### **Report on Financial Statements**

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information, and the budgetary comparisons of the general fund and the major special revenue funds of the Fort Sumner Municipal Schools (the "District") as of and for the year ended June 30, 2017, and the related notes to the financial statements which collectively comprise the Fort Sumner Municipal Schools' basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.. We did not audit the 2016 Schedule of Employer Allocations and Pension Amounts of the State of New Mexico Educational Retirement Board (ERB), the administrator of the cost sharing pension plan for the District. The schedules and statements were audited by other auditors whose report has been furnished to us, and our opinion, insofar as it relates to the amounts included for the District, is based solely on the report of the other auditors.

### **Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements**

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements, whether due to fraud or error.

### **Auditor's Responsibility**

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit involves performing procedures to obtain evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the Fort Sumner Municipal Schools' preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Fort Sumner Municipal Schools' internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

### **Opinions**

In our opinion, based on our report and the report of the other auditors, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Fort Sumner Municipal Schools, as of June 30, 2017, and the respective changes in financial position where applicable, cash flows thereof and the respective budgetary comparisons for the General Fund and major special revenue funds for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

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## **Other Matters**

### *Required Supplementary Information*

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the *Management's Discussion and Analysis* on pages 13-18, the *Schedule of Proportionate Share of the Net Pension Liability* on page 95, the *Schedule of Contributions* on page 97 and the notes to the required supplementary information on page 99 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

## **Other Information**

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on Fort Sumner Municipal School's financial statements, that collectively comprise the Fort Sumner Municipal School's basis financial statements.

The combining and individual fund financial statements, and other supplemental information required by 2.2.2 NMAC, presented in the supplementary information section of the Table of Contents, are presented for the purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. The combining and individual fund statements and other Schedules, presented in the supplementary information section of the Table of Contents, are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining and individual fund financial statements, and Schedules, presented in the supplementary information section of the Table of Contents, required by 2.2.2 NMAC are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

## **Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards**

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated September 14, 2017 on our consideration of the Fort Sumner Municipal Schools' internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the Fort Sumner Municipal Schools' internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

As management of the Fort Sumner Municipal Schools District, we offer readers of the District's financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017. Readers should also review the basic financial statements and notes to enhance their understanding of the District's financial performance.

In June 1999, GASB approved Statement #34 "Basic Financial Statements and Management Discussion and Analysis for State and Local Government". In June 2001, the GASB approved Statement #37 "Basic Financial Statements and Management's Discussion and Analysis for State and Local Governments: Omnibus" and Statement #38 "Certain Financial Statement Note Disclosures". Statement #37 clarifies and modifies Statement #34 and should be implemented simultaneously with Statement #34. Statement #38 modifies, establishes and rescinds certain financial statement disclosure requirements. The District implemented the provisions of the above statements effective July 1, 2003.

#### Financial Highlights

Key financial highlights for fiscal year ended June 30, 2017 are as follows:

- The assets of the District exceeded its liabilities at the end of the fiscal year by \$10,970,923 (net position and deferred inflows of resources). Of this amount, \$13,899,321 is invested in capital assets, \$1,060,575 is restricted for Capital Projects, \$732,236 is restricted for Debt Service, \$74,263 for Special Revenue Funds, \$24,629 is restricted for General Fund, and \$(5,470,101) is unrestricted and may be used to meet the District's ongoing obligations. The deferred inflows of resources related to property taxes and the net pension liability is \$297,392.
- The District's total net position decreased by \$206,799 which is reflected in the District's Statement of Activities.
- The District's liabilities increased by \$18,718 in fiscal year 2016-2017.

At June 30, 2017, the unreserved and undesignated fund balance for the general fund was \$217,799, which reflects a decrease of \$205,846 from the previous fiscal year.

- As part of the implementation of GASB 34, total accumulated depreciation on capital assets as of June 30, 2017 is \$8,805,491. This includes current year depreciation in the amount of \$703,619.
- Capital Outlay expenditures were \$200,413 in the year ending June 30, 2017. The decrease in capital outlay expenditures was associated with the district closing out the HVAC construction project within the district for this school year.
- The District's general obligation bond debt balance is \$2,090,000. No new bonds were issued in the fiscal year 2017.

**Basic Financial Statements**

In general, the purpose of financial reports is to provide external parties reading the financial statements with information that will help them to make decisions or draw conclusions about the reporting entity. There are many external parties that read and use the District's financial statements; however, these parties do not always have the same objectives. This annual report consists of a series of financial statements and notes to those statements. These statements are organized so that the reader may understand the District's overall financial position. In accordance with required reporting requirements, the District presents (1) government-wide financial statements and (2) fund financial statements.

*Government-wide financial statements*

The *government-wide financial statements* are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the District's finances, in a manner similar to that of a private sector business.

The *statement of net position* presents information on all of the District's assets and liabilities, with the difference between the two reported as *net position*. Over time, increases and decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the District is improving or deteriorating.

The *statement of activities* presents information showing how the District's net position changed during the most recent fiscal year. All changes in net position are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of cash flows. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will result in cash flows only in future fiscal periods (e.g. uncollected taxes).

Both the *statement of net position* and the *statement of activities* distinguish functions of the District that are primarily supported by property taxes and state revenues (governmental activities) from other functions that are intended to recover all or a significant portion of their costs through fees and charges. The governmental activities of the District include education, pupil transportation, food service and community service. The District does not have any business-type activities.

The *government-wide financial statements* can be found on Exhibits A-1 and A-2 on pages 20 through 23 of the financial statements.

*Fund Financial Statements*

A *fund* is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The District, like other school districts, uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. All of the funds of the District can be divided into two categories: governmental funds and fiduciary funds.

*Governmental Funds*

*Government Funds* are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. However, unlike the government-wide financial statements, governmental fund financial statements focus on near-term inflows and outflows of expendable resources, as well as on balances of expendable resources available as the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be useful in evaluating a government's near-term financing requirements.

Because the focus of government funds is narrower than that of the government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for governmental funds with similar information presented for governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long-term impact of the District's near-term financing decisions. A reconciliation to facilitate the comparison of the governmental funds and governmental activities has been provided.

The District has four individual governmental fund groups. Information is presented separately in the governmental fund balance sheets and in the governmental funds statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balance for the following funds: General Fund, Special Revenue Funds, Capital Projects Fund, and Debt Service Fund

The basic governmental fund financial statements can be found on Exhibits B-1 and B-2 on pages 24 through 31 of the financial statements.

*Fiduciary Funds*

Fiduciary Funds are used to account for resources held in trust for the benefit of parties outside the District. Fiduciary fund financial statements consist of a statement of fiduciary net assets and a statement of changes in fiduciary net assets. These funds are not reported in the government-wide financial statements.

The fiduciary fund financial statements can be found in Exhibit D on page 39 of the financial statements.

As noted in the schedule above, the District has \$24,629 in unrestricted funds in the current year. Unrestricted funds can be used at the *discretion* of the District and to meet ongoing obligations to creditors and stakeholders. 23% is restricted for the stated purposes. The remaining 77% of the District's net position is net investment in capital assets.

Governmental activities decreased the District's overall net position by \$206,799. This decrease was due in part to a reduction in State Funding as a result of a State Budget Crisis of \$118,686. The State reduced the SEG allocation to each school district by 5% and reduced the transportation funding in addition the Districts had to revert all Instructional Materials funding for 2016-2017.

The major elements of the District's governmental activities contributing to the increase in the change in net position are listed on the next page.

As noted above, the District is heavily dependent on federal and state aid, which comprises 84% of its total revenues. Correspondingly, the District spends 63% of total revenues on direct instruction and instructional support the two primary functions that indicate direct school spending.

*General Fund Budgetary Highlights*

Budget to actual comparison schedules are presented for all major funds in Exhibit C-1 through C-3. These schedules are prepared on a cash basis which is the format allowed by the District's oversight agency, the New Mexico Public Education Department.

The original expenditure budget for the District's general fund was \$3,996,953. The final general fund expenditure budget was \$3,679,011 of which \$3,430,065 was expended in the current year. Budgets were not exceeded in any of the functions in the general fund.

Of the \$3,996,953 total District revenue budget, the District only received 80%. The actual revenue received was \$3,209,089 as a result of the State Budget Crisis.

**Capital Assets and Debt Administration**

*Capital Assets*

The District's current year investment in capital assets as of June 30, 2017 is \$13,899,321. The District's assets include land and land improvements, building and building improvements, equipment and furniture, and vehicles.

Depreciation calculated as a result of GASB 34 implementation resulted in an accumulated depreciation balance of \$8,805,491, of which \$703,619 is for depreciation in the current year. Additional information of the District's capital assets is presented in Note 7 on page 52 of the financial statements.

*Long-term obligations*

At the end of the current year, the district had \$2,090,000 in long-term debt related to governmental activities. Of this debt, 100% was related to general obligation bonds still outstanding at the end of the year. The debt position of the District is summarized below and is more fully analyzed in Note 8 on page 53 of the financial statements.

During the fiscal year, the District reduced total bond debt principle by \$290,000 in accordance with schedule bond payments.

Relevant Current Economic Factors, Decisions and Conditions

Fort Sumner Schools continues to strive to provide the students of our district with a quality education that prepares every student to be college and career ready. The district also continues to work diligently to fill administrative, teaching and other specialty area positions with highly qualified professionals, during a time, when across the state of New Mexico there is a shortage in the field of education. The financial burden we have had to endure in our district caused by the state sweeping our cash balances, transportation, instructional materials by \$183, 526.00 in 2016-2017 has had a significant impact on our ability to provide the most basic of instructional needs to our students. We have left teaching positions vacant and have cut after school and educational programs because a lack of funding and the possibility of an additional cuts during the 2017-18 school year looms ahead. Over the past two years, we have seen a decrease of \$325,968.29 to our SEG when added to the cash balance sweep that is a \$509,494.29 loss in revenue. These reductions in funding creates drastic hardships for the students of Fort Sumner and leaves them at a disadvantage when it comes to competing with other students from across the nation for scholarship and internship opportunities.

The Fort Sumner School Board of Education, administration and the faculty will continue to work to provide the best education possible for the students of this district under the hardships that we continue to face.

**NOTE 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies**

Fort Sumner Municipal Schools (the District) has been in existence since the early nineteen hundreds and is currently operating under the provisions of the public school district code, Chapter 22, Article 5, Paragraph 4, New Mexico Statutes 1978. The School Board is authorized to establish policies and regulations for its own government consistent with the laws of the State of New Mexico and the regulations of the State Board of Education and the Legislative Finance Committee. The School Board is comprised of five members who are elected for terms of four years. Fort Sumner Municipal Schools provides kindergarten, elementary, middle and secondary educational services to school age residents of the District.

This summary of significant accounting policies of the District is presented to assist in the understanding of the District's financial statements. The financial statements and notes are the representation of the Fort Sumner Municipal Schools' management who is responsible for their integrity and objectivity. The financial statements of the District have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) as applied to government units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The financial statements have incorporated all applicable GASB statements and Interpretations, Accounting Principles Board Opinions and Accounting Research Bulletins of the Committee on accounting procedures. The more significant of the government's accounting policies are described below.

**A. *Financial Reporting Entity***

In evaluating how to define the District, for financial reporting purposes, management has considered all potential component units. The decision to include any potential component units in the financial reporting entity was made by applying the criteria set forth in GASB Statement No. 61. Blended component units, although legally separate entities, are in substance part of the government's operations. Each discretely presented component unit is reported in a separate column in the government-wide financial statements to emphasize that it is legally separate from the government.

The basic-but not the only-criterion for including a potential component unit within the reporting entity is the governing body's ability to exercise oversight responsibility. The most significant manifestation of this ability is financial interdependency. Other manifestations of the ability to exercise oversight responsibility include, but are not limited to, the selection of governing authority, the designation of management, the ability to significantly influence operations, and accountability for fiscal matters. A second criterion used in evaluating potential component units is the scope of public service. Application of this criterion involves considering whether the activity benefits the government and/or its citizens. A third criterion used to evaluate potential component units for inclusion or exclusion from the reporting entity is the existence of special financing relationships, regardless of whether the government is able to exercise oversight responsibilities. Finally, the nature and significance of a potential component unit to the primary government could warrant its inclusion within the reporting entity. Based upon the application of these criteria, the District has no component units, and is not a component unit of another governmental agency.

**B. Government-wide and fund financial statements**

The government-wide financial statements (i.e., the statement of net position and the statement of activities) report information on all of the nonfiduciary activities of the primary government. For the most part, the effect of interfund activity has been removed from these statements. *Governmental activities*, which normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues, are reported separately from *business-type activities*, which rely to a significant extent on fees and charges for support.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or segment is offset by program revenues. *Direct expenses* are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. *Program revenues* include 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function or segment and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Taxes and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as *general revenues*.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the District's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

Separate financial statements are provided for governmental funds and fiduciary funds, even though the latter are excluded from the government-wide financial statements. Major individual governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements.

**C. Measurement focus, basis of accounting, and financial statement presentation**

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the *economic resources measurement focus* and the *accrual basis of accounting*, as does the fiduciary fund financial statement. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Property taxes are recognized as revenues in the year for which they are billed. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the *current financial resources measurement focus* and the *modified accrual basis of accounting*. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be *available* when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the government considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current fiscal period. Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, debt service expenditures, as well as expenditures related to compensated absences and claims and judgments, are recorded only when payment is due.

Property taxes, franchise taxes, licenses, and interest associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual and so have been recognized as revenues of the current fiscal period. Sales and use taxes are classified as derived tax revenues and are recognized as revenue when the underlying exchange takes place and the revenues are measurable and available. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met. Only the portion of special assessments receivable due within the current fiscal period is considered to be susceptible to accrual as revenue of the current period. All other revenue items are considered to be measurable and available only when cash is received by the government

C. *Measurement focus, basis of accounting, and financial statement presentation (continued)*

The government reports the following major governmental funds:

The *Operational Fund* is the government's primary operating fund. It accounts for all financial resources of the general government, except those required to be accounted for in another fund. Revenues are provided by district school tax levy, state equalization and earnings from investments. Expenditures include all costs associated with the daily operations of the schools except for those items included in other funds.

The *Transportation Fund* is used to account for the State Equalization received from the State Department of Education which is used to pay for the costs associated with transporting school age children.

The *Instructional Materials Fund* is used to account for the monies received from the State Department of Education for the purposes of purchasing instructional materials (books, manuals, periodicals, etc.) used in the education of students.

The *Wind Farm Projects Fund* is used to account for a local grant funded by a wind farm in lieu of paying property taxes, to teach the students about future wind farm technology, a growing industry in the area. The fund was created by grant provisions.

The *Bond Building Fund* is used to account for the accumulation of resources for the funds provided from the District's bond issues. Resources are used for the purpose of erecting, remodeling, making additions to, or furnishing public school buildings and purchasing or improving public school grounds. Financing is provided by ad valorem taxes as specified by Article 15 of the Finance of Counties, Municipalities, and School Districts Act, and the payment of, general long-term debt principal, interest and related costs.

The *Capital Improvement (SB-9) Fund* is used to account for the expenditures of property taxes levied and state matching monies restricted to maintenance and capital improvement projects as adopted by school board resolution. Authority for the creation of this fund is NMSA 22-25-1 to 25-25-10.

The *Debt Service Fund* is to account for the accumulation of resources for, and the payment of, general long-term debt principal, interest and related costs.

Additionally, the government reports the following fund types:

The *Fiduciary Funds* account for assets held by the District in a trustee capacity or as an agent for individuals, private organizations, other governments and/or other funds.

As a general rule the effect of interfund activity has been eliminated from the government-wide financial statements. Exceptions to this general rule are payments-in-lieu of taxes. Elimination of these charges would distort the direct costs and program revenues reported for the various functions concerned. There were no such transactions during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017.

D. *Assets, Liabilities and Net Position or Equity*

**Deposits and Investments:** The District's cash and cash equivalents are considered to be cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments with original maturities of three months or less from the date of acquisition.

State statutes authorize the District to invest in Certificates of Deposit, obligations of the U.S. Government, and the State Treasurer's Investment Pool.

Investments for the District are reported at fair value. The State Treasurer's Pool operates in accordance with appropriate state laws and regulations. The reported value of the pool is the same as the fair value of the pool shares.

**Receivables and Payables:** Interfund activity is reported as loans, services provided, reimbursements or transfers. Loans are reported as interfund receivables and payables as appropriate and are subject to elimination upon consolidation. Services provided, deemed to be at market or near market rates, are treated as revenues and expenditures/expenses. Reimbursements are when one fund incurs a cost, charges the appropriate benefiting fund and reduces its related cost as a reimbursement. All other interfund transactions are treated as transfers. Transfers between governmental or between proprietary funds are netted as part of the reconciliation to the government-wide financial statements.

All receivables are reported at their gross value and, where appropriate, are reduced by the estimated portion that is expected to be uncollectible.

The District receives monthly income from a tax levy in De Baca County. The funds are collected by the County Treasurers and are remitted to the School District the following month. Under the modified accrual method of accounting, the amount remitted by the County Treasurers in July and August is considered 'measurable and available' and, accordingly, is recorded as revenue in the governmental fund statements during the year ended June 30, 2017.

Certain Special Revenue funds are administered on a reimbursement method of funding; other funds are operated on a cash advance method of funding. The funds incurred the cost and submitted the necessary request for reimbursement or advance, respectively.

**Prepaid Items:** Certain payments to vendors reflect costs applicable to future accounting periods and are recorded as prepaid items in both the government-wide and fund financial statements.

**Instructional Materials:** The New Mexico Public Education Department (PED) receives federal mineral leasing funds from which it makes annual allocations to the various school districts for the purchase of educational materials. Of each allocation, fifty percent is restricted to the requisition of materials listed in the New Mexico Public Education Department "State Adopted Instructional Material" list, while fifty percent of each allocation is available for purchases directly from vendors. The districts are allowed to carry forward unused allocations from year to year.

**Inventory:** Inventory is valued at cost utilizing the purchase basis of accounting. Inventory in the Special Revenue Funds consists of U.S.D.A. commodities and other purchased food and non-food supplies. The cost of purchased food is recorded as an expenditure at the time individual inventory items are consumed. The U.S.D.A. commodities are recorded at year-end by audit adjusting entries. Commodities consumed during the year are reported as revenues and expenditures; unused commodities are reported as inventories. Non-commodity inventories are equally offset by a fund balance reserve, which indicates that they do not constitute "available spendable resources" even though they are a component of net current assets.

**Capital Assets:** Capital assets, which include property, plant, and equipment, are reported in the applicable governmental column in the government-wide financial statements. Capital assets are defined by the government as assets with an initial, individual cost of more than \$5,000 (amount not rounded) and an estimated useful life in excess of one year. Such assets are recorded at historical cost or estimated historical cost if purchased or constructed. Donated capital assets are recorded at estimated fair market value at the date of donation. Information Technology Equipment including software is being capitalized and included in furniture, fixtures and equipment in accordance with NMAC 2.20.1.9 C (5).

The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend asset lives are not capitalized.

Major outlays for capital assets and improvements are capitalized as projects are constructed. No interest was included as part of the cost of capital assets under construction. Property, plant, and equipment of the primary government are depreciated using the straight line method over the following estimated useful lives:

**Unearned Revenues:** Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that grant revenue be recognized at the time the related expense is made if the expenditure of funds is the prime factor for determining eligibility for reimbursement; therefore, amounts received and not expended in the Special Revenue Funds are shown as unearned revenues. Amounts receivable from the property taxes levied for the current year that are not considered to be “available” under the current financial resources measurement focus are reported as unearned revenues in the governmental fund financial statements.

**Deferred inflows/outflows of resources:** GASB 63 amended previous guidance on Unearned Revenues in the Government-Wide Financial Statements to include deferred outflow of resources, which is the consumption of net assets by the government that is applicable to a future reporting period and deferred inflow of resources, which is acquisition of net assets by the government that is applicable to a future reporting period.

**Compensated Absences:** Twelve month employees will earn 10 days annual leave per contract year. The Superintendent will earn 15 days of annual leave per contract year. Twelve month employees may accumulate up to 20 days of annual leave. The Superintendent may accumulate up to 30 days of annual leave. Any leave beyond these limits must be used by June 30<sup>th</sup> of the current contract year or within 18 months after the granting of a special provision to extend the limits. Special provisions to extend the limits of annual leave by twelve month employees may be approved by the Superintendent. The Superintendent may extend the limits of accumulated annual leave by receiving the approval of the board of education. Upon cancellation of the employment contract, no payment shall be made for more than 20 days of unused annual leave for twelve month employee and 30 days of unused annual leave for the Superintendent.

**Long-term Obligations:** In the government-wide financial statements, long-term debt and other long-term obligations are reported as liabilities in the applicable governmental activities statement of net position. Bond issuance costs are reflected as a current period expense per GASB 65.

In the fund financial statements, governmental fund types recognize bond premiums and discounts, as well as bond issuance costs, during the current period. The face amount of the debt issued is reported as other financing sources. Premiums received on debt issuances are reported as other financing sources while discounts on debt issuances are reported as other financing uses. Issuance costs, whether or not withheld from the actual debt proceeds received, are reported as debt service expenditures.

**Fund Equity:** In the fund financial statements, governmental funds report reservations of fund balance that are not available for appropriation or are legally restricted by outside parties for use for a specific purpose. Designations of fund balance represent tentative management plans that are subject to change. These designations are established to earmark resources for specific future use and to indicate that the fund equity does not represent available spendable resources.

*Net investment in capital assets* consists of net position including restricted capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances of any bonds, mortgages, notes or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of these assets.

*Restricted fund balance* represents amounts that are constrained either by: 1) externally imposed by creditors (such as debt covenants), grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments; or 2) imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

*Committed fund balance* represents amounts that are useable only for specific purposes by formal action of the government's highest level of decision-making authority.

*Assigned fund balance* represents amounts that are intended to be used for specific purposes, but are neither restricted nor committed. Intent is expressed by the governing body or a subordinate high-level body or official whom the governing body has delegated.

*Unassigned fund balance* is the residual classification for the general fund and represents the amounts that have not been assigned to other funds, and that have not been restricted, committed, or assigned to specific purposes.

The District's policy is to apply restricted resources first when an expense is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net positions are available.

**Reclassifications:** Certain amounts presented in prior year data have been reclassified in order to be consistent with the current year's presentation.

**Estimates:** The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

**Pensions:** For purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, and pension expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the Educational Retirement Board (ERB) and additions to/deductions from ERB's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by ERB, on the economic resources measurement focus and accrual basis of accounting. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

E. *Revenues*

**State Equalization Guarantee:** School districts in the State of New Mexico receive a 'state equalization guarantee distribution' which is defined as "that amount of money distributed to each school district to insure that the school district's operating revenue, including its local and federal revenues as defined (in Chapter 22, Section 825, NMSA 1978) is at least equal to the school district's program costs.

A school district's program costs are determined through the use of various formulas using 'program units' which take into consideration 1) early childhood education; 2) basic education; 3) special education; 4) bilingual-multicultural education; 5) size, etc. Payment is made from the public school fund under the authority of the Director of Public School Finance. The District received \$3,119,369 in state equalization guarantee distributions during the year ended June 30, 2017.

**Tax Revenues:** The District receives mill levy and ad-valorem tax revenues primarily for operational, debt service and capital outlay purposes. Property taxes are assessed on January 1st of each year and are payable in two equal installments, on November 10th of the year in which the tax bill is prepared and April 10th of the following year with the levies becoming delinquent 30 days (one month) thereafter. The District recognizes tax revenues in the period for which they are levied in the government-wide financial statements. The District records only the portion of the taxes considered 'measurable' and 'available' in the governmental fund financial statements. The District recognized \$567,338 in tax revenues in the governmental fund financial statements during the year ended June 30, 2017. Descriptions of the individual debt service and capital outlay funds contained in these financial statements include information regarding the authority for the collection and use of these taxes.

**Transportation Distribution:** School districts in the State of New Mexico receive student transportation distributions. The transportation distribution is allocated to each school district in accordance with formulas developed by the State Transportation Director and the Director of Public School Finance. The funds shall be used only for the purpose of making payments to each school district for the to-and-from school transportation costs of students in grades K through twelve attending public school within the school district. The District received \$470,830 in transportation distributions during the year ended June 30, 2017.

**Instructional Materials:** The District had allocations allowed by the State for the current year of \$16,429. Of the allocation, the District used \$16,429 to purchase textbooks during the year. Allocations received and utilized are reflected in revenue and expenditures of the General Fund.

**NOTE 2. Stewardship, Compliance and Accountability**

*Budgetary Information*

Budgets for the General, Special Revenue, Debt Service, and Capital Projects Funds are prepared by management and are approved by the local Board of Education and the School Budget and Planning Unit of the Department of Education. Auxiliary student activity accounts are not budgeted.

These budgets are prepared on the Non-GAAP cash basis, excluding encumbrances, and secure appropriation of funds for only one year. Carryover funds must be re-appropriated in the budget of the subsequent fiscal year. Because the budget process in the State of New Mexico requires that the beginning cash balance be appropriated in the budget of the subsequent fiscal year, such appropriated balance is legally restricted and is therefore presented as a designated portion of fund balance.

Actual expenditures may not exceed the budget on function level, i.e., each budgeted expenditure must be within budgeted amounts. Budgets may be amended in two ways. If a budget transfer is necessary within a major category called a 'series' this may be accomplished with only local Board of Education approval. If a transfer between 'series' or a budget increase is required, approval must also be obtained from Public School Finance Division.

The budgetary information presented in these financial statements has been amended in accordance with the above procedures.

The School District follows these procedures in establishing the budgetary data reflected in the financial statements:

1. In April or May, the superintendent submits to the Board of Education a proposed operating budget of the fiscal year commencing the following July. The operating budget includes proposed expenditures and the means of financing them, and has approval by the Department of Education.
2. In May or June, the budget is approved by the Board of Education.
3. The school board meeting is open for the general public unless a closed meeting has been called.
4. The superintendent is authorized to transfer budgeted amounts between departments within any fund; however, any revisions that alter the total expenditures of any fund must be approved by the school board and the State of New Mexico Department of Education.
5. Formal budgetary integration is employed as a management control device during the year for the General Fund, Special Revenue Funds, Debt Service Fund and Capital Projects Funds.
6. Budgets for the General, Special Revenue, Debt Service and Capital Projects Funds are adopted on a basis not consistent with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). Encumbrances are treated the same way for GAAP purposes and for Budget purposes.

The School Board may approve amendments to the appropriated budget, which are required when a change is made affecting budgeted ending fund balance. New Mexico Administrative Code 6.20.2.9 prohibits a school district from exceeding budgetary control at the function level.

The District is required to balance its budgets each year. Accordingly, amounts that are excess or deficient are presented as changes in cash designated for expenditures, not as an excess or deficiency of revenues over expenditures.

**NOTE 3. Cash and Temporary Investments**

State statutes authorize the investment of the District funds in a wide variety of instruments including certificates of deposit and other similar obligations, state investment pool, money market accounts, and United States Government obligations. All invested funds of the District properly followed State investment requirements as of June 30, 2017.

Deposits of funds may be made in interest or non-interest bearing checking accounts in one or more banks or savings and loan associations within the geographical boundaries of the District. Deposits may be made to the extent that they are insured by an agency of the United States or by collateral deposited as security or by bond given by the financial institution.

The rate of interest in non-demand interest-bearing accounts shall be set by the State Board of Finance, but in no case shall the rate of interest be less than one hundred percent of the asked price on United States treasury bills of the same maturity on the day of deposit.

Excess of funds may be temporarily invested in securities which are issued by the State or by the United States government, or by their departments or agencies, and which are either direct obligations of the State or the United States or are backed by the full faith and credit of those governments.

The collateral pledged is listed on Schedule I of this report. The types of collateral allowed are limited to direct obligations of the United States Government and all bonds issued by any agency, District or political subdivision of the State of New Mexico.

According to the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, public unit deposits are funds owned by the public unit. Time deposits, savings deposits and interest bearing NOW accounts of a public unit in an institution in the same state will be insured up to \$250,000 in aggregate and separate from the \$250,000 coverage for public unit demand deposits at the same institution. Fort Sumner Municipal Schools' funds were not in an interest bearing account and therefore were subject to the Dodd Frank Act.

**Deposits**

NM State Statutes require collateral pledged for deposits in excess of the federal deposit insurance to be delivered, or a joint safekeeping receipt be issued, to the District for a least one half of the amount on deposit with the institution. The schedule listed below will meet the State of New Mexico, Office of the State Auditor's requirements in reporting the insured portion of the deposits.

Custodial Credit Risk- Investments

For an investment, custodial credit risk is the risk that, in the event of the failure of the counterparty, the District will not be able to recover the value of its investments or collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. The District does not have an investment policy for custodial credit risk. New Mexico State Statutes require collateral pledged to be delivered for the securities underlying an overnight repurchase agreement, or a join safekeeping receipt to be issued to the District for at least on hundred two percent of the fair value of the securities underlying overnight repurchase accounts invested with the institution.

As of June 30, 2017, the District had no investment in the State Treasurer Local Government and therefore no balances were exposed to custodial credit risk.

The New MexiGrow Local Governmental Investment Pool's (LGIP) investments are valued at fair value based on quoted market prices as of the valuation date. The LGIP is not SEC registered. The new Mexico State Treasurer is authorized to invest the short-term investment funds, with the advice and consent of the State Board of Finance, in accordance with Sections 6-10-10 I through 6-10-10-P and Section 6-10-10.1 A and E, NMSA 1978. The pool does not have unit shares. Per Section 6-10-10.1F, NMSA 19078, as the end of each month all interest earned is distributed by the State Treasurer to the contributing entities in amounts directly proportionate to the respective amounts deposited in the fund and the length of time the fund amounts were invested. Participation in the LGIP is voluntary.

Interest Rate Risk and Credit Rating- Investment in State Treasurer's LGIP

The District does not have a formal policy limiting investment maturities to manage its exposure to fair value losses from increasing interest rates. The District's investments at June 30, 2017 include the following:

**NOTE 8. Long-term Debt**

The District issues general obligation bonds to provide funds for the acquisition and construction of major capital facilities. General obligation bonds are direct obligations and pledge the full faith and credit of the District. These bonds are issued with varying terms and varying amounts of principal maturing each year. All general obligation bonds as of June 30, 2017 are for governmental activities. The following bonds were issued for the purpose of erecting, furnishing, remodeling and making additions to District buildings and improving District grounds. A tax is annually assessed, levied and collected upon all taxable property within the District for the purpose of providing the necessary funds to meet the interest and principal payments as they become due.

**NOTE 9. Risk Management**

The District is a member of the New Mexico Public School Insurance Authority (NMPSIA). The Authority was created to provide comprehensive core insurance programs by expanding the pool of subscribers to maximize cost containment opportunities for required insurance coverage. The District pays an annual premium to the NMPSIA based on claim experience and the status of the pool. The Risk Management Program includes Workers Compensation, General and Automobile Liability, Automobile Physical Damage, and Property and Crime coverage. Also included under the risk management program are Boiler, Machinery and Student Accident Insurance.

The NMPSIA provides coverage for up to a maximum of \$500,000,000 for each property damage claim with a \$750 deductible to each building. General liability coverage is afforded to all employees, volunteers and school board members and the limit is subject to the NMSA Tort Claims Act on a per occurrence basis. The automobile and property liability limit is subject to the provisions of the Tort Claims Act. The crime limit is \$250,000 per occurrence for Faithful Performance. A limit of \$250,000 applies to Depositor's Forgery, Credit Card Forgery, and Money Orders. A limit of \$100,000 applies to Money and Securities, which include a \$750 deductible.

In case the NMPSIA's assets are not sufficient to meet its liability claims, the agreement provides that subscribers, including the District, cannot be assessed additional premiums to cover the shortfall. As of June 30, 2017, there have been no claims that have exceeded insurance coverage.

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**NOTE 11. Pension Plan – Educational Retirement Board (ERB)**

*Plan description.* The New Mexico Educational Retirement Act (ERA) was enacted in 1957. The act created the Educational Employees Retirement Plan (Plan) and, to administer it, the New Mexico Educational Retirement Board (NMERB). The Plan is included in NMERB's comprehensive annual financial report. The report can be found on NMERB's Web site at [https://www.nmerb.org/Annual\\_reports.html](https://www.nmerb.org/Annual_reports.html).

The Plan is a cost-sharing, multiple-employer pension plan established to provide retirement and disability benefits for certified teachers and other employees of the state's public schools, institutions of higher learning, and state agencies providing educational programs. Additional tenets of the ERA can be found in Section 22-11-1 through 22-11-52, NMSA 1978, as amended.

The Plan is considered a component unit of the State's financial reporting entity. The ERA assigns the authority to establish and amend benefit provisions to a seven-member Board of Trustees (Board); the state legislature has the authority to set or amend contribution rates and other terms of the Plan which is a pension benefit trust fund of the State of New Mexico. NMERB is self-funded through investment income and educational employer contributions. The Plan does not receive General Fund Appropriations from the State of New Mexico.

All accumulated assets are held by the Plan in trust to pay benefits, including refunds of contributions as defined in the terms of the Plan. Eligibility for membership in the Plan is a condition of employment, as defined Section 22-11-2, NMSA 1978. Employees of public schools, universities, colleges, junior colleges, technical-vocational institutions, state special schools, charter schools, and state agencies providing an educational program, who are employed more than 25% of a full-time equivalency, are required to be members of the Plan, unless specifically excluded.

**Benefits benefit** – A member's retirement benefit is determined by a formula which includes three component parts: 1) the member's final average salary (FAS), 2) the number of years of service credit, and 3) a 0.0235 multiplier. The FAS is the average of the member's salaries for the last five years of service or any other consecutive five-year period, whichever is greater.

**Summary of Plan Provisions for Retirement Eligibility** – For members employed before July 1, 2010, a member is eligible to retire when one of the following events occurs:

- The member's age and earned service credit add up to the sum of 75 or more,
- The member is at least sixty-five years of age and has five or more years of earned service credit, or
- The member has service credit totaling 25 years or more.

Chapter 288, Laws of 2009 changed the eligibility requirements for new members first employed on, or after, July 1, 2010 and before July 1, 2013. The eligibility for a member who either becomes a new member on or after July 1, 2010 and before July 1, 2013, or at any time prior to July 1, 2010 refunded all member contributions and then becomes re-employed after July 1, 2010 is as follows:

The member's age and earned service credit add up to the sum of 80 or more,

The member is at least sixty-seven years of age and has five or more years of earned service credit, or

The member has service credit totaling 30 years or more.

Section 2-11-23.2, NMSA 1978 added eligibility requirements for new members who were first employed on or after July 1, 2013, or who were employed before July 1, 2013 but terminated employment and subsequently withdrew all contributions, and returned to work for an ERB employer on or after July 1, 2013. These members must meet one of the following requirements.

The member's minimum age is 55, and has earned 30 or more years of service credit. Those who retire earlier than age 55, but with 30 years of earned service credit will have a reduction in benefits to the actuarial equivalent of retiring at age 55.

The member's minimum age and earned service credit add up to the sum of 80 or more. Those who retire under the age of 65, and who have fewer than 30 years of earned service credit will receive reduced retirement benefits

The member's age is 67, and has earned 5 or more years of service credit.

**Forms of Payment** – The benefit is paid as a monthly life annuity with a guarantee that, if the payments made do not exceed the member's accumulated contributions plus accumulated interest, determined as of the date of retirement, the balance will be paid in a lump sum to the member's surviving beneficiary.

**Benefit Options** – The Plan has three benefit options available.

**Option A – Straight Life Benefit** – The single life annuity option has no reductions to the monthly benefit, and there is no continuing benefit due to a beneficiary or estate, except the balance, if any, of member contributions plus interest less benefits paid prior to the member's death.

**Option B – Joint 100% Survivor Benefit** – The single life annuity monthly benefit is reduced to provide for a 100% survivor's benefit. The reduced benefit is payable during the life of the member, with the provision that, upon death, the same benefit is paid to the beneficiary for his or her lifetime. If the beneficiary predeceases the member, the member's monthly benefit is increased to the amount the member would have received under Option A Straight Life benefit. The member's increased monthly benefit commences in the month following the beneficiary's death.

**Option C – Joint 50% Survivor Benefit** – The single life annuity monthly benefit is reduced to provide for a 50% survivor's benefit. The reduced benefit is payable during the life of the member, with the provision that, upon death, the reduced 50% benefit is paid to the beneficiary for his or her lifetime. If the beneficiary predeceases the member, the member's monthly benefit is increased to the amount the member would have received under Option A Straight Life benefit. The member's increased monthly benefit commences in the month following the beneficiary's death.

**Disability Benefit** – An NMERB member is eligible for disability benefits if they have acquired at least ten years of earned service credit and is found totally disabled. The disability benefit is equal to 2% of the member's Final Average Salary (FAS) multiplied by the number of years of total service credits. However, the disability benefit shall not be less than the smaller of (a) one-third of the member's FAS or (b) 2% of the member's FAS multiplied by total years of service credit projected to age 60.

**Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA)** – All retired members and beneficiaries receiving benefits receive an automatic adjustment in their benefit on July 1 following the later of 1) the year a member retires, or 2) the year a member reaches age 65 (Tier 1 and Tier 2) or age 67 (Tier 3).

Tier 1 membership is comprised of employees who became members prior to July 1, 2010

Tier 2 membership is comprised of employees who became members after July 1, 2010, but prior to July 1, 2013

Tier 3 membership is comprised of employees who became members on or after July 1, 2013

As of July 1, 2013, for current and future retirees the COLA is immediately reduced until the Plan is 100% funded. The COLA reduction is based on the median retirement benefit of all retirees excluding disability retirements. Retirees with benefits at or below the median and with 25 or more years of service credit will have a 10% COLA reduction; their average COLA will be 1.8%. Once the funding is greater than 90%, the COLA reductions will decrease. The retirees with benefits at or below the median and with 25 or more years of service credit will have a 5% COLA reduction; their average COLA will be 1.9%.

Members on disability retirement are entitled to a COLA commencing on July 1 of the third full year following disability retirement. A member on regular retirement who can prove retirement because of a disability may qualify for a COLA beginning July 1 in the third full year of retirement.

**Refund of Contributions** – Members may withdraw their contributions only when they terminate covered employment in the State and their former employer(s) certification determination has been received by NMERB. Interest is paid to members when they withdraw their contributions following termination of employment at a rate set by the Board. Interest is not earned on contributions credited to accounts prior to July 1, 1971, or for contributions held for less than one year.

**Contributions** – For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017 and 2016 educational employers contributed to the Plan based on the following rate schedule.

The contribution requirements are established in statute under Chapter 10, Article 11, NMSA 1978. The requirements may be amended by acts of the New Mexico Legislature. For the fiscal years ended June 30, 2017 and 2016, the District paid employee and employer contributions of \$240,423 and \$313,958, which equal the amount of the required contributions for each fiscal year.

**Pension Liabilities, Pension Expense, and Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to Pensions** – At June 30, 2017, the District reported a liability of \$5,713,249 for its proportionate share of the net pension liability. The net pension liability was measured as of June 30, 2016, and the total pension liability used to calculate the net pension liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of June 30, 2015. The total pension liability was rolled-forward from the valuation date to the plan year ending June 30, 2016 using generally accepted actuarial principles. Therefore, the employer’s portion was established as of the measurement date of June 30, 2016. There were no significant events or changes in benefit provision that required an adjustment to the roll-forward liabilities as of June 30, 2016. The District’s proportion of the net pension liability was based on a projection of the District’s long-term share of contributions to the pension plan relative to the projected contributions of all participating educational institutions, actuarially determined. At June 30, 2016, the District’s proportion was .07939%, which was an increase of 0.00105% from its proportion measured as of June 30, 2015.

The actuarial assumptions and methods are set by the Plan's Board of Trustees, based upon recommendations made by the Plan's actuary. The Board adopted new assumptions on June 12, 2015 in conjunction with the six-year actuarial experience study period ending June 30, 2014. At that time, the Board adopted several assumption changes, which included a decrease in the annual wage inflation rate from 4.25% to 3.75%, and changes to the mortality rates, disability rates, and retirement rates for members who joined the plan after June 30, 2010. In addition, the board lowered the population growth rate assumption to zero.

The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was determined using a building-block method in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class. These ranges are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighting the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation. The target allocation and best estimates of arithmetic real rates of return for each major asset class are summarized in the following table:

*Discount rate.* A single discount rate of 7.75% was used to measure the total pension liability as of June 30, 2016. This single discount rate was based on a long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments of 7.75%, compounded annually, net of expense. Based on the stated assumptions and the projection of cash flows, the plan’s fiduciary net position and future contributions were projected to be available to finance all projected future benefit payments of current plan members. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all period of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability.

The projections of cash flows used to determine this single discount rate assumed that plan member and employer contributions will be made at the current statutory levels.

**NOTE 12. Post-Employment Benefits**

*Plan description:* Fort Sumner Municipal Schools contributes to the New Mexico Retiree Health Care Fund, a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit post-employment healthcare plan administered by the New Mexico Retiree Health Care Authority (RHCA). The RHCA provides health care insurance and prescription drug benefits to retired employees of participating New Mexico government agencies, their spouses, dependents, and surviving spouses and dependents. The RHCA Board was established by the Retiree Health Care Act (Chapter 10, Article 7C, NMSA 1978). The Board is responsible for establishing and amending benefit provisions of the healthcare plan and is also authorized to designate optional and/or voluntary benefits like dental, vision, supplemental life insurance, and long-term care policies.

Eligible retirees are: (1) retirees who make contributions to the fund for at least five years prior to retirement and whose eligible employer during that period of time made contributions as a participant in the Retiree Health Care Act on the person's behalf, unless that person retires before the employer's NMRHCA effective date, in which event the time period required for the employee and employer contributions shall become the period of time between the employer's effective date and the date of retirement; or (2) retirees defined by the Act who retired prior to July 1, 1990; 3) former legislators who served at least two years; and 4) former governing authority members who served at least four years.

The RHCA issues a publicly available stand-alone financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the postemployment healthcare plan. That report and further information can be obtained by writing to the Retiree Health Care Authority at 4308 Carlisle NE, Suite 104, Albuquerque, NM 87107.

*Funding Policy.* The Retiree Health Care Act (Section 10-7C-13 NMSA 1978) authorizes the RHCA Board to establish the monthly premium contributions that retirees are required to pay for healthcare benefits. Each participating retiree pays a monthly premium according to a service based subsidy rate schedule for the medical plus basic life plan plus an additional participation fee of five dollars if the eligible participant retired prior to the employer's RCHA effective date or is a former legislator or former governing authority member. Former legislators and governing authority members are required to pay 100% of the insurance premium to cover their claims and the administrative expenses of the plan. The monthly premium rate schedule can be obtained from the RCHA or viewed on their website at [www.nmrhca.stat.nm.us](http://www.nmrhca.stat.nm.us).

The employer, employee and retiree contributions are required to be remitted to the RHCA on a monthly basis. The statutory requirement for the contributions can be changed by the New Mexico State Legislature. Employers that chose to become participating employers after January 1, 1998 are required to make contributions to the RHCA fund in the amount determined to be appropriate by the Board.

The Retiree Health Care Act (Section 10-7C-15 NMSA 1978) is the statutory authority that establishes the required contributions of participating employers and their employees. For employees that were members of an enhanced retirement plan (state police and adult correctional officer member coverage plan 1; municipal police member coverage plan 3, 4 or 5; municipal fire member coverage plan 3, 4, or 5; municipal detention office member coverage plan 1; and members pursuant to the Judicial Retirement Act) during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2014, the statute required each participating employer to contribute 2.5% of each participating employee's annual salary; and each participating employee was required to contribute 1.25% of their salary. For employees that were not members of an enhanced retirement plan during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2014, the statute required each participating employer to contribute 2.0% of each participating employee's annual salary; and each participating employee was required to contribute 1.25% of their salary. For employees that were not members of an enhanced retirement plan during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017, the statute required each participating employer to contribute 2.0% of each employee's annual salary; each participating employee was required to contribute 1.0% of their salary. In addition, pursuant to Section 10-7C-15 (G) NMSA 1978, at the first session of the Legislature following July 1, 2013, the legislature shall review and adjust the distributions pursuant to Section 7-1-6.1 NMSA 1978 and the employer and employee contributions to the authority in order to ensure the actuarial soundness of the benefits provided under the Retiree Health Care Act.

The District's contributions to the RHCA for the years ended June 30, 2017, 2016 and 2015 were \$45,765, 45,384, and \$44,601, respectively, which equal the required contributions for each year.

**NOTE 13. Contingent Liabilities**

Amounts received or receivable from grantor agencies are subject to audit and adjustment by grantor agencies. Any disallowed claims, including amounts already collected, may constitute a liability of the applicable funds. The amount, if any, of expenditures which may be disallowed by the grantor cannot be determined at this time, although the School expects such amount, if any, to be immaterial.

The District is involved in various claims and lawsuits arising in the normal course of business. Although the outcome of these lawsuits is not presently determinable, it is the opinion of the District's legal counsel that resolution of these matters will not have a material adverse effect on the financial condition of the District.

**NOTE 14. Surety Bond**

The officials and certain employees of the District are covered by a surety bond as required by Section 12-6-7, NMSA, 1978 Compilation.

**NOTE 15. Non-Cash Federal Assistance**

The District receives USDA Commodities for use in sponsoring the National School Lunch and Breakfast programs. The value of commodities received for the year ended June 30, 2017 was \$11,746.

**NOTE 16. Memorandum of Understanding/Joint Powers Agreement**

The Special Revenue Funds are used to account for Federal, State and Local funded grants. These grants are awarded to the District with the purpose of accomplishing specific educational tasks. Grants accounted for in the Special Revenue Funds include:

**Food Services** – This fund is utilized to account for Federal and Local sources of income relating to the food service programs. The Food Services Fund is segregated into two categories, one being the Federal funds and the other being Non-Federal funds. Federal funds consist of the National School Lunch Program, which is administered by the State of New Mexico for the purpose of making breakfast and lunch available to all school children and to encourage the domestic consumption of agricultural commodities and other food components. The Non-Federal funds consist of income derived from Snack-Bar facilities located in the District. Authority for the creation of this fund is NMSA 22-13-13. No minimum balance required according to legislation.

**Athletics** - This fund is used to account for fees generated at athletic activities throughout the School District. The gate receipts are obtained from the general public and are expended in this fund. The authority for creation of this fund is 6.20.2 NMAC. No minimum balance required according to legislation.

**Title I** – This fund’s major objectives are to provide supplemental educational opportunities for academically disadvantaged children in the area where they reside. Campuses are identified for program participation by the percentage of students on free or reduced price lunches. Any school with a free and reduced price lunch percentage that is equal to or greater than the total district percentage becomes eligible for program participation. Any student whose test scores fall below District established criteria and who is attending a Title I campus is eligible to receive Title I services. Poverty is the criteria that identify a campus; education need determines the students to be served. Federal revenues accounted for in this fund are allocated to the District through the New Mexico Department of Education. Authority for the creation of this fund is Part A of Chapter I of Title I of Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) of 1965, as amended, Public Law 103-383. No minimum balance required according to legislation.

**IDEA B Entitlement** – The purpose of this program is to account for revenue used to help maximize the resources in meeting the objective of handicapped children. The federal revenues in this fund are received from and administered by the New Mexico Department of Education. Authority for the creation of this fund is Part B of the Handicapped Act, Public Law 105-17. No minimum balance required according to legislation.

**IDEA-B Preschool** - The objective of the Assistance to States for the Education of Handicapped Children Program is to assist in providing free, appropriate public education to all handicapped children from ages three to five. Federal revenues accounted for in this fund are allocated to the District through the New Mexico Department of Children, Youth and Families. Authority for creation of this fund is Public Law 105-17. No minimum balance required according to legislation.

**IDEA-B Risk Pool** - The objective of the Assistance to States for the Education of Handicapped Children Program is to assist in providing free, appropriate public education to all handicapped children from ages three to five. Federal revenues accounted for in this fund are allocated to the District through the New Mexico Department of Children, Youth and Families. Authority for creation of this fund is Public Law 105-17. No minimum balance required according to legislation.

**Teacher/Principal Training** – The purpose of this fund is to improve the skills of teachers and the quality of instruction in mathematics and science, and also to increase the accessibility of such instruction to all students. Authority for creation of this fund is Title II of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) of 1965 as amended, Public Law 103-382. No minimum balance required according to legislation.

**School Buses** – The objective is to provide funds to purchase buses for student transportation. Funding is provided by the New Mexico Public Education Department. No minimum balance required according to legislation.

**All funds are on a reimbursement basis, therefore there are no reverting fund requirements.**

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information and the budgetary comparisons of the General fund and Special Revenue funds, of the Fort Sumner Municipal Schools as of and for the year ended June 30, 2017, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Fort Sumner Municipal Schools' basic financial statements, and the combining and individual fund statements of the Fort Sumner Municipal Schools, presented as supplemental information, and have issued our report thereon dated September 14, 2017.

**Internal Control Over Financial Reporting**

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the Fort Sumner Municipal Schools' internal control over financial reporting to determine the auditing procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Fort Sumner Municipal Schools' internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Fort Sumner Municipal Schools' internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees in the normal course of performing their assigned function, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency or a combination of deficiencies in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses and therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that were not identified. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified. We did identify certain deficiencies in internal control, described in the accompanying schedule of findings and responses that we consider to be significant deficiencies. The significant deficiencies are described as 2016-002, 2016-004, and 2017-003. Given these limitations, we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be a material weakness.

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### **Compliance and Other Matters**

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Fort Sumner Municipal Schools' financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed two instances of noncompliance or other matters that is required to be reported under Government Auditing Standards and which is described in the accompanying schedule of findings and response as item 2017-001 and 2017-002.

### **Fort Sumner Municipal Schools' Responses to Findings**

Fort Sumner Municipal Schools' responses to the finding identified in our audit is described in the accompanying schedule of findings and responses. Fort Sumner Municipal Schools' responses were not subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and, accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

### **Purpose of this Report**

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the result of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Fort Sumner Municipal Schools' internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards in considering the Fort Sumner Municipal Schools' internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.

**2017-004[ 2016 – 002]– Controls over Cash Receipts (Significant Deficiency) repeated and revised**

CONDITION: During our test work of activity cash receipts we noted eleven (11) exceptions. Ten (10) of these exceptions were due to deposits not being made timely, within 24 hours and one (1) receipt that did not have adequate supporting documentation.

During our test work over operational cash receipts we noted sixteen (16) exceptions. Four (4) of these receipts did not contain adequate supporting documentation to be able to ascertain if the deposits were made timely, within 24 hours. Nine (9) receipts lacked signatures of athletic sponsors on the cash documentation agreeing to the monies receipted. Three (3) transactions were incorrect postings to the general ledger.

The exceptions noted result in an error rate of 14.14 percent. When projected over the tested population of 721 cash receipts, it is projected that there could be as many as 102 errors.

Despite providing staff training during hte fiscal year, the District made only minimal progress on this issue.

CRITERIA: PSAB18 Student Activities and NMAC 6.20.2.11 Section B part C states: “An internal control structure is required to demonstrate the school district’s ability to record, process, summarize and report financial data consistent with the following financial statement assertions:(1) rights and ownership;(2) existence and occurrence;(3) valuation and allocations;(4) completeness; and, (5) presentation and disclosure. NMAC 6.20.2.14A-C Cash Control Standards state the following:

- A. School districts shall establish and maintain a cash management program to safeguard cash and provide prompt and accurate reporting that adheres to cash management requirements of the office of management and budget (OMB) Circular A-102, and applicable state and federal laws and regulations.
- B. The school district shall issue a factory pre-numbered receipt for all money received. Pre-numbered receipts are to be controlled and secured. If a receipt is voided, all copies shall be marked "VOID" and retained in the receipt book.
- C. Money received and receipted shall be deposited in the bank within twenty-four (24) hours or one banking day. If the distance to the bank is considerable, or the cash collection is limited to small amounts and/or low volume and it is impractical to meet the twenty-four hour/one banking day requirement, the local board may request approval from the department for an alternative plan. The bank deposit slip shall have the numbers from applicable receipts entered on it or attached as a reference.

CAUSE: The internal controls required by PSAB 18 and NMAC 6.20.2 were not being properly followed. It appears it may be due to unfamiliarity with the internal control requirements of PSAB 18 and NMAC 6.20.2

EFFECT: The District appears to be non-compliant with PSAB 18 and NMAC 6.20.2 and inadequate controls in cash management of the activity funds could result in over spent accounts and/or have monies for activity funds that are not properly accounted for.

RECOMMENDATION: The District should evaluate and ensure that internal controls on activities fund accounts are in accordance with PSAB 18 and NMAC 6.20.2. All personnel and staff involved in the Activity Funds should be trained on the procedures and the district’s responsibilities under PSAB 18 and NMAC 6.20.2.

CLIENT RESPONSE: The Superintendent will receipt all money received from students ensuring for proper documentation of time and date monies were received. The district will also require that individuals working and collecting monies at the gate sign the cash documentation sheets. This will be completed by December 31, 2017.

**2017-005 [2016-004] Noncompliance with the Procurement Process of Cash Disbursements (Significant Deficiency) repeated and revised**

CONDITION: During our test work over cash disbursements and activity cash disbursements, we noted fourteen (14) payment vouchers with exceptions. The exceptions contained the following:

- We noted one (1) transaction where the check was miscoded in the general ledger resulting in an overstatement of expenditures.
- We noted two (2) transactions where the purchase order was less than the amount paid and there was not a revised purchase order.
- We noted ten (11) transactions lacking adequate supporting documentation such as a purchase requisition, purchase order or invoice.

The exceptions noted result in an error rate of 6.54% percent. When projected to the population of 1,014 transactions, it is projected that there could be as many as 67 errors.

The Business Manager made progress with this finding during the year but more effort is necessary to ensure compliance.

CRITERIA: NMSA 1978 section 6-5-2 the NM Procurement Code (13-1-28 to 13-1-199 NMSA 1978) require that 1) all invoicing must be performed in a timely manner and 2) support documents must accompany all expenses, be reviewed, and signed off by management prior to payment.

CAUSE: It appears that this may be due to an oversight in the review and approval of expenditures.

EFFECT: Without adequate supporting documentation on the approval for purchases, there can be risks for unsupported or improper purchases with public funding and the potential to negatively affect fund budgets.

RECOMMENDATION: The District is encouraged to have all personnel in charge of preparing, reviewing, and approving disbursements perform a review of all supporting documents to ensure accuracy and appropriate payments for purchases and reimbursements.

CLIENT RESPONSE: The Superintendent will make sure the Business Manager receives proper training as to where checks should be posted as well as making sure to revise all purchase orders that need changes made. The district will make sure that all contracts with bus contractors have an amendment when renegotiated. This will be completed by December 31, 2017.

**2017-001 Excess Expenditures over Budget (Control Deficiency)**

**CONDITION:** During our testwork of budgetary compliance, we noted one fund that had expenditures in excess of budget. The Debt Service fund was over budget by \$989 related to County Collection costs for Property taxes.

**CRITERIA:** NMSA 6-6-6 requires that actual expenditures do not exceed budgeted expenditures by function or fund.

**CAUSE:** The District estimated the expenditures based on prior year collections and monitors this on a quarterly basis. Since the June property tax collections do not get remitted to the District until July or August, it is difficult to know if the district has estimated correctly.

**EFFECT:** The District does not appear to be in compliance with State regulations related to the budgetary process

**RECOMMENDATION:** We recommend that the District implement controls to monitor the spending of funds and to make budget adjustments whenever necessary.

**CLIENT RESPONSE:** The Superintendent will limit journal entries being made throughout the year. If it becomes necessary to make journal entries proper documentation for such entries will be attached to the journal entry. This will be completed by December 31, 2017.

**2017-002 Inadequate Supporting Documentation for Journal Entries (Control Deficiency)**

CONDITION: During our review of journal entries made throughout the year under audit, it was noted that there was no supporting documentation for the entries made. Without adequate supporting documentation Precision Accounting, LLC was unable to verify if the entries were accurate.

CRITERIA: PSAB18 Student Activities and NMAC 6.20.2.11 Section B part C states: "An internal control structure is required to demonstrate the school district's ability to record, process, summarize and report financial data consistent with the following financial statement assertions:(1) rights and ownership;(2) existence and occurrence;(3) valuation and allocations;(4) completeness; and, (5) presentation and disclosure.

CAUSE: It appears that this may be due to unfamiliarity with the internal control requirements of PSAB 18 and NMAC 6.20.2.

EFFECT: The District appears to be non-compliant with PSAB 18 and NMAC 6.20.2 and inadequate controls in cash management could result in over spent accounts and/or have monies for funds that are not properly accounted for.

RECOMMENDATION: The District should evaluate and ensure that internal controls are in accordance with PSAB 18 and NMAC 6.20.11.

CLIENT RESPONSE: The Superintendent will increase budgeted amount making sure the district takes into account possible changes in taxes collected and the 1% fee paid to the district. This will be completed by ~~December~~ December 31,

**2017-003 Audit Committee does not comply with Section 22-8-12.3 (Significant Deficiency)**

CONDITION: The District has an audit committee but it is not in compliance with the requirements of Statute 22-8-12.3.

CRITERIA: NMSA 1978, statute 22-8-12.3 requires local school boards and governing authorities of charter schools to establish finance sub committees and audit committees. The Audit Committee should consist of at least two members of the board, a volunteer member who is a parent of a student attending the school district and one volunteer member who has experience in accounting and finance matters. The Superintendent and the School District Business Manager shall serve as the ex-officio members of the committee.

CAUSE: The District did appoint two board members to the audit committee and they have been overseeing the financial matters. The District did not realize that their audit committee did not meet the requirements under NMSA 1978, statute 22-8-12.3.

EFFECT: The District does not appear to meet the requirements of Section 22-8-12.3 for establishing an audit committee.

RECOMMENDATION: We recommend the District appoint an audit committee that meets the requirements as set forth above.

CLIENT RESPONSE: The Superintendent will add the needed members to the audit committee. This will be completed by December 31, 2017.
