergency Medical Services Fund (Fund 75600) This fund was created by Section 24-10A-2 NMSA 1978. The purpose of this fund is to make money available to municipalities and counties for use in the establishment and enhancement of local emergency medical services, statewide emergency medical services and trauma services in order to reduce injury and loss of life.

• Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Basis of Presentation - continued

#### **Capital Projects Fund**

The DOH Capital Projects Fund (Fund 05900) is used to account for appropriations and expenditures relating to capital construction and improvement projects appropriated by the Legislature for long-term care and other facilities.

#### **Fiduciary Funds:**

#### Agency Funds

The Department also maintains two Agency Funds which are trust accounts that are held for clients. They are not available for use by the Department but are held for clients such as wards of the State and other state agencies. Accounting for financial activity in these funds utilizes the full accrual basis of accounting.

Birth & Death Certificate Fund (Fund 5020X) – This fund is used to account for revenue from birth and death certificates collected by Public Health Offices statewide and due by statute to the State General Fund and the Children, Youth, and Families Department.

ADMS Revolving Fund (Fund 5100X) – This fund is used for patient trust monies that are held on behalf of the residents of DOH's long-term and other care facilities.

#### Measurement Focus and Classification of Funds

Individual funds have been established as stipulated by legal provisions or by administrative direction. The funds presented are classified as follows:

Governmental Funds account for the acquisition, use, and balances of expendable financial resources and the related current liabilities. Governmental fund types use the flow of current financial resources measurement focus. Included in this classification is the General Fund, which is the Department's operating fund that accounts for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund; the four Special Revenue Funds described above; and the DOH Capital Projects Fund.

<u>Fiduciary Funds</u> account for assets held by the State in a trustee capacity or as an agent for individuals, other governmental units, or other funds. Included in this fund category are the Department's two Agency Funds described above. Agency funds are custodial in nature; thus, they do not measure results of operations. The two Agency Funds deal with patient trust funds for patients' checking, savings, and

burial accounts from which the patients buy personal items. These funds are not incorporated into the government-wide financial statements. Fiduciary funds use the accrual basis of accounting.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the Department's policy to use restricted resources first, and then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

#### Non-Current Governmental Assets/Liabilities

GASB Statement 34 eliminated the presentation of Account Groups but requires that these records be maintained and that the information incorporated into the government-wide Statement of Net Assets.

#### Basis of Accounting

Basis of accounting refers to the point at which revenues or expenditures are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements and relates to the timing of the measurements made, regardless of the measurement focus applied.

The government-wide financial statements are presented using the "economic resources" measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Under the accrual basis of accounting, revenue is recognized when earned and expenditures are recognized when the liability is incurred or economic asset used. Revenue, expenses, gains, losses, assets, and liabilities resulting from exchange-like transactions are recognized when the exchange takes place. Revenue, expenses, gains, losses, assets and liabilities resulting from non-exchange transactions are recognized in accordance with the requirements of GASB Statement 33. The governmental funds in the fund financial statements utilize the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under this method, revenue and other governmental fund financial resource increments are recognized in the accounting period in which they become susceptible to accrual — that is, when they become both measurable and available to finance expenditures of the current fiscal period; available meaning collectible within sixty (60) days or soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current period.

Contributions and other monies held by other state and local agencies are recorded as a receivable at the time the money is made available to the specific fund. All other revenues are recognized when they are received and are not susceptible to accrual.

Expenditures are recorded as liabilities when incurred. An exception to this general rule is that accumulated unpaid annual, compensatory and certain sick leave are not accrued as current liabilities but as non-current liabilities. Expenditures charged to federal programs are recorded utilizing the cost principles described by the various funding sources. When an expenditure is incurred for purposes for

#### • Basis of Accounting - continued

which both restricted and unrestricted net assets are available, the Department first uses restricted resources and then unrestricted resources.

When all applicable requirements are met, revenue is recognized when money is disbursed.

#### Reservations of Fund Balance

The accounting for the actual revenue and expenditures for budgetary purposes beginning July 1, 2004, were changed to the modified accrual basis of accounting from the budgetary non-accrual basis of accounting. In conjunction with this change in the basis of accounting, encumbrances are no longer reflected in the expenditures of the Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balance – Budget and Actual.

Reservations of fund balance are created to either (1) satisfy legal covenants that require that a portion of the fund balance be segregated or (2) identify the portion of the fund balance that is not appropriated for future expenditures. Under the guidance provided by Office of the State Auditor (State Audit Rule - 2.2.2.12 A(5)(a) and (b) NMAC 2005), encumbrances are to be reflected as a reservation of fund balance but are not to be reflected as restricted in the governmental wide financial statements. Specific reservations of fund balance accounts are summarized below:

- Reserved for special monies These reserves were created to restrict the use of all resources
  contributed to or earned by these funds through laws created by the State Legislature; and
- Reserved for inventories and prepaid expense This reserve was created to represent the portion
  of fund balance that is not available for expenditures because the Department expects to use the
  resources within the next budgetary period.

#### 2. ASSETS, LIABILITIES AND EQUITY

#### Cash and Investment Accounts

The Department maintains investment accounts with the Office of the State Treasurer and demand accounts at various commercial institutions statewide. Amounts on deposit with the commercial institutions are fully insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$100,000. Amounts over \$100,000 must be secured in accordance with 6-10-17 NMSA 1978.

The Department is required by statute to deposit any money received into the State Treasury. Balances maintained at the end of each day are pooled and invested by the State Treasurer in repurchase agreements. The State Treasurer issues separate financial statements, which disclose the collateral pledged to secure these deposits, the categories of risk involved, and the market value of purchased

investments, which may differ from the cash deposited by the Department (refer to Schedule 3 – Pledged Collateral and Schedule 2 – Schedule of Individual Deposit Accounts. Custodial credit risk is the risk that, in the event of failure of the counterparty, the Department will not be able to recover the value of its cash that is in the possession of an outside party. The Department's cash balances are not exposed to custodial credit risk. All are fully collateralized and the collateral is held in the Department's name.

#### • Inventory and Prepaid Items

Inventory is valued at cost using the first-in, first-out method. Inventory consists of expendable supplies held for consumption and pharmaceuticals held for patient use at the medical and long-term facilities.

Certain payments to vendors reflect costs applicable to future accounting periods and are recorded as prepaid items. In addition, employee travel advances are recorded as pre-paid items until travel is completed and actual amounts due are reconciled and paid.

#### Capital Assets

Property, buildings, and equipment purchased or acquired at a value of \$1,000 or greater prior to July 1, 2005 is capitalized. Capital Assets acquired after June 30, 2005, are only capitalized if the acquisition amount was \$5,000 or more. Assets are carried at historical cost or estimated historical cost. Contributed assets are recorded at fair market value as of the date received. Additions, improvements, and other capital outlays that significantly extend the useful live of an asset are capitalized. Other costs incurred for repairs and maintenance are expensed when incurred. Depreciation on all assets, including software, is provided on the straight-line basis over the following estimated useful lives with no salvage value:

Effective July 1, 2005, the State changed the value for which an asset may be capitalized from \$1,000 to \$5,000. The Department of Health concurred with this policy change and is currently only capitalizing those items acquired after June 30, 2005, costing \$5,000 or more. Those assets acquired and capitalized prior to July 1, 2005 that have not been fully depreciated are still being depreciated under the previous policy.

#### 2. ASSETS, LIABILITIES AND EQUITY - continued

#### Capital Assets - continued

In addition to the assets owned by the Department, DOH utilizes buildings, vehicles, furniture and equipment owned by the Property Control Division of the State of New Mexico General Services Department. These assets and the related depreciation expense are not included in the accompanying financial statements. Although GASB Statement 34 requires the recording and depreciation of infrastructure assets, such as roads, bridges, etc., the Department does not own any infrastructure assets. There is no debt related to the Department's capital assets.

#### Compensated Absences

Vacation time, compensatory time, and sick time are reported as liabilities in the government-wide financial statements, with expenses being reported during the period that leave is accrued. It is the policy of the Department to permit employees to accumulate earned but unused vacation and sick pay benefits. The fund financial statements report expenditures during the period that employees are actually paid, or when compensated absences are liquidated with expendable financial resources from the operational portion of state General Fund appropriations. These expenditures are paid from the Department's General Operating Fund (Fund 06100).

Qualified employees are entitled to accumulate vacation leave according to a graduated schedule of 80 to 160 hours per year, depending upon the length of service and the employee's hire date. A maximum of thirty working days (240 hours) of such accumulated annual leave may be carried forward into the beginning of the calendar year and any excess is lost.

When employees terminate, they are compensated for accumulated unpaid annual leave as of the date of termination, up to a maximum of thirty days.

Qualified employees are entitled to accumulate sick leave at the rate of one day for each calendar month of service. There is no limit to the amount of sick leave which an employee may accumulate. Once per fiscal year, in either January or July, employees may elect to be paid for 50% of accrued sick leave in excess of 600 hours, up to 720 hours, not to exceed 120 hours (60 hours maximum can be paid). Sick leave balances related to general fund operations in excess of 600, but not more than 1,000, hours have been recorded at 50% of the employee's hourly rate in the general fund.

Compensatory time may be granted by the Department to employees when overtime is needed. Employees not exempt from the FLSA may accrue up to 240 hours at the rate of one-and-a-half (1½) hours for each hour worked. The time will either be paid or taken as time off at the employee's election unless notified by the employer that it can only be taken as compensatory time off.

#### 2. ASSETS, LIABILITIES AND EQUITY - continued

#### Compensated Absences - continued

FSLA-exempt employees may only accrue up to 80 hours a year at a rate of one (1.0) times the hours worked. The exception is supervisory nurses who accrue their hours at the rate of one-and-a-half the normal rate (1½). Department of Health policy permits exempt employees to elect to be reimbursed by cash or take time off unless notified by the employer that it will only be taken as compensatory time off.

In addition to the basic current hourly pay rate, the accrual of compensated absences includes the Department's estimated costs of payroll taxes.

#### Net Assets

The government-wide financial statements utilize a net asset presentation. Net assets are categorized as investment in capital assets less outstanding liquid assets (net of related debt), restricted and unrestricted.

Investment in Capital Assets (net of related debt) - Reflects the portion of net assets which are associated with non-liquid, capital assets less outstanding capital asset related debt. The net related debt is the debt less the outstanding liquid assets and any associated unamortized cost. The Department has no debt related to capital assets.

**Restricted Assets** – Reflects the value of liquid assets generated from revenue but not bond proceeds which have third-party (statutory, bond covenant or granting agency) limitations on their use. See Note 5 for details on the restricted cash associated with the restricted net assets.

Unrestricted Assets – Represents assets that do not have third-party limitations on their use.

#### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### Intra-fund Activity

Intra-fund receivables or payables at year-end are netted as part of the reconciliation to the governmental-wide financial statements.

#### 3. STEWARDSHIP, COMPLIANCE AND ACCOUNTABILITY

#### Budgetary Data

The State Legislature makes annual appropriations to the Department. Legal compliance is monitored through the establishment of an annual operating budget for the Department that is reviewed and approved by the State Department of Finance and Administration.

The following are the procedures followed in establishing the budgetary data presented in the financial statements:

- 1. The Department submits an annual appropriation request (budget) to the New Mexico Legislature and the Department of Finance and Administration for the fiscal year commencing the following July 1. The State Legislature must approve the appropriate funds before an operating budget can be legally approved.
- 2. The expenditures and encumbrances of each category may not legally exceed the budget for that category. Budgets are controlled at the four "category" levels personal services and employee benefits, professional services, other expenditures, and other financing uses.
- 3. All adjustments to the budget must be submitted to and approved by the Department of Finance and Administration in the form of budget adjustment requests.
- 4. Per the General Appropriation Act, Laws of 2006, Chapter 109, Section 3, Subsections O and N, the budgetary basis is modified accrual. However, there is a statutory exception. The budget is adopted on the modified accrual basis of accounting except for accounts payable accrued at the end of the fiscal year that do not get paid by the statutory deadline per Section 6-10-4 NMSA 1978. Those accounts payable that do not get paid timely must be paid out of the next year's budget.
- 5. Unless otherwise specified in law (either appropriations acts or statutory law), appropriations to the Department are designated as "reverting" by the New Mexico State Legislature and, therefore, unencumbered balances in state agency accounts remaining at the end of the fiscal year from appropriations made from the State General Fund revert to the State General Fund.

#### Revenue Recognition

State General Fund appropriations are recognized in the year the appropriation is made. Receivables are recognized as revenue in the year the transfers for services which gave rise to the receivable are provided.

#### 3. STEWARDSHIP, COMPLIANCE AND ACCOUNTABILITY - continued

#### • Program Revenue

Program revenue includes program-specific operating grants from federal sources or other state agencies. No allocation of indirect expenses is made by function as costs not accounted for by activity are considered immaterial.

**Federal Grants** – Revenue is recognized when appropriate expenditures are incurred or accrued by the Department.

Patient Service Revenue and Contractual Adjustments – Patient services revenue is recorded at the established rates of the medical facilities and hospitals but is reduced by "contractual adjustments" to recognize allowances for charity services, provisions for uncollectible accounts, and charges that otherwise exceed payments from Medicare, Medicaid, private, or other resources. Medicare and Medicaid payments accounted for approximately 90% of net patient service revenues received in 2007.

Amounts receivable and payable under reimbursement from "third-party payor" agreements, primarily Medicare and Medicaid, are subject to examination and retroactive adjustment by a third-party payor. Provisions for estimated retroactive adjustments by third-party payors are provided in the period the related services are rendered. Any difference between the amounts accrued and settled is reflected in operations in the year of settlement.

The facilities are paid for substantially all inpatient services rendered to Medicaid and/or Medicare program beneficiaries under prospectively determined rates per client. Accordingly, to the extent that costs incurred (exclusive of other defined capital costs and certain education costs of the rehabilitation centers which continue to be paid on the basis of reasonable costs) for services rendered to Medicare and Medicaid patients exceed the determined payment rates, those costs are not recoverable from the Medicare and Medicaid programs or their beneficiaries. The facilities' payment classification of patients under the prospective system is subject to review based on validation audits by third parties.

#### Retirement Plans

Public Employees Retirement Association (PERA)

Plan Description. Substantially all of the Department's full-time employees participate in a public employee retirement system authorized under the Public Employee's Retirement Association Act

(PERA) (Chapter 10, Article 11, NMSA 1978). The PERA is the administrator of the plan, which is a cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit retirement plan. The plan provides for retirement, disability benefits, survivor benefits and cost-of-living adjustments to plan members and beneficiaries. PERA issues a separate, publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information.

Funding Policy. Plan members are required to contribute 7.42% of their gross salary to the plan, while the Department is required to contribute 16.59% of the gross salary. The contribution requirements of plan members and the Department are established under Chapter 10, Article 11 NMSA 1978. The requirements may be amended by acts of the legislature. The Department's contributions to PERA for the years ending June 30, 2007, 2006, and 2005 were \$21,035,552, \$20,321,350, and \$19,843,174, respectively, equal to the amount of the required contributions for each year.

#### **Educational Retirement Act (ERA)**

**Plan Description.** Some of the Department's full-time employees participate in a public employee retirement system authorized under the Educational Retirement Act (ERA) (Chapter 22, Article 11 NMSA 1978). The ERA is the administrator of the plan, which is a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit retirement plan. The plan provides for retirement, disability benefits, survivor benefits, and cost-of-living adjustments to plan members and beneficiaries. ERA issues a separate, publicly available financial statements and required supplementary information.

Funding Policy. Plan members are required to contribute 7.75% of their gross salary to the plan, while the Department is required to contribute 10.15% of the gross salary. The contribution requirements of plan members and the Department are established under Chapter 22, Article 11 NMSA 1978. The requirements may be amended by acts of the Legislature. The Department's contribution to ERA for the years ending June 30, 2007 was \$36,056.

#### **Deferred Compensation**

The State of New Mexico offers state, local government and school district employees a deferred compensation plan created in accordance with the Internal Revenue Code, Section 457. The plan is available to all state employees and those local government and school district employees whose employers have elected to participate in the plan. The plan permits participants to defer a portion of

their salary until future years. The deferred compensation is not available to employees until termination, retirement, death, or unforeseeable emergency.

All amounts of compensation deferred under the plan, all property and rights purchased with those amounts, and all income attributable to those amounts, property, or rights are the property of the participant.

Some employees of the Department elect to make contributions to the Deferred Compensation Plan. Neither the Department nor the State of New Mexico makes any contributions to the Deferred Compensation Plan. All contributions withheld from participants are paid to PERA, which administers the plan.

#### **Post-Employment Benefits**

#### Retiree Health Care Act (RHCA)

The Retiree Health Care Act (RHCA) (10-7C-1 to 10-7C-16, NMSA 1978) provides comprehensive core group health insurance for persons who have retired from certain public service in New Mexico. The purpose is to provide eligible retirees, their spouses, and surviving spouses and dependents with health insurance consisting of a plan, or optional plans, of benefits that can be purchased by funds flowing into the Retiree Health Care Fund and by co-payments of eligible retirees.

Monies flow to the Retiree Health Care Fund on a "pay-as-you-go" basis from eligible employers and eligible retirees. Eligible employers consist of institutions of higher education, school districts, and other entities participating in the public school insurance authority and state agencies, state courts, magistrate courts, municipalities and counties, which are affiliated under or covered by the Education Retirement Act, the Magistrate Retirement Act or the Public Employees Retirement Act.

Eligible retirees are: (1) retirees who make contributions to the fund for at least five years prior to retirement and whose eligible employer during this time made contributions as a participant under the Retiree Health Care Act (RHCA) on the persons' behalf, unless that person retires before the employers RHCA effective date in which event, the time period for employees and employer contributions shall become the period of time between the employer's effective date and the date of retirement; or (2) retirees defined by the act who retired prior to July 1, 1990, as well as former state legislators who served at least two years.

#### Retiree Health Care Act (RHCA) - continued

Each participating employee's annual salary. Each participating employee contributes to the fund an employee's contribution equal to 0.65% of the employees' salary. For the medical plus basic life plan and an additional participation fee of five dollars (\$5.00) if the eligible participant retired prior to the employer's RHCA effective date or is a former legislator. Participants may also enroll in optional plans of coverage.

Contributions from participating employers and participating employees become the property of the Retiree Health Care Fund and are not refundable under any circumstances, including termination of employment or termination of the participating employer's operation or participation in the RHCA. The employer, employee, and retiree contributions are required to be remitted to the Retiree Health Care Authority on a monthly basis.

The Retiree Health Care Authority issues a separate, publicly available audited financial report that includes post employment benefit expenditures of premiums and claims paid, participant contributions (employer, employee, and retiree), and net expenditures for the fiscal year. The report also includes the approximate number of retirees participating in the plan.

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2007, the Department remitted \$1,633,214 in employer contributions and \$816,607 in employee contributions. In fiscal year ended June 30, 2006 the amounts remitted were \$1,597,452 in employer contributions and \$798,726 in employee contributions.

The Department will implement GASB 45, Accounting and Financial Reporting by Employers for Postemployment Benefits Other than Pension, in 2008. The impact of the implementation of the new GASB standard is unknown.

#### **Accounting for Termination Benefits**

Except for the benefits that are provided under the employees' annual leave, sick leave and prepaid post-retirement insurance benefits that are disclosed in the notes above and recorded as a liability in the Governmental-Wide Financial Statements, no early retirement or post-retirement termination benefits occurred in the fiscal year ending June 30, 2007.

#### 4. OTHER INFORMATION - continued

#### Contingencies

The Department, as a State Agency defined in the New Mexico Tort Claims Act, is insured through the Risk Management Division of the General Services Department of the State of New Mexico. The Risk Management Division pays annual premiums for coverage provided in the following areas:

- Liability and civil rights protection for claims made by others against the State;
- Coverage to protect the State of New Mexico's property and assets; and
- Fringe benefit coverage for State of New Mexico employees.

In the case of civil actions or claims against the Department for financial damages, the Department's certificate of insurance with Risk Management does not cover civil rights claims for back wages but does cover civil rights claims for other compensatory damages.

#### • Subsequent Events

The Department received invoices after year-end from the New Mexico Human Services Department (HSD) for the Developmentally Disabled Waiver Program for FY06 and other prior years. The invoices were for the state matching portion that is paid by the Department to HSD as the bills are paid by Medicaid. The invoices are for several prior years. Under state law (6-10-4 B. NMSA 1978), "Appropriations to the human services department for Medicaid payments may be expended by that department for Medicaid obligations for prior fiscal years." DOH expenditures under the Medicaid Waiver program for the current fiscal year and for prior fiscal years are paid to HSD under a Joint Powers agreement specifically for the Medicaid Waiver many months after the fiscal year ends (e.g., for FY07, bills are received up to 18 months after the close of the fiscal year).

#### Risk Management

The Department is exposed to various risks of loss related to tort, theft of, damage to, or destruction of assets, errors or omissions, employer obligations and natural disasters for which the Department carries insurance (Workers Compensation, Unemployment Compensation, Employee Liability, Transportation Property and Bond Premium) with the State of New Mexico Risk Management Division (RMD) of the General Services Department. Insurance premiums are allocated to and paid by all budgeted activities within the general fund. During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2007, total insurance premiums paid to the Risk Management Division were \$4,140,272.

#### 5. RESTRICTED CASH

The restricted cash balances as disclosed in the financial statements are funds that are restricted by enabling legislation (statute) or are bond proceeds that are reserved for capital projects.

#### 11. SPECIAL STATE APPROPRIATIONS / DEFERRED REVENUE - continued

The revenue recognition policies for special state appropriations are such that when monies are received, they are classified as deferred revenue until wholly or partially spent.

Most of the time, monies relating to special state appropriations are received at the beginning of the fiscal year or during the year. As expenditures occur, the amounts originally posted as deferred revenue are reclassified as earned revenue.

Most, if not all, special appropriations contain legislative guidelines to ensure the money is being spent in concert with its intended purpose. There may also be time limitations on the period in which the money may be spent. For instance, some special appropriations contain language that mandate that any unspent, unencumbered balance must revert to the general fund by a specified date.

#### 12. RESERVED FUND BALANCE

Found in the equity section of the balance sheet, the reserved fund balance includes prepaid postage and inventory.

#### 13. FUNDS HELD IN TRUST BY OTHERS

The Department is an income beneficiary of a portion of the State Permanent Fund designated specifically for the Behavioral Health Institute in Las Vegas, and receives 2/7 of the income from investments in the State Permanent Fund derived from the Charitable, Penal and Reformatory Act. The trust principal is managed by the State Investment Council and, because the funds are not controlled by the Department, they are not reflected in the accompanying financial statements.

### 17. CASH OVERDRAFT- RECLASSIFICATION

The reported cash overdraft for Fund 06100 includes \$834,288 in restricted cash; the actual cash overdraft for Fund 06100 at June 30 totaled \$8,022,331. Additionally, the Department received \$8,685,800 in FY07 Tobacco Settlement Revenue from the Department of Finance & Administration on July 27, 2007, which, had it been received in FY07, would have eliminated the actual cash overdraft in Fund 06100. The cash overdraft has been reclassified as a due to other agency liability, the funding agency for the overdraft was NM State Treasurers Office.

#### 18. INTERFUND BALANCES

The interfund balances are a result of reimbursements owed between the funds. The purpose is related to payroll expenses. The balances are expected to be paid within one year.

### 19. RETIREMENT PLANS

### Public Employees Retirement Association (PERA)

#### Plan Description

Substantially all of the Department's full-time employees participate in a public employee retirement system authorized under the Public Employee's Retirement Association Act (PERA) (Chapter 10, Article11 NMSA 1978). The PERA is the administrator of the plan, which is a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit retirement plan. The plan provides for retirement, disability benefits, survivor benefits and cost-of-living adjustments to plan members and beneficiaries. PERA issues a separate, publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. That report may be obtained by writing to PERA, P.O. Box 2123, Santa Fe, NM 87503-2123.

### Funding Policy

Plan members are required to contribute 7.42% of their gross salary. The Department is required to contribute 16.59% of the gross salary. The contribution requirements of plan members and the Department are established under Chapter 10, Article 11 NMSA 1978. The requirements may be amended by acts of the legislature. The Department's contributions to PERA for the years ending June 30, 2007, 2006 and 2005 were \$21,035,552, \$20,321,350 and \$19,843,174, respectively, equal to the amount of the required contributions for each year.

### 19. RETIREMENT PLANS - continued

### Educational Retirement Act (ERA)

### • Plan Description

Some of the Department's full-time employees participate in a public employee retirement system authorized under the Educational Retirement Act (ERA) (Chapter 22, Article 11 NMSA 1978). The ERA is the administrator of the plan, which is a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit retirement plan. The plan provides for retirement, disability benefits, survivor benefits and cost-of-living adjustments to plan members and beneficiaries. ERA issues a separate, publicly available financial statements and required supplementary information. That report may be obtained by writing to ERA, P.O. Box 26129, Santa Fe, NM 87502.

### Funding Policy

Plan members are required to contribute 7.6% of their gross salary. The Department is required to contribute 8.65% of the gross salary. The contribution requirements of plan members and the Department are established under Chapter 22, Article 11 NMSA 1978. The requirements may be amended by acts of the legislature. The Department's contributions to ERA for the years ending June 30, 2007 and 2006 were \$36,056 and \$166,034, respectively.

### 20. DEFERRED COMPENSATION

The State of New Mexico offers state, local government and school district employees a deferred compensation plan created in accordance with the Internal Revenue Code, Section 457. The plan is available to all state employees and those local government and school district employees whose employers have elected to participate in the plan. The plan permits participants to defer a portion of their salary until future years. The deferred compensation is not available to employees until termination, retirement, death or unforeseeable emergency.

All amounts of compensation deferred under the plan, all property and rights purchased with those amounts, and all income attributable to those amounts, property, or rights are the property of the participant.

Employees of the Department are making contributions to the Deferred Compensation Plan. Neither the Office nor the State of New Mexico makes any contributions to the Deferred Compensation Plan. All contributions withheld from participants by the Office have been paid to PERA who administers the plan.

### 21. POST-EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

### • Retiree Health Care Act (RHCA)

The Retiree Health Care Act (RHCA) (10-7C-1 to 10-7C-16, NMSA 1978) provides comprehensive core group health insurance for persons who have retired from certain public service in New Mexico. The purpose is to provide eligible retirees, their spouses, and surviving spouses and dependents with health insurance consisting of a plan, or optional plans, of benefits that can be purchased by funds flowing into the Retiree Health Care Fund and by co-payments of eligible retirees.

Monies flow to the Retiree Health Care Fund on a "pay-as-you-go" basis from eligible employers and eligible retirees. Eligible employers consist of institutions of higher education, school districts, or other entities participating in the public school insurance authority and state agencies, state courts, magistrate courts, municipalities or counties, which are affiliated under or covered by the Education Retirement Act, the Magistrate Retirement Act or the Public Employees Retirement Act.

Eligible retirees are: (1) retirees who make contributions to the fund for at least five years prior to retirement and whose eligible employer during this time made contributions as a participant in the Retiree Health Care Act (NMRHCA) on the persons' behalf, unless that person retires before the employers NMRHCA effective date in which event, the time period for employees and employer contributions shall become the period of time between the employer's effective date and the date of retirement; or (2) retirees defined by the act who retired prior to July 1, 1990 as well as former state legislators who served at least two years.

Each participating employer makes employee contributions to the fund in the amount of 1.3% of each participating employee's annual salary. Each participating employee contributes to the fund an employee's contribution equal to 0.65% of the employees' salary. For the medical plus basic life plan and an additional participation fee of five dollars (\$5.00) if the eligible participant retired prior to the employer's NMRHCA effective date or is a former legislator. Participants may also enroll in optional plans of coverage.

Contributions from participating employers and participating employees become the property of the Retiree Health Care Fund and are not refundable under any circumstances, including termination of employment or termination of the participating employer's operation or participation in the NMRHCA. The employer, employee, and retiree contributions are required to be remitted to the Retiree Health Care Authority on a monthly basis.

The Retiree Health Care Authority issues a separate, publicly available audited financial report that includes post employment benefit expenditures of premiums and claims paid, participant contributions (employer, employee, and retiree), and net expenditures for the fiscal year. The report also includes the

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2007, the Department remitted \$816,608 in employer contributions and \$1,633,216 in employee contributions. In fiscal year ended June 30, 2006 the amounts remitted were \$1,597,452 in employer contributions and \$798,726 in employee contributions.

### Accounting for Termination Benefits

The Department had no early retirement or post-retirement termination benefits occurred in the fiscal year ending June 30, 2007.

#### 22. CONTINGENCIES

The Department, as a State Agency defined in the New Mexico Tort Claims Act, is insured through the Risk Management Division of the General Services Department of the State of New Mexico. The Office of Risk Management Division pays annual premiums for coverage provided in the following areas:

- 1. Liability and civil rights protection for claims made by others against the State of New Mexico,
- Coverage to protect the State of New Mexico's property and assets; and
- 3. Fringe benefit coverage for State of New Mexico employees.

In the case of civil actions or claims against the Department for financial damages, the Department's certificate of insurance with Risk Management does not cover civil rights claims for back wages but does cover civil rights claims for other compensatory damages.

The Department of Health is engaged in litigation for declaratory and injunctive relief to obtain Developmental Disabilities and Disabled and Elderly home and community-based Medicaid waiver services for three individual plaintiffs and other similarly situated persons. The trial court has ruled against the defendants on their main defenses. Even though the Department has lost this decision, in similar litigation in other jurisdictions in the United States, the courts' decisions are holding that states have limited or lack of liability in this area. In the event this decision is reversed, the plaintiffs could conceivably take appeals all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court. If the U.S. Supreme Court finds for the plaintiffs, the Department could be ordered to pay fees and costs associated with the decision as well as provide services to developmentally disabled and other disabled persons who are on waiting lists for services under an injunction. The range of potential loss cannot be reasonably estimated at this time.

#### 22. CONTINGENCIES - continued

The Department of Health is involved in a tort claim suit for damages against the Department arising from plaintiff's actions in picking up bio-hazardous waste. The potential loss cannot be reasonably estimated at this time.

The Department of Health is involved in a law suit where the plaintiff is alleging that, while a patient at the New Mexico Behavior Health Institute in Las Vegas, he was physically and sexually assaulted, possibly by another patient. The Department has a potential loss in this case not to exceed \$60,000.

### 23. RISK MANAGEMENT

The Department is exposed to various risks of loss related to tort, theft of, damage to, or destruction of assets, errors or omissions, employer obligations and natural disasters for which the Department carries insurance (Workers Compensation, Unemployment Compensation, Employee Liability, Transportation Property and Bond Premium) with the State of New Mexico Risk Management Division (RMD) of the General Services Department. Insurance premiums are allocated to and paid by all budgeted activities within the general fund. During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2007, total insurance premiums paid to the Risk Management Division were \$4,187,151.

#### 24. DEFICIT FUND BALANCE

Fund 55800 ended fiscal year 2007 with a fund balance deficit of \$3,759,002. The Department's management has addressed the issue by eliminating Fund 55800 in fiscal year 2008. The fund was used for accounting purposes by the Department. The Department attempted to cease all financial activity for Fund 55800 during FY07, but the fund did experience financial activity due to the Department of Finance & Administration posting certain payroll accounts payable entries to the fund during the first year of SHARE. The fund has not been used as the "Medicaid Waiver Match Fund" since before June 30, 2006, when all Medicaid Waiver match activity was moved to Fund 06100. Journal entries have been prepared and entered for FY08 to transfer all of the assets, liabilities, and fund balance account balances to Fund 06100, and the Department will request that DFA inactivate Fund 55800 and remove it from the Department's chart of accounts upon posting of the journal entries by DFA.

### 25. PRIOR YEAR NET ASSET RESTATEMENT

In the 2006 financial statements, the reconciliation of the balance sheet to the statement of net assets included two reconciling items for \$116,791 and \$3,036,015 that accrued severance tax draw downs and revenue based on the difference between modified accrual and full accrual. The methodology used to determine these amounts was changed in 2007 and has resulted in the restatement. The net assets for the fiscal year ended 2006 are restated to \$31,900,493 from \$35,053,299.

We also have audited the financial statements of each of the Department's fiduciary funds as presented in the individual fund financial statements, the major capital project fund and the program budget comparisons of the Department presented as supplementary information as of and for the year ended June 30, 2007, and have issued our report thereon dated July 10, 2008. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

### Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Department's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our audit procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Department's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Department's internal control over financial reporting.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or a combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the Department's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process or report financial data reliably in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the Department's financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the Department's internal control. We consider the following items to be significant deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting in accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as items: 07-1 to 07-16 and 06-6.

A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that results in more than a remote likelihood that a material misstatement of the financial statements will not be prevented or detected by the Department's internal control.

Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section, and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in the internal control over financial reporting that might be significant deficiencies and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. However, as discussed above, we identified certain deficentcies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be significant deficeincies, we consider item 07-13 to be a material weakness.

## Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Department's basic financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

The Department's responses to the findings identified in our audit are described in the accompanying schedule of findings and responses. We did not audit the Department's response and, accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management, others within the Department, the audit committee, the State Auditor, the New Mexico Legislature, the Department of Finance and Administration, and applicable federal grantors, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

A control deficiency the entity's internal control over compliance exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the entity's ability to administer a federal program such that there is more than a remote likelihood that noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control. We consider the deficiencies in internal control over compliance described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as 07-2 through 07-5, 07-15 and 06-1 to be significant deficiencies.

## Internal Control over Compliance - continued

A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that results in more than a remote likelihood that material noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control. Of the significant deficiencies in internal control over compliance described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs, none of the items are considered to be material weaknesses.

Our consideration of the internal control over compliance was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over compliance that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above.

The Department's responses to the findings identified in our audit are described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs. We did not audit the Department's responses and, accordingly, we express no opinion on them.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management, the Office of the State Auditor, the New Mexico Legislature, the Department of Finance and Administration and federal award agencies and pass-through entities, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

Eighteen significant deficiencies relating to the audit of the financial statements are reported in the Report on Internal Control over Financial Reporting and on Compliance and Other Matters Based on an Audit of Financial Statements Performed in Accordance with Government Auditing Standards, one of which is considered to be a material weakness.
- 3. There was one instance of noncompliance material to the financial statements disclosed during the audit of the Department.
- 4. Six significant deficiencies were disclosed during the audit of the major federal award programs as reported in the Report on Compliance with the Requirements Applicable to Each Major Program and Internal Control over Compliance in Accordance with OMB Circular A-133. Of these deficiencies, none are considered to be material weaknesses.
- 5. The auditors' report on compliance for the major federal award programs for the Department expresses an qualified opinion.
- 6. Audit findings that are required to be reported in accordance with Section 510(a) of OMB Circular A-133 are reported in this Schedule.

- 8. The threshold for distinguishing Types A and B programs was \$3,000,000.
- 9. The Department was not determined to be a low-risk auditee.

### B. FINDINGS - FINANCIAL STATEMENT AUDIT

#### 07-1 PERSONNEL AND PAYROLL - MISSING DATA

**Condition:** - Four out of forty personnel files did not contain I-9 forms.

- Nine out of forty personnel files did not contain W-4 forms.
- Of the forty employees sampled, fifteen were required to have background checks. Of those fifteen, eight of the files did not have background check documentation in their files.

Criteria: The Department is required to maintain the following in the employee personnel files:

- Each employee's file should have a completed I-9 form in his or her file.
- Each employee's file should have a completed and updated W-4 form in his or her file.
- Employees who have direct interaction with patients are required to have a background check in accordance with the Caregivers Criminal History Screening Act, 29-17-5 NMSA 1978.

Cause: Based on the criteria listed above, the Department does not have effective procedures in place to obtain the required personnel and payroll information.

Effect:

- The Department is not in compliance with U.S laws and immigration regulations, which state that every employer must verify if an employee is eligible to work within the U.S.
- The Department is not in compliance with Employment Tax Regulations, which states that every employee must furnish to the employer a signed withholding exemption certificate on or before the beginning of employment.
- If background checks are not done on employees and/or files are not maintained, there is
  potential for harm to be done to patients by employees who would not have passed
  screening.

**Recommendation:** We recommend stronger internal control procedures to ensure pertinent information is obtained and retained in the employees' files.

Management's Response: The Department has conducted an audit of all personnel files maintained by the Human Resources Bureau in the Runnells Building in Santa Fe and identified those with missing W-4 and I-9 documents. DOH has contacted the Program Areas responsible for submitting those documents and will require them to submit the missing documentation. In addition, DOH will schedule on-site audits of personnel files for all DOH facilities to be completed within 30 days and will begin conducting on-site personnel file audits at all facilities on at least a quarterly basis.

### B. FINDINGS - FINANCIAL STATEMENT AUDIT - continued

#### 07-2 STATISTICAL REPORTS FILING – UNTIMELY FILING

**Condition:** The statistical reports of HIV antibody counseling and testing activities were not filed in a timely manner by the Department. In January, 2008, the reports were filed for the previous six quarters.

Criteria: One of the requirements for the HIV Prevention Activities grant (CFDA #93.940) is that statistical reports of HIV antibody counseling and testing activities are required 45 days after the end of each quarter.

Cause: Based on the criteria listed above, the Department does not have effective procedures in place to file the statistical reports by the due date.

Effect: Non-compliance with federal awarding agencies' requirements, potential for fiscal sanctions, or funding termination.

**Recommendation:** We recommend that the reports be filed in a timely manner within the required 45 day period.

Management's Response: Under the Center for Disease Control (CDC) HIV Prevention Grant, data on counseling and testing activities is reported electronically 45 days after the end of each calendar quarter. During FY07, CDC was transitioning to the new web-based Program Evaluation and Monitoring System that was intended to have the capacity to report this data. Due to multiple delays in system implementation and DOH program staff turnover, none of the program's staff during FY06 had the skills and knowledge necessary to submit data using the old system. An extension of the deadline was requested and granted during FY07, allowing the program to receive technical assistance and complete all reporting by January 2008. Training and participation in the new system during FY08 is expected to ensure full compliance for FY08.

#### 07-3 FEDERAL CASH TRANSACTIONS REPORT FILING – UNTIMELY FILING

**Condition:** The Federal Cash Transactions Report (PSC 272) was not filed timely for the first quarter of FY07.

**Criteria:** The Department is required to file the Federal Cash Transactions Report (PSC 272) quarterly so as to alert the federal awarding agency of the cash positions for the various grants and to request funding for any deficits (OMB A-133, Compliance Supplement).

#### B. FINDINGS - FINANCIAL STATEMENT AUDIT - continued

# 07-3 FEDERAL CASH TRANSACTIONS REPORT FILING - UNTIMELY FILING - continued

Cause: Lack of effective procedures.

Effect: Non-compliance with reporting requirements and cash management issues. The deficits for the various grants must be made up, and funds are used from the general fund to make up for not getting timely funding from the federal government.

**Recommendation:** We recommend that the reports be filed quarterly so as to meet reporting requirements and to improve cash management.

Management's Response: The late filing was due to initial difficulties associated with the posting of federal grant expenditures during the implementation of the SHARE accounting system and the extended amounts of time necessary to implement the SHARE Grants Module, which recorded all federal expenditures. The Department is currently filing all 272 reports quarterly within required timeframes.

#### 07-4 HIGH RISK VENDORS – LACK OF COMPLIANCE INVESTIGATIONS

Condition: The Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program failed to meet the high risk vendor requirement of auditing a least five percent of the total vendor population or at least 12 of the 239 vendors.

Criteria: A State agency operating a retail food delivery system must conduct compliance investigations, which consist of inventory audits and/or compliance buys on a minimum of five percent of the vendors authorized as of October 1 of each year. A State agency must conduct compliance investigations on its high-risk vendors up to the five percent minimum. High-risk vendors are identified at least once annually using criteria developed by FNS and/or other statistically based criteria developed by the State agency and approved by FNS. If the number of high-risk vendors exceeds five percent of the total, then the State agency must prioritize vendors for investigative purposes based on their potential for noncompliance and/or loss. If the number of high-risk vendors falls short of five percent of the total, the State agency must randomly select enough additional vendors to meet the five percent requirement.

Cause: Lack of effective procedures. Personnel interviewed were unaware of the testing requirements established by the compliance supplement for the WIC program.

Effect: An internal control deficiency over compliance with high risk vendor requirements.

# 07-4 HIGH RISK VENDORS – LACK OF COMPLIANCE INVESTIGATIONS - continued

**Recommendation:** We recommend stronger internal control procedures through education and instruction on pertinent information with regard to the vendor requirements provided in the compliance supplement.

**Management's Response:** The WIC Vendor Manager reviewed CFR 246.12 and has established the following policy regarding WIC vendor compliance investigations.

Identification of high-risk vendors: Currently, the New Mexico WIC Program identifies high risk vendors by using the criteria set forth in the 2008 New Mexico WIC state plan. This data will be monitored annually to determine the number of high-risk vendors participating in the New Mexico WIC Program. In addition, the WIC Program will establish high-risk vendor criteria for EBT and reports that identify high-risk EBT vendors. This criterion will be submitted to USDA for approval in the 2009 WIC state plan. EBT high risk identification reports include:

- High Weighted Average Price
- Vendor Redeemed versus Shelf Price Comparison
- Percentages of WIC Sales Compared with Total Food Sales and Food Stamp Sales
- Vendor Increases or Decreases in WIC Sales Volume
- Vendor Settlement
- Sequential Card Numbers and Lane Tracking

The New Mexico WIC Program authorizes 239 New Mexico Vendors; therefore, at least 12 vendors per year must be audited. Vendors will be classified as high risk, potential high risk or non risk. If the identified high risk vendors exceed the 5% minimum requirement, the compliance investigations will be prioritized. If the number of high-risk vendors falls short of five percent of the total, the New Mexico WIC Program will randomly select enough additional vendors to meet the five percent requirement. This will be completed by October 1st of each year.

## B. FINDINGS - FINANCIAL STATEMENT AUDIT - continued

#### 07-5 INDEPENDENT PEER REVIEW OF SERVICE PROVIDERS

Condition: Behavioral Health does not provide for peer reviews of the required five percent of service providers. The State must provide for independent peer reviews that assess the quality, appropriateness, and efficacy of treatment services provided to individuals. At least five percent of the entities providing services in the State shall be reviewed annually.

Criteria: The State must provide for independent peer reviews that assess the quality, appropriateness, and efficacy of treatment services provided to individuals. At least five percent of the entities providing services in the State shall be reviewed annually. The entities reviewed shall be representative of the entities providing the services associated with independent peer reviews (A-133, Compliance Supplement).

**Cause:** Lack of effective internal controls and procedures. Personnel interviewed were unaware of the testing requirements established by the compliance supplement for the Community Mental Health Services program.

**Effect:** An internal control deficiency over compliance with high risk vendor requirements.

**Recommendation:** We recommend stronger internal control procedures through education and instruction on pertinent information with regard to the testing requirements provided in the A-133 compliance supplement (CFDA 93.778).

Management's Response: The Behavioral Health Services Division maintains that it has met the peer review requirement as evidenced by the <u>New Mexico SAPT Independent Peer Review Committee Annual Report</u> <u>– Fiscal Year 2007</u>, copies of which are available.

#### 07-6 SPECIAL REVENUE FUND

**Condition:** The general fund 06100 includes special revenue programs and grants.

Criteria: In accordance with governmental generally accepted accounting principles, a special revenue fund may be used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than trusts for individuals, private organizations, or other governments, or for major capital projects) that are legally restricted to expenditure for specified purposes. Currently, the federal funded activities are recorded in the general fund (061000)

#### B. FINDINGS - FINANCIAL STATEMENT AUDIT - continued

#### 07-6 SPECIAL REVENUE FUND - continued

Cause: When the one DOH fund (100) was broken up into various funds on July 1, 2006, insufficient consideration was given to the special revenue activities.

Effect: Federally funded activity cannot be tracked individually in the general fund. The risk of federal and non-federal funds being commingled is present.

**Recommendation:** We recommend the creation of a special revenue fund to track all federal funded activity.

Management's Response: The Department believes that the SHARE Grants Module tracks federal funds adequately and individually. As per GAAP, the creation of a Special Revenue Fund is optional. The requirement for such fund is dependent on whether it is contractually required (i.e. grant award/agreement); or if law establishes a new tax that is to provide funding for a specific purpose and that law requires a special revenue fund be created to track the revenues and expenditures. Management of the Department is not aware of any such requirements within our grant awards/agreements.

#### 07-7 CONTRACTUAL ALLOWANCE ACCOUNT

**Condition:** It was noted that the billing process for the health centers includes a gross revenue entry which is reduced in the same entry due to the contractual allowance.

**Criteria:** Contractual allowance, in healthcare, is the difference between what hospitals bill and what they receive in payment from third party payers, most commonly government programs. The health service industry uses a contractual allowance account to record the debit balance of the revenue recording transaction.

Cause: No contractual allowance is present in the SHARE chart of accounts. The Department does not follow the accounting standards that the health care industry follows.

Effect: DOH is preparing gross revenue entries and immediately reducing the revenue to record the contractual allowance to get the net revenue to correct balance. These entries lead to entries that are difficult to record and review.

#### B. FINDINGS - FINANCIAL STATEMENT AUDIT - continued

#### 07-7 CONTRACTUAL ALLOWANCE ACCOUNT - continued

**Recommendation:** We recommend that a contractual allowance account be set up in SHARE in order to record the health service revenue transactions.

Management's Response: Although the Department has no control over the chart of accounts for the SHARE system, DOH will request that the Department of Finance and Administration create a contractual allowance account in the system. DOH will develop policies and procedures to direct staff on use of the new account; train facility and program staff in the correct procedures; implement and monitor the procedures; review and approve Journal Entries for the contractual allowances; and test implementation of the procedures on an on-going basis in subsequent site visits to the programs and facilities.

#### 07-8 PAST DUE ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

**Condition:** The medical facilities, with one exception, are not actively collecting past due accounts receivable. They do not have a standard receivables collection process in place.

**Criteria:** Good accounting practices require that the active collection of outstanding accounts receivable be pursued to increase cash flows and decrease the accrual of uncollectible accounts receivable.

Cause: No employee has been given the directive to either contract with an outside collection agency or collect on behalf of the medical facilities or DOH. No standardized process has been established for the collection of receivables.

Effect: Many of the outstanding accounts receivable for health care have become stale and, with the time that has passed, have become uncollectible. The collection of receivables among the medical facilities is inconsistent and at some facilities ineffective.

**Recommendation:** The Department should develop and implement a receivable collection process that is used at all medical faculties. The one health care center that is actively collecting their accounts receivable should be used as the model to implement in the other health centers.

#### 07-8 PAST DUE ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE - continued

Management's Response: The Department updated the DOH uncollectibles policy in FY08 to provide for the correct procedures to record uncollectible accounts. DOH will continue to train facility and program staff in the procedures; monitor accounting practices under the procedures; review and approve Journal Entries for the uncollectible accounts; and test implementation of the procedures on an on-going basis in subsequent site visits to the programs and facilities.

#### 07-9 BUDGET OVERAGES

**Condition:** The Department overspent budget in the Personnel Services and Employee Benefits category in the Developmental Disabilities Support program by \$767,565.

Criteria: According to State Auditor Rule 2.2.2.10(P), if an agency's expenditures exceed its budget in any category, this fact must be disclosed in a finding.

Cause: The Department did not monitor its budget and missed the opportunity to submit a Budget Adjustment Request. The Department failed to submit a budget adjustment request to eliminate the excess of budget to expenditures.

Effect: The Department is out of compliance with statutory requirements to obtain approval prior to making expenditures.

**Recommendation**: The budget needs to be monitored and adjustments made on a timely basis in order to avoid overages.

Management's Response: The Department apprised DFA of this issue at year-end closing and provided the finding to the external auditors. The Department acknowledges the fact that it did not submit a Budget Adjustment Request to DFA within the required timeframe to cover the salary, overtime, and benefits expenses for the program due to the length of time it was taking to post and reconcile payroll. The Department did increase the category through budget adjustments by more than \$2.3 million during FY07, evidence that this category in this Program Area has been significantly under funded.

#### 7-10 CASH CONTROLS

**Condition:** The New Mexico Behavioral Health Institute Las Vegas facility is selling art purchased from the patients but does not have adequate controls over the moneys collected. The facility also sells various candy and confections which are not being properly recorded in the Department's general ledger.

Criteria: As described in the Manual of Model Accounting Practices, all cash transactions require issuing of a receipt, the receipt log or cash register "Z" tape (report printed at the end of day or shift that reports this information), that supports the cash deposit made.

Cause: The types of transactions described above are currently not being recorded in the general ledger No reconciliations are being prepared to ensure the cash collected is being properly deposited and recorded.

Effect: By not recording the transactions in the general ledger, cash and revenue transactions are being left out of the Department's financial statements.

**Recommendation:** We recommend the Department implement and enforce a policy that requires all transactions to be recorded in the general ledger and cash reconciliations be prepared to properly account for the described transactions.

Management's Response: The Department believes that all sales transactions are correctly deposited and recorded on the General Ledger. However, stricter procedures and controls could be implemented at the point of sale. As documented by an internal review of the process by the Department's Office of Internal Audit, cash receipts are deposited daily with the facility cashier, deposited into the Department's local clearing account, and then transferred to the State's General Fund deposit account with the State Treasurer's Office and recorded on the General Ledger in the SHARE accounting system. For these reasons, the Department will implement more robust cash receipting procedures at the point of sale, including the use of a cash register and "Z-tape".

### B. FINDINGS - FINANCIAL STATEMENT AUDIT - continued

#### 07-11 LATE FILING OF AUDIT REPORT

Condition: The audit report for the year ended June 30, 2007 was not submitted by the deadline of December 15, 2007, to the New Mexico State Auditor's Office and the financial statement reporting packet and data collection form were not filed with the Federal Clearinghouse and federal agencies within nine months after the fiscal year end as required. The report was submitted on July 30, 2008.

Criteria: SAO 2.2.2.9(A)(f) requires that State agencies file their annual financial audit with the State Auditor's Office by December 15 each year, while OMB Circular A-133 requires submission of the financial statement reporting packet and the data collection form to the Federal Clearinghouse and federal agencies within nine months after the fiscal year end (A-133.320).

Cause: The Department's records were not ready for the timely completion of the audit. Critical schedules were not provided to the auditors until mid April. Additionally, significant entries to correct the books were not provided to the auditors until late in the audit.

Effect: The users of the financial statements such as legislators, creditors, bondholders, state and federal grantors, etc., do not have timely audit reports and financial statements for their review. Late audit reports could have an effect on state and federal funding.

**Recommendation:** Based on the size and complexity of the audit, the auditors require at least 60 days to complete the audit. Trial balances and critical supporting schedules should be provided to the auditors no later than mid-October in order to meet the December 15th deadline. In addition, should file the required documentation with the federal Clearinghouse and federal agencies as soon as the final financial statements are available.

Management's Response: The Department acknowledges the fact that the audit was not completed and submitted within the required timeframe due to the following: implementation of an extremely complex new statewide accounting system, SHARE; lack of adequate training in SHARE system implementation; the fact that DOH reconciled FY07 payroll for all of its more than 4,000 employees funded with a wide range of funding sources; issues associated with DOH's implementation of the SHARE Grants Module; lack of a CPA on staff after January 2008 along with other staffing problems; accounting issues and shortcomings carried over from previous fiscal year; and other issues associated with operating a twenty-four-hours-a-day, 365-day-a-year health care department with offices and operations statewide.

### 07-12 JOURNAL ENTRY REVIEW – LACK OF SUPPORTING DOCUMENTATION

#### Condition:

- (1) 2 out of 13 JE packets did not have back-up documentation
- (2) 1 out of 13 JE packets contained backup documentation that did not agree with the entry posted.

Criteria: As a state agency, the Department, must follow the existing Manual of Model Accounting Practices' (MAPs) procedures for journal entries. As described in MAPs (FIN3.7 - 3.11), authorized by Section 6-5-2, NMSA 1978

Cause: Lack of effective procedures and understanding of MAPs have created this condition.

Effect: If AJEs are not reviewed and approved, it is possible that inappropriate entries may be made that may cause misstatements to the financial statements.

**Recommendation:** MCO recommends the Department follow MAPs internal control procedures to ensure proposed AJEs are properly reviewed and/or approved and that the backup documentation is kept with the approved entry.

Management's Response: The Department acknowledges that insufficient or incorrect backup documentation was filed with certain Journal Entries and is working to ensure that financial accounting staff implement stricter review and approval procedures (including those that provide for rejection and return to JE preparer(s) that do not have sufficient or correct backup documentation).

# 07-13 RECORDING AND RECONCILIATION OF CASH AND ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE (MATERIAL WEAKNESS)

Condition: The Department has not implemented a process to reconcile the cash accounts of both investments held with the New Mexico State Treasurer's Office and those cash accounts held with individual banks. Also, in accounts receivable, the receivables for federal, due from other state agencies and facilities are not reconciled in a timely manner.

Criteria: As a state agency, the Department, must follow the existing Manual of Model Accounting Practices' procedures for monthly reconciliations between internal documentation and SHARE (general leger). This includes a system of reconciliation that produces a timely preparation and review of all cash

#### Criteria - continued:

and receivable accounts should be in place in order to better supply management with reliable and relevant data. As described in MAPs (FIN11.1 – 11.9), authorized by Section 6-5-2, NMSA 1978.

Cause: No formal policies or procedures are in place that will walk the accountants through the reconciliation requirements. The Department has not incorporated the Model Accounting Practices into its policies and procedures.

Effect: The balances for cash and receivables cannot be relied on, causing management to make decisions without all of the relevant data.

**Recommendation:** We recommend the Department adopt MAPs in order to implement and monitor the reconciliation process that includes the review of journal entries and the adjusted account balances.

Management's Response: The Department did reconcile the cash accounts at year end and entered the appropriate entries into the SHARE system. In the future, DOH will implement procedures that will require monthly reconciliation of all cash accounts and accounts receivable and book the appropriate entries to the SHARE accounting system.

#### 07-14 ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE – PUBLIC HEALTH DIVISION

#### Condition:

- (1) Accounts Receivable (A/R) for the entire year was all booked in June for Public Health Division (PHD) programs. The amounts booked were for the amounts billed for each month in FY07. There are no entries recorded in FY07 to reduce the A/R when the payments were received throughout the year or to reclass the payments received in the year from revenue to A/R.
- (2) There is no aged A/R listing.
- (3) There is no allowance for uncollectible accounts or contractual adjustments.

#### Criteria:

In accordance with GAAP:

- (1) A/R should be recorded when revenue is earned.
- (2) Any contractual adjustments should be recorded.

#### Criteria - continued:

- (3) An aged A/R listing should be maintained and monitored. Any claims not paid in a timely manner should be rebilled and any denials received should be reviewed and re-billed if possible.
- (4) An allowance for uncollectible accounts and contractual allowance should be set up.

Cause: Lack of effective procedures for accounting and maintaining accounts receivable. This would include the recording of revenue, recording of contractual adjustments and the set up of the contractual allowance account.

Effect: The Department may not be collecting all the accounts receivable services for services that have been provided. By not recording the accounts receivable on a monthly basis, the Department is forfeiting billings that may have been denied and may be resubmitted and collected.

PHD is not making information, such as an A/R aged listing, available to the Department's management. An accounts receivable listing report is a periodic report showing all outstanding receivable balances broken down by customer and month due. This report is a valuable tool in rebilling and collecting of past due receivables and identifying bad accounts. No individual receivable is being identified as uncollectible, this creates an inflated receivable balance.

Recommendation: Consistent procedures should be implemented to accurately record, maintain and update all A/R and related accounts for all PHD programs.

Management's Response: DOH acknowledges this issue and has taken specific action to ensure that billed revenue is recorded along with the appropriate accounts receivable entries and that receipt of cash is recorded against the A/R. DOH will continue to work to ensure that these procedures are adhered to on an on-going basis with periodic review by the Financial Accounting.

# 7-15 WOMEN, INFANTS AND CHILDREN (WIC) PROGRAM – RECONCILING GRANT TIMELY

Condition: The revenue from the grants and the related expenditures as reported on the FNS-798 reports are not reconciled with SHARE. The WIC program is audited by the USDA every three years. The last audit in 2007 for the grant period ending September 30, 2006 stated this as a finding. This issue still has not been resolved. There is no reconciliation of the revenue and expenditures of the WIC

#### **Condition - continued:**

program from their tracking and reporting system which the FNS-798 is based on and the entries made in SHARE.

Criteria: As a state agency, the Department, must follow the existing Manual of Model Accounting Practices' (MAPs) procedures for monthly reconciliations between internal documentation and SHARE (general ledger). As described in MAPs (FIN 3.7 - 3.11), authorized by Section 6-5-2, NMSA 1978.

Cause: The Department lacks effective procedures to prepare reconciliations. The Department has not incorporated MAPs into its policies and procedures.

**Effect:** The revenues and expenditures of the WIC program as reported in SHARE have not been reconciled with the FNS-798 report or the WIC accounting system. This can lead to amounts not being recorded in SHARE for the WIC program.

**Recommendation:** Policies and procedures including those detailed in MAPs, should be implemented by the Department to maintain complete and accurate records of WIC activities.

Management's Response: Reconciliation between the WIC settlement system and SHARE will be done daily. Currently, the New Mexico WIC Program reports WIC redemption on the USDA/FNS 798 using the WIC client database 1440 report. The Program is in the process of building a report that will capture WIC redemptions from the WIC settlement system. The processing of all claims from vendors and payment requests to the WIC bank is stored in the WIC settlement system. The New Mexico WIC Program is also creating a daily report to be distributed by automated e-mail. This report will list redemption amount by month of issuance and federal fiscal year to be drawn. In addition, the program will work with an outside consulting firm to help identify additional policies and procedures for reconciliations.

#### 7-16 GENERAL LEDGER TRANSACTIONS – LACK OF REVIEW

**Condition:** Transactions recorded in the general ledger are not being reviewed or corrected. Specifically, the Grants Module in SHARE is creating automatic entries which are not being reviewed and corrected, if needed. Many transactions were recorded in the wrong account, and many were not recorded in accordance with GAAP.

### B. FINDINGS - FINANCIAL STATEMENT AUDIT - continued

#### 7-16 GENERAL LEDGER TRANSACTIONS – LACK OF REVIEW - continued

Criteria: As a state agency, the Department, must follow the existing Manual of Model Accounting Practices' (MAPs) procedures for general ledger transactions. All transactions posted in the general ledger should be accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP). As described in MAPs (FIN3.7 – 3.11), authorized by Section 6-5-2, NMSA 1978.

Cause: Transactions recorded in the general ledger do not have a standardized process to follow. All transactions are posted, whether automatic or manual, without the proper amount of review. The Department has not incorporated the MAPs into its policies and procedures.

Effect: Information produced out of the unadjusted general ledger may not be complete; the general ledger requires numerous adjustments to get to a reliable stage.

**Recommendation:** We recommend the Department incorporate MAPs and a standardized process be implemented that would address the transactions being recorded in the general ledger.

Management's Response: The Department records all federal grant expenditures in the SHARE Grants Module, which generates General Ledger entries. In the future, DOH will review all GL entries monthly, including those generated by DFA, the Grants Module, and the State Treasurer's Office.

# 06-1 FEDERAL EXPENDITURE, DRAWDOWN AND RECEIPTS RECONCILIATION - REPEATED

**Condition:** The grant department did not reconcile the federal expenditures and the federal drawdowns and receipts for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2006 and 2007.

Criteria: As described in the Manual of Model Accounting Practices (MAPs)(FIN 11.2), the grant department is to reconcile all expenditures, drawdowns and receipts on a timely basis in order to have financial information that is relevant and reliable.

Cause: The Department did not reconcile the grants due to internal turnover and lack of personnel trained in the process. MAPs was not used as guide to train the Department's new personnel.

#### B. FINDINGS - FINANCIAL STATEMENT AUDIT - continued

# 06-1 FEDERAL EXPENDITURE, DRAWDOWN AND RECEIPTS RECONCILIATION REPEATED - continued

Effect: Financial reports issued are likely to contain errors and may not contain reliable information. The users of the financial statements such as management, state and federal grantors, etc., do not have accurate reports to rely on.

**Recommendation:** We recommend the Department implement and enforce a policy that requires all grants to be reconciled monthly. The policy should based on MAPs, which includes a system of review to insure the data is correct. Each individual grant must be reconciled from a period of time in which the last reliable reconciliation was performed.

Management's Response: The Department believes that the process utilized to draw down federal funds for FY07 provided the mechanism to reconcile expenditures with federal draws and did conduct a reconciliation for June 30. In determining the amounts to be drawn down for each federal award each quarter, the Department calculates total expenditures and prepares a draw down for that amount. Following the close of the fiscal year, a review is conducted and additional funds are drawn down or credited back to the federal government, based upon final expenditure amounts compared with final draw amounts. The Department agrees that follow-up review should be conducted and will implement procedures to provide for subsequent review.

### 06-6 RECOGNITION AND RECORDING OF REVENUE

**Condition:** Per examination of two deposits related to patient service charges at the New Mexico Behavioral Health Institute, a certain amount of revenue (\$1,256,657) that was received during the month of July 2006 was not posted to SHARE until the month of December 2006.

Criteria: Per Department of Finance and Administration's Model Accounting Practices (MAPs) (FIN 11.2), authorized by Section 6-5-2, NMSA 1978:

- 1. Agencies must recognize and record revenue in the accounting period in which they become susceptible to accrual. Revenues become susceptible to accrual when they are measurable and available (the cut-off for revenue recognition should not exceed ninety days).
- 2. Meet federal reporting requirements.
- 3. Comply with State law.
- Meet management's needs.

#### B. FINDINGS – FINANCIAL STATEMENT AUDIT - continued

## 06-6 RECOGNITION AND RECORDING OF REVENUE - continued

Cause: Due to the confusion and complexity surrounding the implementation of SHARE by the Department, revenue was not recorded in a timely manner. The Department has not incorporated MAPs as part of it's policy and procedures.

Effect: The Department did not properly record revenue in a timely manner; thus revenue was not accurately stated until December 2006. The Department is not following procedures addressed in MAPs.

**Recommendation:** To ensure that revenue is posted timely, the Department should ensure that its personnel are adequately trained in the complexity of SHARE in order to perform their duties. MAPs should also be incorporated as part of the Departments accounting policies and procedures.

Management's Response: The Department agrees that revenue was not posted in a timely manner in this instance and has taken steps to ensure that revenue, receivables, and other account entries are recorded in the correct period and within standard timeframes. Specifically, additional staff have been tasked to assist the New Mexico Behavioral Health Institute in posting revenue and accounts receivable; management has made the timely posting of a revenue a priority for the facility; and more timely posting and reconciliation of revenue and all other transactions is being conducted to ensure that transactions are recorded within required timeframes.

### C. FINDINGS - MAJOR FEDERAL AWARD PROGRAMS AUDIT

#### 07-2 STATISTICAL REPORTS FILING – UNTIMELY FILING

#### CDFA No. 93.940 HIV Preventive Activities

**Condition:** The statistical reports of HIV antibody counseling and testing activities were not filed in a timely manner by the Department. In January, 2008, the reports were filed for the previous six quarters.

Criteria: One of the requirements for the HIV Prevention Activities grant (CFDA #93.940) is that statistical reports of HIV antibody counseling and testing activities are required 45 days after the end of each quarter.

Cause: Based on the criteria listed above, the Department does not have effective procedures in place to file the statistical reports by the due date.

## C. FINDINGS - MAJOR FEDERAL AWARD PROGRAMS AUDIT - continued

#### 07-2 STATISTICAL REPORTS FILING - UNTIMELY FILING - continued

Effect: Non-compliance with federal awarding agencies' requirements, potential for fiscal sanctions, or funding termination.

**Recommendation:** We recommend that the reports be filed in a timely manner within the required 45 day period.

Management's Response: Under the Center for Disease Control (CDC) HIV Prevention Grant, data on counseling and testing activities is reported electronically 45 days after the end of each calendar quarter. During FY07, CDC was transitioning to the new web-based Program Evaluation and Monitoring System that was intended to have the capacity to report this data. Due to multiple delays in system implementation and DOH program staff turnover, none of the program's staff during FY06 had the skills and knowledge necessary to submit data using the old system. An extension of the deadline was requested and granted during FY07, allowing the program to receive technical assistance and complete all reporting by January 2008. Training and participation in the new system during FY08 is expected to ensure full compliance for FY08.

#### 07-3 FEDERAL CASH TRANSACTIONS REPORT FILING – UNTIMELY FILING

#### All Federal Awards

Condition: The Federal Cash Transactions Report (PSC 272) was not filed timely for the first quarter of FY07.

**Criteria:** The Department is required to file the Federal Cash Transactions Report (PSC 272) quarterly so as to alert the federal awarding agency of the cash positions for the various grants and to request funding for any deficits (OMB A-133, Compliance Supplement).

**Cause:** Lack of effective procedures.

Effect: Non-compliance with reporting requirements and cash management issues. The deficits for the various grants must be made up, and funds are used from the general fund to make up for not getting timely funding from the federal government.

**Recommendation:** We recommend that the reports be filed quarterly so as to meet reporting requirements and to improve cash management.

# C. FINDINGS - MAJOR FEDERAL AWARD PROGRAMS AUDIT - continued

# 07-3 FEDERAL CASH TRANSACTIONS REPORT FILING - UNTIMELY FILING - continued

Management's Response: The late filing was due to initial difficulties associated with the posting of federal grant expenditures during the implementation of the SHARE accounting system and the extended amounts of time necessary to implement the SHARE Grants Module, which recorded all federal expenditures. The Department is currently filing all 272 reports quarterly within required timeframes.

#### 07-4 HIGH RISK VENDORS – LACK OF COMPLIANCE INVESTIGATIONS

### CFDA No. 10.557 - Women, Infants & Children

**Condition:** The WIC program failed to meet the high risk vendor requirement of auditing a least five percent of the total vendor population or at least 12 of the 239 vendors.

Criteria: A State agency operating a retail food delivery system must conduct compliance investigations, which consist of inventory audits and/or compliance buys on a minimum of five percent of the vendors authorized as of October 1 of each year. A State agency must conduct compliance investigations on its high-risk vendors up to the five percent minimum. High-risk vendors are identified at least once annually using criteria developed by FNS and/or other statistically based criteria developed by the State agency and approved by FNS. If the number of high-risk vendors exceeds five percent of the total, then the State agency must prioritize vendors for investigative purposes based on their potential for noncompliance and/or loss. If the number of high-risk vendors falls short of five percent of the total, the State agency must randomly select enough additional vendors to meet the five percent requirement.

**Cause:** Lack of effective procedures. Personnel interviewed were unaware of the testing requirements established by the compliance supplement for the WIC program.

Effect: An internal control deficiency over compliance with high risk vendor requirements.

**Recommendation:** We recommend stronger internal control procedures through education, and instruction on pertinent information with regard to the vendor requirements provided in the compliance supplement.

# 07-4 HIGH RISK VENDORS – LACK OF COMPLIANCE INVESTIGATIONS - continued

Management's Response: The WIC Vendor Manager reviewed CFR 246.12 and has established the following policy regarding WIC vendor compliance investigations.

Identification of high-risk vendors: Currently, the New Mexico WIC Program identifies high risk vendors by using the criteria set forth in the 2008 New Mexico WIC state plan. This data will be monitored annually to determine the number of high-risk vendors participating in the New Mexico WIC Program. In addition, the WIC Program will establish high-risk vendor criteria for EBT and reports that identify high-risk EBT vendors. This criterion will be submitted to USDA for approval in the 2009 WIC state plan. EBT high risk identification reports include:

- High Weighted Average Price
- Vendor Redeemed versus Shelf Price Comparison
- O Percentages of WIC Sales Compared with Total Food Sales and Food Stamp Sales
- Vendor Increases or Decreases in WIC Sales Volume
- Vendor Settlement
- o Sequential Card Numbers and Lane Tracking

The New Mexico WIC Program authorizes 239 New Mexico Vendors; therefore, at least 12 vendors per year must be audited. Vendors will be classified as high risk, potential high risk or non risk. If the identified high risk vendors exceed the 5% minimum requirement, the compliance investigations will be prioritized. If the number of high-risk vendors falls short of five percent of the total, the New Mexico WIC Program will randomly select enough additional vendors to meet the five percent requirement. This will be completed by October 1st of each year.

### 07-5 INDEPENDENT PEER REVIEW OF SERVICE PROVIDERS

# CFDA No. 93.778 - Medical Assistance Program - Behavioral Health

**Condition:** Behavioral Health does not provide for peer reviews of the required five percent of service providers. The State must provide for independent peer reviews that assess the quality, appropriateness, and efficacy of treatment services provided to individuals. At least five percent of the entities providing services in the State shall be reviewed annually.

Criteria: The State must provide for independent peer reviews that assess the quality, appropriateness, and efficacy of treatment services provided to individuals. At least five percent of the entities providing services in the State shall be reviewed annually. The entities reviewed shall be representative of the entities providing the services associated with independent peer reviews (A-133, Compliance Supplement).

**Cause:** Lack of effective internal controls and procedures. Personnel interviewed were unaware of the testing requirements established by the compliance supplement for the Community Mental Health Services program.

Effect: An internal control deficiency over compliance with high risk vendor requirements.

**Recommendation:** We recommend stronger internal control procedures through education and instruction on pertinent information with regard to the testing requirements provided in the A-133 compliance supplement (CFDA 93.778).

Management's Response: The Behavioral Health Services Division maintains that it has met the peer review requirement as evidenced by the <u>New Mexico SAPT Independent Peer Review Committee Annual Report</u> — <u>Fiscal Year 2007</u>, copies of which are available.
