### Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, the aggregate remaining fund information, and the budgetary comparisons for the general fund and major special revenue funds of Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2013, and the related notes to the financial statements which collectively comprise Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. We also have audited the financial statements of each of Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8's nonmajor governmental and the budgetary comparisons for the major capital project funds, debt service funds, and all nonmajor funds presented as supplementary information, as defined by the Government Accounting Standards Board, in the accompanying combining and individual fund financial statements as of and for the year ended June 30, 2013, as listed in the table of contents.

### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

### **Opinions**

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8, as of June 30, 2013, and the respective changes in financial position thereof and the respective budgetary comparisons for the general fund and major special revenue funds for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. In addition, in our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of each nonmajor governmental fund of Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8 as of June 30, 2013, and the respective changes in financial position thereof and the respective budgetary comparisons for the major capital project funds, debt service fund, and all nonmajor funds for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

#### Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis on pages 9-14 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

### Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8's financial statements, the combining and individual fund financial statements, and the budgetary comparisons. The Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards as required by Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, <u>Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations</u> and the other schedules required by 2.2.2.NMAC are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards and other schedules required by 2.2.2 NMAC are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the Schedule of Expenditures and other schedules required by 2.2.2 NMAC are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

### Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with <u>Government Auditing Standards</u>, we have also issued our report dated October 22, 2013 on our consideration of the Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with <u>Government Auditing Standards</u> in considering Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

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# STATE OF NEW MEXICO MORIARTY EDGEWOOD SCHOOLS MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2013

#### Introduction

This Management Discussion and Analysis of the financial operations of the Moriarty Edgewood Schools for the period ending June 30, 2013 represents the school district's eighth year implementation of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 34 (GASB 34). GASB 34 requires this written analysis as a part of the school district's financial reports and is intended to be an objective and easily readable discussion of the financial performance of the district. For school districts, GASB 34 has had a significant impact in the manner in which the financial statements are prepared, as well as the kinds of statements that are included in the report. There are two statements: a <u>Statement of Net Assets</u> which includes all of the assets and liabilities of the district and a <u>Statement of Activities</u>, which is a report that uses a net cost format with expenses reported by functions/programs. The Management Discussion and Analysis as well as the two statements, provide a review of the School District's *overall* financial activities using the accrual basis of accounting. Fund financial statements are reported on a modified accrual basis of accounting. The reports include a comparison with last fiscal year.

The annual audit report also consists of a series of detailed, audited financial statements and the notes to those statements. Also included in the report is the <u>Independent Auditor's Report</u>, the <u>Independent Auditor's Report on Compliance and on Internal Control Over Financial Reporting Based on an Audit of Financial Statements Performed in Accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, the <u>Independent Auditor's Report on Compliance with Requirements Applicable to Each Major Program and Internal Control over Compliance in Accordance with OMB Circular A-133, and a Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs.</u></u>

### Financial Highlights:

- The 2013 General Obligation Bond Election was passed with a 2 to 1 margin. The funds will be used for projects throughout the school district at each school site per the Facility Maser Plan.
- The school district continues to maintain a strong A1 rating from Moody's Investor Services on the issuance of General Obligation Bonds which helps lower interest rate costs to taxpayers in the district.
- Despite the continuing declining enrollment and reduced funding from the Public Education Department through the State Equalization Guarantee formula, the school district managed to maintain a strong cash balance of \$1,016,010 in FY 12-13 in the Operational Fund, plus amount due from other funds \$452,245 in the General Fund, making an overall increase to cash balance in the amount of \$101,203.00. Maintaining a healthy cash balance is an important factor in keeping a strong Bond rating.
- The district is in year one of a three-year contract with Accounting and Financial Solutions, LLC. Based on the FY 2011-2012 audit, which is sample based, the district had two findings. July 1, 2010, a new Legislation was enacted requiring school districts to establish an Audit Committee. The MESD has had an Audit Committee since 2010 and they have worked with the audit firm during the FY 12-13 audit.
- During FY 12-13, the district Business Office continued the annual training for all head secretaries and new principals. The training included the manual for Student Activity Accounts that is utilized in the schools and departments for administration of processing for all receipts and expenditures of activity funds.
- The Business Office continues to ensure all State Procurement Procedures are followed and improve the record keeping of all Capital Assets, as well as making the Purchasing Flowchart available in the Budget Handbooks and on web site.

### **OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

### **GOVERNMENT WIDE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

### Statement of Net Position

As noted above in the Introduction, GASB 34/63 requires that the <u>Statement of Net Position</u> now be included in the financial statements of the Moriarty Edgewood Schools audit report. This statement is prepared using the accrual method of accounting. This statement shows that as of June 30, 2013, the school district has Total Net Position of \$46,885,373. At June 30, 2012, Total Net Position was \$48,542,675 for a decrease of \$1,657,302. There is a total of \$9,826,242 of cash and cash equivalents on hand as of June 30, 2013 compared to \$5,679,140 on June 30, 2012 for an increase of \$4,147,102. However, the District received \$5,100,000 in the GO Bond issue in May 2013. Accounts Payable/Accrued Expenses are \$243,229 in FY 12-13 compared to \$507,064 for June 30, 2012 for a decrease of \$263,835 due primarily to the District's construction commitments. Net Position totaling \$1,193,860 are "unrestricted" and available to the district for budgeting in FY 13-14. There was a decrease in revenues of \$231,573, as corresponding expenses; the District was able to control other expenditures resulting in a decrease of \$1,070,842 from the prior year. Net Position reflects an increase of \$1,431,221. In addition, the repayment of long-term debt, and the fact that several new bonds are interest only payments until future years have contributed to the change in net assets.

### **Statement of Activities**

The <u>Statement of (Governmental) Activities</u> is another new statement required by GASB 34 and is prepared using the accrual method of accounting. This report complements the <u>Statement of Net Position</u> by showing the overall change in the school district's net assets for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2013. As of June 30, 2013, the total net position is \$46,885,373 which corresponds with the amount in the <u>Statement of Net Position</u>.

One of the most important questions that should be asked about the school district's finances is "Is the school district as a whole better off or worse off as a result of the year's activities?" The <u>Statement of Net Position</u> and <u>the Statement of Activities</u> report information about the school district as a whole and about its activities in a way that helps answer this question. These statements include all assets and liabilities using the accrual basis of accounting, which is similar to the accounting used by most private-sector companies. All of the current year's revenues and expenses are taken into account regardless of when cash is received or paid.

# MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2013

These two statements report the school district's net assets and changes in them. You can think of the school district's net assets-the difference between assets and liabilities-as a way to measure the school district's financial health or financial position. Over time, increases or decreases in the school district's net assets are one indicator of whether its financial health is improving or deteriorating. Other non-financial factors such as the assessed valuation and number of students in the district need to be considered to assess the overall financial health of the school district.

For June 30, 2013, Net Position-Ending totaled \$46,885,373 and at June 30, 2012, the total amount for Net Position-Ending was \$48,542,675 for a decrease of \$1,657,302. The financial condition of the district continues to improve in spite of the continued enrollment decline. There continues to be a significant investment to fund improvements to our buildings and land from district funds and from state funds.

#### **FUND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

#### **Balance Sheet Governmental Funds**

Fund Financial Statements are based on a modified accrual basis of accounting. The modified accrual basis of accounting records all accounts receivables, accounts payables and accrued salaries and benefits. All of the school district's financial operations/activities are reported here except for Student Activity Funds that are reported in Statement of Fiduciary Assets & Liabilities.

The Balance Sheet Governmental Funds For FY 12-13, the total assets of \$11,926,982 significantly exceed the total liabilities of \$1,654,725 with a fund balance of \$10,272,257. This is an increase from June 30, 2012 where total assets were \$9,679,460, total liabilities were \$3,334,216 and Fund Balance was \$6,345,244.

### Statement of Revenue, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balance

The Statement of Revenue, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balance. This report guides the reader to a meaningful overall view for the school district's revenues, expenditures and fund balance, and changes to the fund balance. Total revenues for FY 12-13 were \$32,358,118 or \$2,675,796 less than the FY11-12 total revenues of \$35,033,914. The largest source of revenue is state sources with \$23,262,541 or 72% of the total. State sources decreased by \$2,041,882 largely due to the declining in enrollment decreasing the State Equalization for MESD.

Total expenditures for the school district at June 30, 2013 were \$33,531,105. At June 30, 2012, total expenditures were \$38,524,445 for a decrease of \$4,993,340. The majority of the decrease in expenditures is a result of the loss of operational funding due to declining enrollment. The June 30, 2013 Fund Balance was \$10,272,257 for an increase of \$3,927,013 from \$6,345,244 at June 30, 2012, primarily due to the 2013 Bond Sale.

The <u>Statement of Revenue and Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balance</u> clearly indicates that the district has continued to scale back expenditures in the Operational Fund due to the decrease in state funding from the decline in student enrollment and decrease of the unit value. Because of the decline in enrollment and the subsequent decrease in funding, the district has carefully been monitoring staffing levels and expenditure levels in the Operational Fund where the enrollment decline has the largest impact on revenue. There has been a considerable reduction in staffing levels the past four years. The district's enrollment projections indicate that the enrollment decline will continue for at least the next two to three years. The decline in funding from the State Equalization Guarantee is expected to continue since the New Mexico funding formula is based on the number of students enrolled in the district.

### THE SCHOOL DISTRICT'S BUDGET

The State of New Mexico public school budget process is defined under New Mexico State Statutes, (Section 22) and the New Mexico Administrative Code (Section 6). To improve the process of developing the annual budget, the Moriarty Edgewood Schools Board of Education strongly encourages the participation and input from all school district patrons, including students, staff, administrators, parents, business, and the community at large. The Budget Committee comprised of up to 44 members represents all of these groups and meets on a regular basis to recommend a budget to the Superintendent and to the Board.

Over the course of the year, the school district Board of Education revises the budget as the need arises by means of a Budget Adjustment Request (BAR). These Budget Adjustment Requests fall into three categories. The first category includes budget adjustments that are approved shortly after the beginning of the year and reflect the actual beginning cash balances (versus the amounts estimated in April of each year) when the board approved the budget. Included in this category are adjustments for actual carryover balances from Special Revenue accounts, such as Food Services, Athletics, state and federal flow through grants and capital outlay funds. The second category includes changes that the board approves from possible Unit Value changes as the Public Education Department funds increases or decreases to the State Equalization Guarantee formula. Other similar changes includes new awards or supplemental awards by the Public Education Department for flow through grants and contracts for which we must have expenditure authority from the PED before funds can be expended. Finally, the third category is budget adjustment requests to transfer budgets from one function to another to prevent budget overruns. The PED controls school district budgets at the function level. The summary of the budget adjustments and is displayed in the Notes to Financial Statements, Note 2, Stewardship, Compliance and Accountability, Budgetary Information.

The <u>Statement of Revenues</u>, <u>Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balance—Budget (Non-GAAP Budgetary Basis) and Actual</u> shows the Original Budget, Final Budget, Actual Amounts, and Variance for each fund of the school district.

The June 30, 2013 revenue actual amount of \$20,930,678 was higher than the final budgeted revenue of \$20,860,296 by \$70,382. The increase in revenue was due to the refund of At Risk funds. The June 30, 2013 revenue actual amount was \$2,619,269 lower than the June 30, 2012 revenue actual amount of \$23,549,947.

The June 30, 2013 actual expenditures of \$23,217,169 were \$1,485,158 less than the final budgeted expenditures of \$24,702,327. The majority of the savings occurred in Direct Instruction, Instructional Support, and Operation and Maintenance of Plant.

During the past six years, the district has reduced the number of staff. For FY 12-13 the actual decrease in expenditure amounts were \$826,626 lower than in FY 11-12.

### **CAPITAL ASSETS**

As indicated in the financial highlights above, the district worked very hard to improve the records for capital assets. At the end of the year, the school district had \$60,669,501, net of depreciation invested in a broad range of capital assets including, land, buildings, parking lots, athletic fields, school grounds, vehicles, and equipment. This represents a decrease of \$2,495,459 or .0395% from the year ended June 30, 2012 and is due to depreciation expense of \$2,850,805.

At the beginning of the year, depreciable assets were valued at \$83,092,488. There were additions of \$355,408 for the year, completion of construction projects of \$14,437,659, disposals of \$112,438, and reclassification of \$36,877 to non-depreciable, for an ending balance of \$97,736,240. The total of accumulated depreciation is \$38,955,673, leaving the net value to just \$58,780,567. This is an indication that it will be necessary to start budgeting funds for the replacement of aged equipment in the future.

### **GENERAL LONG TERM DEBT**

Article IX, Section 11 of the New Mexico Constitution allows a school district to incur local general obligation debt. The school district can incur such debt for "the purpose of erecting, remodeling, making additions, and furnishing buildings or purchasing or improving school grounds or purchasing computer software or hardware for student use in public classrooms or any combination of these purposes". The approval of the debt is subject to a referendum of the local registered voters in the school district. The total debt shall not exceed 6% of the total assessed valuation of taxable property within the school district. The voters in the district have been very supportive of the school district and have voted and passed numerous referendums the past several years.

The Moriarty Edgewood Schools has maintained a level of indebtedness that approaches the maximum level allowed by law for the past several years. As soon as the district has bonding capacity, the board submits a referendum to the voters to approve the new amounts needed. The district has needed a lot of capital outlay funds the past several years due to the large enrollment growth experienced in early and mid 90's. The district has had to build two new elementary schools, made large additions to two other elementary schools, and built one new middle school. The district has begun to improve its older facilities that have been ignored in past years. Each time the district asks the voters to approve the General Obligation Bond the proposed bonds are structured to avoid a tax increase to property owners.

The district still has considerable needs to renovate and improve health and safety issues throughout the district, expand the facilities at the high school, including the athletic facilities. In addition to funding the projects identified above, the school district will need to have funds available for technology, building maintenance, equipment replacement and to match Public School Critical Outlay Council projects that the district will be applying for and match at approximately 39% of the cost of the projects.

The amount of long-term debt at June 30, 2012 was \$24,435,000; it decreased by \$3,335,000 from year ended June 30, 2012 of \$27,770,000. The amount due within one year is \$3,670,000 in principal and \$712,361 in interest. The district has always been able to make the principal and interest payments on a timely basis. At the end of the year, the Debt Service Fund Balance was \$2,685,489. The district does not anticipate any difficulty in making future payments on a timely basis for the principal and interest.

# FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2013

### **AGENCY FUNDS**

The school district, as a custodian, maintains and monitors special funds on behalf of schools and school activity groups. These Agency Funds are maintained by the school district and are intended to benefit a specific activity or interest and are generally raised by students for student use.

While each school site is responsible for the administration of the agency funds, the custody and use of these funds are in accordance with the Public Education Department regulations, and school district policy.

The Agency Funds Statement of Fiduciary Assets and Liabilities for the year ending June 30, 2013 shows the accumulated assets of all agency funds as \$308,364 or a decrease of \$27,599 from June 30, 2012.

The district developed and implemented a manual for use by schools and departments for the administration and processing of all receipts and expenditures for activity funds during FY06-07. Every year the Business Office holds an annual refresher training of the manual of procedures for the secretaries, added increase security to employee timesheets starting 07/01/2010.

#### **FUTURE TRENDS**

A double-digit inflation for the cost of gas and utilities is expected. As the economy continues to lag, increased costs are expected to affect the District in our everyday purchases. This of course, will impact the district in terms of our annual budget.

In subsequent years, the cost of health and medical insurance benefits provided through the New Mexico Public Schools Insurance Authority is expected to continue documenting double-digit inflation increases. These increases will greatly impact the district budget.

The New Mexico Public Schools Insurance Authority also provides general liability, property damage, and worker's compensation coverage for all school districts in New Mexico. In the next several years, it is anticipated school districts will experience double-digit inflationary increases for this coverage. The funding formula should cover the premium increases for general liability, property damage and worker's compensation premium; however, due to high claims history of some districts, many districts will realize a budgetary shortfall.

Student enrollment is projected to decline from 80 to 100 students per year for the next two to three years unless there are new major economic developments in our area. A newly established state charter school, located within district boundaries, is in the first year of operation and is expected to impact enrollment numbers in future years. Since the Public Education Department school funding formula is primarily driven by the number of students in the district, it is projected that revenue for the Operational Fund will decrease accordingly. Currently, it appears that the loss of students is due primarily to a decrease in the birth rate, to families moving out of the district to secure employment, and to charter schools. There is no evidence to substantiate that the enrollment of home school students and students attending private schools would account for the loss of students. In fact, the district has realized a decrease in enrollment for students in these categories. It is interesting to note that although the school district is experiencing a loss of students, the local economy continues to indicate a growth in population, and gross receipt tax collections. Assessed Valuations have been increasing at almost a 5% average the past few years.

The above factors will present challenges and opportunities for the district to carefully evaluate programs, operations, and staffing patterns in order to identify ways to balance the budget in future years. The board of education will continue to seek staff and community input in order to develop long range plans for coping with upcoming budgetary challenges.

#### I. SUMMARY OF ALL SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### A. Reporting Entity

Moriarty-Edgewood School District (District) is a special purpose government corporation governed by an elected fivemember Board of Education. The Board of Education is the basic level of government, which has oversight responsibility and control over all activities related to the public school education in the Cities of Moriarty and Edgewood, New Mexico and the surrounding areas. The District is responsible for all activities related to public elementary and secondary school education within its jurisdiction. The District receives funding from local, state, and federal government sources and must comply with the requirements of these funding source entities.

The District's financial statements include all entities over which the Board of Education exercises oversight responsibility. Oversight responsibility includes such aspects as appointment of governing body members, designation of management, the ability to significantly influence operations, and accountability for fiscal matters. Based upon the application of these criteria, no component units or fiduciary units were included in the financial statements.

Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) requires that financial statements present the District (primary government) and its component units. The District has no component units that are required to be presented in accordance with Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 14, The Financial Reporting Entity and GASB Statement No. 39, Determining Whether Certain Organizations Are Component Units, an amendment of GASB Statement No. 14.

#### 1. Blended Component Units

The District does not have any component units reported as blended component units.

#### 2. Discretely Presented Component Units

The District does not have any component units reported as discretely presented component units.

The summary of significant accounting policies of the District is presented to assist in the understanding of the District's financial statements. The financial statements and notes are the representation of Moriarty-Edgewood School District's management who is responsible for their integrity and objectivity. The financial statements of the District conform to GAAP as applied to governmental units. GASB is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The more significant of the government's accounting policies are described below.

#### B. Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements (i.e., the statement of net position and the statement of activities) report information on all of the non-fiduciary activities of the school district. For the most part, the effect of inter-fund activity has been removed from these statements.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or segment are offset by program revenues. *Direct expenses* are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. *Program revenues* include 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function or segment and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Taxes and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as *general revenues*.

Separate financial statements are provided for governmental funds. Major individual governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements.

C. Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting, and Financial Statement Presentation

During fiscal year 2013, Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8 adopted the following GASB Statements:

- ➤ GASB 60, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Service Concession Arrangements, improves financial reporting by addressing uses related to service concession arrangements (SCAs), which are a type of public-private or public-public partnership. This Statement establishes recognition, measurement, and disclosure requirements for SCAs for both transferors and governmental operators.
- ➤ GASB 61, The Financial Reporting Entity: Omnibus an amendment of GASB Statements No. 14 and No. 34, is effective for the District beginning with its year ending June 30, 2013. This Statement modifies certain requirements for inclusion of component units in the financial reporting entity
- ➤ GASB 62, Codification of Accounting and Financial Reporting Guidance Contained in Pre-November 30, 1989 FASB and AICPA Pronouncements, is effective for the District beginning with its year ending June 30, 2013. The objective of this Statement is to incorporate into the GASB's authoritative literature certain accounting and financial reporting guidance that is included in following pronouncements issued on or before November 30, 1989, which does not conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements.
- ➤ GASB 63, Financial Reporting of Deferred Outflows of Resources, Deferred Inflows of Resources, and Net Position, standardizes the presentation of deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources and their effects on a government's net position.
- SASB 64, Derivative Instruments: Application of Hedge Accounting Termination Provisions an Amendment to GASB Statement No. 53, which had no impact on the current year financial statements. The objective of this statement is to enhance comparability and improve financial reporting by clarifying the circumstances in which hedge accounting should continue when a swap counterparty, or a swap counterparty's credit support provider, is replaced.
- ➤ GASB 65, Items Previously Reported as Assets and Liabilities, establishes accounting and financial reporting standards that reclassify, as deferred outflows of resources or deferred inflows of resources, certain items that were previously reported as assets and liabilities and recognizes, as outflows of resources or inflows of resources, certain items that were previously reported as assets and liabilities. This Statement resulted in a restatement of the financial statements which is detailed in Note IV.E on page 45.

Other accounting standards that Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8 is currently reviewing for applicability and potential impact on the financial statements include:

- ➤ GASB 66, Technical Corrections: an amendment to GASB Statements No. 10 and No. 62, resolves conflicting accounting and financial reporting guidance that could diminish the consistency of financial reporting and thereby enhance the usefulness of the financial reports. This Statement will be effective for the year ended June 30, 2014.
- ➤ GASB 67, Financial Reporting for Pension Plans—an amendment of GASB Statement No. 25, establishes accounting and financial reporting requirements related to pensions for governments whose employees are provided with pensions through pension plans that are covered by the scope of this Statement, as well as for nonemployer governments that have a legal obligation to contribute to those plans. This Statement will be effective for the year ended June 30, 2014.
- ➤ GASB 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions—an amendment of GASB Statement No. 27, this Statement addresses accounting and financial reporting for pensions that are provided to the employees of state and local governmental employers through pension plans that are administered through trusts. This Statement will be effective for the year ended June 30, 2015.

  - ➤ GASB 69, Government Combinations and Disposals of Government Operations, which had distinguishes between a government merger and a government acquisition and establishes accounting and financial reporting standards related to government combinations and disposals of government operations. This Statement will be effective for the year ended June 30, 2015.
  - ➤ GASB 70, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Nonexchange Financial, June 30, 2014 the requirements of this Statement will enhance comparability of financial statements among governments by requiring consistent reporting by those governments that extend nonexchange financial guarantees and by those governments that receive nonexchange financial guarantees. This Statement will be effective for the year ended June 30, 2014.

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Property taxes are recognized as revenues, net of estimated refunds and estimated uncollectable amounts, in the year for which they are levied. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the government considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current fiscal period. Revenues received during the year but are applicable to subsequent years are reported as deferred inflows of resources. Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, debt service expenditures, as well as expenditures related to compensated absences and claims and judgments, are recorded only when payment is due. Expenditures incurred during the year that are for the benefit of subsequent years are reported as deferred outflows of resources.

Property taxes and interest associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual and so have been recognized as revenues of the current fiscal period. All other revenue items are considered to be measurable and available only when cash is received by the government.

The government reports the following major governmental funds:

- General Fund The general fund is the government's primary operating fund. It accounts for all financial resources of the general government, except those required to be accounted for in another fund.
- Title I Special Revenue Fund To help local education agencies (LEAs) and schools improve the teaching and learning of children failing, or most at-risk of failing, to meet challenging State academic standards. Funding authorization: Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, Title I, Part A, 20 U.S.C. 6301 et seq.
- Bond Building Fund Capital Projects Fund This fund provides financing for the construction of buildings, the purchase of equipment, and the acquisition and improvement of land. Funding is provided by the sale of general obligation bonds, which have been approved by the voters of the district.
- Capital Improvements SB 9 Capital Projects Fund This fund provides financing for the purchase of equipment and capital improvements to School District property. Funding is received from a 2 mill property tax levy and interest earned on investments, under New Mexico Senate Bill 9.
- Debt Service Fund The debt service fund is used to account for the accumulation of resources for, and the payment of, general long-term debt principal, interest, and related costs.

C. Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting, and Financial Statement Presentation (cont'd)

Additionally, the government reports the following fund types:

Special Revenue Funds – Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources – which are legally restricted to expenditures for specified purposes.

Capital Projects Funds – Capital Projects Funds are used to account for financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction of major capital facilities.

Fiduciary Funds – Fiduciary Funds are the agency funds used to account for financial resources used by the student activity groups for which the District has stewardship

Amounts reported as program revenues include 1) charges to customers or applicants for goods, services, or privileges provided, 2) operating grants and contributions, and 3) capital grants and contributions. Internally dedicated resources are reported as general revenues rather than as program revenues. Likewise, general revenues include all taxes.

#### D. Assets, Liabilities, and Net Position or Equity

#### 1. Deposits and investments

The government's cash and cash equivalents are considered to be cash on hand, demand deposits, and short-term investments with original maturities of three months or less from the date of acquisition.

State statutes authorize the investment of the District's funds in a wide variety of instruments including certificates of deposit and other similar obligations, state investment pool, and money market accounts. The District is also allowed to invest in United States Government obligations. All funds for the District must follow the above investment policies.

Deposits of funds may be made in interest or non-interest bearing checking accounts in one or more banks or savings and loan associations within the geographical boundaries of the school district. Deposits may be made to the extent that they are insured by an agency of the United States or by collateral deposited as security or by bond given by the financial institution.

The rate of interest in non-demand interest-bearing accounts shall be set by the State Board of Finance, but in no case shall the rate of interest be less than one hundred present of the asked price on United States treasury bills of the same maturity on the day of deposit.

Excess of funds may be temporarily invested in securities which are issued by the State or by the United States government, or by their departments or agencies, and which are either direct obligations of the State or the United States or are backed by the full faith and credit of those governments.

#### 2. Receivables and payables

Activity between funds that are representative of lending/borrowing arrangements outstanding at the end of the fiscal year are referred to as either "due from/to other funds" (i.e., the current portion of inter-fund loans) or "advances to/from other funds" (i.e., the non-current portion of inter-fund loans). All other outstanding balances between funds are reported as "due from/to other funds."

The District's property taxes are levied each year on the assessed valuation of property located in the School District as of the preceding January 1st. Mill levy rates are set by the State of New Mexico each year for the General Fund, SB - 9 Capital Improvements Fund, and Debt Service Fund. Taxes are payable in two equal installments on November 10th and April 10th following the levy and become delinquent after 30 days.

Under GASB Statement 33, property taxes are impressed non-exchange revenue. Assets from impressed non-exchange transactions are reported when the School District has an enforceable legal claim to the asset. The enforceable legal claim date for property taxes is the assessment date. Taxes are payable in two equal installments on November 10 and April 10th following the levy and become delinquent after 30 days. Therefore, the School District has recorded a delinquent tax receivable and revenue for taxes received within the sixty days following year-end. A receivable and deferred revenue have been recorded for uncollected delinquent taxes. On the government-wide financial statements, the district has recorded delinquent property taxes receivable and revenue for taxes assessed as of year-end that have not be collected, as prescribed in GASB 34. An allowance for refunds and uncollectible amounts has not been recorded.

#### 3. Inventories

USDA Commodities are recorded at estimated costs and other inventories are recorded at cost, which approximates market. Inventories of governmental funds are recorded as expenditures when purchased rather than when consumed.

#### 4. Capital assets

Capital assets, which include property, plant, and equipment (software), are reported in the applicable governmental-wide financial statements. Beginning July 1, 2005, the threshold for defining Capital assets by the government was raised from \$1,000 to assets with an initial, individual cost of more than \$5,000 (amount not rounded) and an estimated useful life in excess of two years. Such assets are recorded at historical cost or estimated historical cost if purchased or constructed. Donated capital assets are recorded at estimated fair market value at the date of donation.

The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend assets lives are not capitalized. Software costs have been included with the cost of computer equipment and are capitalized with that equipment. The District does not develop software for internal use or any other use.

Major outlays for capital assets and improvements are capitalized as projects are constructed. Interest on construction projects has not been capitalized.

Property, plant, and equipment of the primary government are depreciated using the straight line method over the following estimated useful lives:

#### 5. Compensated absences

It is the District's policy to permit employees to accumulate 36 days of earned but unused vacation, which will be paid to employees upon separation from the District's service. The amount for liability has been reported in the government-wide financial statements.

Accumulated sick leave is not payable upon termination and is recorded as expenditures when it is paid.

#### 6. Long-term obligations

In the government-wide financial statements, long-term debt and other long-term obligations are reported as liabilities in the applicable governmental activities, statement of net position. Bond premiums and discounts, as well as issuance costs, are deferred and amortized over the life of the bonds using the effective interest method. Bonds payable are reported net of the applicable bond premium or discounts. Bond issuance costs are reported as deferred charges and amortized over the term of the related debt.

In the fund financial statements, governmental fund types recognize bond premiums and discounts, as well as bond issuance costs, during the current period. The face amount of debt issued is reported as other financing sources. Premiums received on debt issuances are reported as other financing uses. Issuance costs, whether or not withheld from the actual debt proceeds received, are reported as capital projects expenditures.

#### 7. Fund balance

#### a. Non-Spendable

The non-spendable fund balance classification includes amounts that cannot be spent because they are either not in spendable form or legally or contractually required to be maintained intact. The "not in spendable form" criterion includes items that are not expected to be converted to cash, for example, inventories and prepaid amounts.

#### b. Restricted

Fund balance is reported as restricted when constraints placed on the use of resources are either (1) externally imposed by creditors (such as through debt covenants), grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments or (2) imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

#### c. Committed

Amounts that can only be used for specific purposes pursuant to constraints imposed by the formal action of the District's Board of Education should be reported as committed fund balance. The committed amounts cannot be used for any other purpose unless the District's Board of Education removes or changes the specified use by taking the same type of action it employed to previously commit those amounts. The District did not have committed fund balances for the year ended June 30, 2013.

#### d. Assigned

Assigned fund balance includes (a) all remaining amounts, except for negative balances, that are reported in governmental funds, other than the general fund, that are not classified as non-spendable and are neither restricted nor committed and amounts in the general fund that are constrained by the District's intent to be used for specific purposes, but are neither restricted nor committed. Intent, and removal of, is expressed by the Board of Education or the Finance Committee. The District did not have assigned fund balances for the year ended June 30, 2013.

#### e. Unassigned

The remaining fund balance, after all other classifications, within the general fund is reported as unassigned fund balance. This classification represents fund balance that has not been assigned to other funds and that has not been restricted, committed, or assigned to specific purposes within the general fund. In governmental funds other than the general fund, if expenditures incurred for specific purposes exceeded the amounts restricted, committed, or assigned to those purposes, a negative fund balance will be reported as unassigned fund balance.

When committed, assigned, and unassigned resources are available for use, it is the District's policy to use committed first followed by assigned and unassigned resources as they are needed.

#### 8. Net position

Net position are presented on the statement of net position and may be presented in any of three components.

#### a. Invested in capital assets, net of related debt

This component of net position consists of capital assets, including restricted capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances of any bonds, mortgages, notes, or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets. The portion of the debt attributable to the unspent proceeds is not included in the calculation of invested in capital assets, net of related debt. That portion of the debt is included in restricted for capital projects.

#### b. Restricted net position

Net position are reported as being restricted when the restriction is either externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments or imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation. Enabling legislation authorizes the government to assess, levy, charge, or otherwise mandate payment of resources (from external resource providers) and includes a legally enforceable requirement that those resources be used only for the specific purposes stipulated in the legislation.

#### c. Unrestricted net position

Unrestricted net position consists of net position that does not meet the definition of "invested in capital assets, net of related debt" or "restricted."

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the government's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

In the governmental environment, net position often is designated to indicate that management does not consider them to be available for general operations. In contrast to restricted net position, these types of constraints on resources are internal and management can remove or modify them. However, enabling legislation established by the reporting government should not be construed as an internal constraint.

#### 9. Indirect Costs

The District's General Fund receives indirect cost reimbursements from the various federal programs it administers. These reimbursements are for expenses incurred in performing administrative functions on behalf of the Special Revenue Funds. They are shown as expenditures in the Special Revenue Funds, and as other special federal revenue in the General Fund.

#### 10. Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### 11. Revenues

State Equalization Guarantee: School districts in the State of New Mexico receive a 'state equalization guarantee distribution' which is defined as "that amount of money distributed to each school district to insure that the school district's operating revenue, including its local and federal revenues as defined (in Chapter 22, Section 825, NMSA 1978) is at least equal to the school district's program cost".

A school district's program costs are determined through the use of various formulas using 'program units' which take into consideration 1) early childhood education; 2) basic education; 3) special education; 4) bilingual-multicultural education, 5) size, etc. Payment is made from the public school fund under the authority of the Director of Public School Finance. The District received \$20,930,678 in state equalization guarantee distributions during the year ended June 30, 2013.

Transportation Distribution: School districts in the State of New Mexico received student transportation distributions. The transportation distribution is allocated to each school district in accordance with formulas developed by the State Transportation Director and the Director of Public School Finance. The funds shall be used only for the purpose of making payments to each school district for the to-and-from school transportation costs of students in grades K through twelve attending public school within the school district. The District received \$1,602,130 in transportation distributions during the year ended June 30, 2013.

#### II. STEWARDSHIP, COMPLIANCE, AND ACCOUNTABILITY

#### A. Budgetary Information

Budgets for the General, Special Revenue, Capital Projects, and Debt Service Funds are prepared by management and are approved by the local Board of Education and the Public School Budget and Planning Unit of the Department of Education. Auxiliary student activity accounts are not budgeted.

These budgets are prepared on the Non-GAAP cash basis, excluding encumbrances, and secure appropriation of funds for only one year. Carryover funds must be re-appropriated in the budget of the subsequent fiscal year. The budget process in the State of New Mexico requires that the beginning cash balance be appropriated in the budget of the subsequent fiscal year. Such appropriated balance is legally restricted and is therefore presented as a reserved portion of fund balance.

Actual expenditures may not exceed the budget on a line item basis, i.e., each budgeted expenditure must be within budgeted amounts. Budgets may be amended in two ways. If a budget transfer is necessary within a major category called a 'series', this may be accomplished with only local Board of Education approval. If a transfer between 'series' or a budget increase is required, approval must also be obtained from Public School Finance Division.

The budgetary information presented in these financial statements has been amended in accordance with the above procedures.

The school district follows these procedures in establishing the budgetary data reflected in the financial statements:

1. In April or May, the superintendent submits to the Board of Education a proposed operating budget of the fiscal year commencing the following July. The operating budget includes proposed expenditures and the means of financing them, and has approval by the Department of Education.

- A. Budgetary Information (cont'd)
  - 2. In May or June, the budget is approved by the Board of Education.
  - 3. The school board meeting, while not intended for the general public, is open for the general public unless a closed meeting has been called for.
  - 4. The superintendent is authorized to transfer budgeted amounts between departments within any fund; however, any revisions that alter the total expenditures of any fund must be approved by the school board and the State of New Mexico Department of Education.
  - 5. Formal budgetary integration is employed as a management control device during the year for the General Fund, Special Revenue Funds, Debt Service Funds and Capital Projects Funds.
  - 6. Budgets for the General, Special Revenue, Capital Projects, and Debt Service Funds are adopted on a basis not consistent with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). Encumbrances are treated the same way for GAAP purposes and for Budget purposes.

The Board of Education may approve amendments to the appropriated budget, which are required when a change is made affecting budgeted ending fund balance. The appropriated budget for the year ended June 30, 2013 was properly amended by the Board through the year. New Mexico state law prohibits a Governmental Agency to exceed an individual line item. These amendments resulted in the following changes:

#### III. DETAILED NOTES ON ALL FUNDS

#### A. Cash and Temporary Investments

At June 30, 2013, the carrying amount of the District's deposits was \$10,134,606 and the bank balance was \$11,734,977 with the difference consisting of outstanding checks. Of this balance \$500,000 was covered by federal depository insurance and \$7,691,877 was covered by collateral held in joint safekeeping by a third party.

#### Custodial Credit Risk

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the District's deposits may not be returned to it. New Mexico State Statutes require collateral pledged for deposits in excess of the federal deposit insurance to be delivered, or a joint safekeeping receipt be issued, to the District for at least one half of the amount on deposit with the institution. The statement listed below will meet the State of New Mexico Office of the State Auditor's requirement in reporting the uninsured portion of the deposits. As of June 30, 2013, \$3,543,100 of the District's bank balance of \$11,734,977 was exposed to custodial risk as follows:

According to the Federal Deposit Insurance Authority, public unit deposits are funds owned by the schools. Time deposits, savings deposits and interest bearing "Now" accounts of a public unit in an institution in the same state will be insured up to \$250,000 in aggregate and separate from the \$250,000 coverage for public unit demand deposits at the same institution.

General Obligation Bonds

General Obligation Bonds – The District issues general obligation bonds to provide funds for the acquisition and construction of major capital facilities. Bonds are direct obligations and pledge the full faith and credit of the District. The bonds will be paid from taxes levied against property owners living within the School District boundaries. #### C. Long-Term Debt (cont'd)

On February 5, 2013 the District was approved to issue \$19,000,000 of general obligation bonds. The District issued Series 2013 in the amount of \$5,000,000 on May 15, 2013 and will make the first interest payment on May 15, 2014. The bond series will mature on May 15, 2025 with interest rates between 1.0% and 2.0%. The remaining authorized amount will be issued in the future as dictated by the District's needs.

The liability of compensated absences is liquidated with resources from the general fund and several special revenue funds. The liquidation of bonds payable is done with resources from the debt service fund.

#### IV. OTHER INFORMATION

#### A. Risk Management

The District is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injury to employees; and natural disasters. The New Mexico Public Schools Insurance Authority (NMSIA) was formed on April 5, 1985 under the New Mexico Public Schools Insurance Authority Act, Chapter 22, Section 2 of the New Mexico Statutes Annotated (NMSA 1978), as amended, as an insurance fund to provide health, disability and life insurance coverage (benefits coverage), and property, casualty and workers' compensation insurance coverage (risk coverage) to participating public schools, school board members, public school employees, and retirees within the State of New Mexico. The District is one of 91 members that participate in NMPSIA. Participation in NMPSIA is mandatory for all K-12 public schools except those with enrollment exceeding 60,000 students. Participation is voluntary for other public education institutions. The District pays an annual premium to the pool for its general insurance coverage. The agreement for formation of NMPSIA provides that the pool will be self-sustaining through member premiums. NMPSIA establishes self-insured retentions by line of coverage and procures insurance or reinsurance, where indicated, in excess of the self-insured retention on a per occurrence basis. NMPSIA will publish its own financial report for the year ended June 30, 2013.

#### B. Employee Retirement Plan

Plan Description - Substantially all of the District's full-time employees participate in a public employee retirement system authorized under the Educational Retirement Act (Chapter 22, Article 11, NMSA 1978). The Educational Retirement Board (ERB) is the administrator of the plan, which is a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit retirement plan. The plan provides for retirement benefits, disability benefits, survivor benefits and cost-of-living adjustments to plan members (certified teachers, and other employees of State public school districts, colleges and universities) and beneficiaries. ERB issues a separate, publicly available financial report that includes the financial statements and required supplementary information for the plan. That report may be obtained by writing to:

Funding Policy

Member Contributions

Plan members whose annual salary is \$20,000 or less are required by statute to contribute 7.9% of their gross salary. Plan members whose annual salary is over \$20,000 are required to make the following contributions to the Plan: 9.40% of their gross salary in fiscal year 2013; 10.1% of their gross salary in fiscal year 2014; and 10.7% of their gross salary in fiscal year 2015 and thereafter.

#### **Employer Contributions**

In fiscal year 2013, the Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8 was required to contribute 12.4% of the gross covered salary for employees whose annual salary is \$20,000 or less, and 10.9% of the gross covered salary for employees whose annual salary is more than \$20,000. In the future, the District will contribute the following percentages of the gross covered salary of employees: 13.15% of gross covered salary in fiscal year 2014; and 13.9% of gross covered salary in fiscal year 2015. The contribution requirements of plan members and the District are established in State statute under Chapter 22, Article 11, NMSA 1978. The requirements may be amended by acts of the legislature. The District's contributions to ERB for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2013, 2012, and 2011, were \$1,807,352, \$1,682,990, and \$1,988,544, respectively, which equal the amount of the required contributions for each fiscal year.

#### C. Post-Retirement Health Care Benefits

Plan Description

Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8 contributes to the New Mexico Retiree Health Care Fund, a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit postemployment healthcare plan administered by the New Mexico Retiree Health Care Authority (RHCA). The RHCA provides health care insurance and prescription drug benefits to retired employees of participating New Mexico government agencies, their spouses, dependents, and surviving spouses and dependents. The RHCA Board was established by the Retiree Health Care Act (Chapter 10, Article 7C, NMSA 1978). The Board is responsible for establishing and amending benefit provisions of the healthcare plan and is also authorized to designate optional and/or voluntary benefits like dental, vision, supplemental life insurance, and long-term care policies.

#### Eligible retirees are:

- 1) retirees who make contributions to the fund for at least five years prior to retirement and whose eligible employer during that period of time made contributions as a participant in the RHCA plan on the person's behalf unless that person retires before the employer's RHCA effective date, in which the event the time period required for employee and employer contributions shall become the period of time between the employer's effective date and the date of retirement;
- 2) retirees defined by the Act who retired prior to July 1, 1990;
- 3) former legislators who served at least two years; and
- 4) former governing authority members who served at least four years.

The RHCA issues a publicly available stand-alone financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the postemployment healthcare plan. That report and further information can be obtained by writing to:

#### C. Post-Retirement Health Care Benefits (cont'd)

Funding Policy

The Retiree Health Care Act (Section 10-7C-13 NMSA 1978) authorizes the RHCA Board to establish the monthly premium contributions that retirees are required to pay for healthcare benefits. Each participating retiree pays a monthly premium according to a service based subsidy rate schedule for the medical plus basic life plan plus an additional participation fee of five dollars if the eligible participant retired prior to the employer's RHCA effective date or is a former legislator or former governing authority member. Former legislators and governing authority members are required to pay 100% of the insurance premium to cover their claims and the administrative expenses of the plan. The monthly premium rate schedule can be obtained from the RHCA or viewed on their website at <a href="https://www.nmrhca.state.nm.us">www.nmrhca.state.nm.us</a>.

The employer, employee and retiree contributions are required to be remitted to the RHCA on a monthly basis. The statutory requirements for the employer and employee contributions can be changed by the New Mexico State Legislature. Employers that choose to become participating employers after January 1, 1998, are required to make contributions to the RHCA fund in the amount determined to be appropriate by the board.

The Retiree Health Care Act (Section 10-7C-15 NMSA 1978) is the statutory authority that establishes the required contributions of participating employers and their employees. For employees that were members of an enhanced retirement plan (state police and adult correctional officer member coverage plan 1; municipal police member coverage plans 3, 4 or 5; municipal fire member coverage plan 3, 4 or 5; municipal detention officer member coverage plan 1; and members pursuant to the Judicial Retirement Act) during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2013, the statute required each participating employer to contribute 2.5% of each participating employee's annual salary; and each participating employee was required to contribute 1.25% of their salary. For employees that were not members of an enhanced retirement plan during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2013, the statute required each participating employer to contribute 2.0% of each participating employee's annual salary; each participating employee was required to contribute 1.0% of their salary. In addition, pursuant to Section 10-7C-15(G) NMSA 1978, at the first session of the Legislature following July 1, 2013, the legislature shall review and adjust the distributions pursuant to Section 7-1-6.1 NMSA 1978 and the employer and employee contributions to the authority in order to ensure the actuarial soundness of the benefits provided under the Retiree Health Care Act.

The District's contributions to the RHCA for the years ended June 30, 2013, 2012 and 2011 were \$325,441, \$319,728 and \$295,081, respectively, which equal the required contributions for each year.

#### D. Contingent Liabilities

Amounts received or receivable from grant agencies are subject to audit and adjustment by grantor agencies, principally the federal government. Any disallowed claims, including amounts already collected, may constitute a liability of the applicable funds. The amount, if any, of expenditures that may be disallowed by the grantor cannot be determined at this time, although the government expects such amounts, if any, to be immaterial.

The government is a defendant in various lawsuits. Although the outcome of these lawsuits is not presently determinable, in the opinion of the government's counsel the resolution of these matters will not have a material adverse effect on the financial condition of the government.

#### E. Restatement

There was a restatement of the financials for \$226,081, unamortized issuance costs, is for the implementation of GASB65 which requires issuance costs associated with general obligation bond issues to be expensed in the year in which they are incurred.

#### F. Cash Flows

The District's federal and state grants operate on a reimbursement basis. The District must support the expenditures of these grants with monies from the unrestricted operating monies. Operating on a reimbursement basis for these grants in its self does not adversely affect the District's ability to operate effectively. However, the time it takes to receive reimbursement, if extensive, does significantly affect the District's cash flows and the ability to deliver educational services to the community in an effective manner. This could affect the District's financial operations in subsequent years.

#### G. Subsequent Events

Subsequent events were evaluated through October 22, 2013, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

#### NONMAJOR SPECIAL REVENUE FUNDS

YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2013

#### FOOD SERVICES

This program provides financing for the school breakfast and lunch program. Funding is provided from fees from patrons and USDA food reimbursements, under the National School Lunch Act of 1946, as amended, Public Law 79-396, Sections 2-12, 60 Stat. 230, 42 U.S.C. 1751 et seq.; 80 stat. 889, as amended; 84 stat. 270; and the Child Nutrition Act of 1966, as amended, Sections 4 and 10. Public Law 89-642, 80 sat. 886, 889, 42 U.S.C. 1773, 1779; Public Law 99-591, 100 stat. 3341; Public Law 100-71, 101 stat. 430.

#### ATHLETICS

This fund provides financing for school athletic activities. Funding is provided by fees from patrons.

#### ENTITLEMENT/DISCRETIONARY IDEA-B

The Entitlement/Discretionary IDEA-B program is to provide grants to states, that flow-through to schools, to assist them in providing a free appropriate public education to all children with disabilities. The program is funded by the United States government, under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, Part B, Section 611-617, and part D, Section 674 as amended, 20 U.S.C. 1711-1417 and 1420.

#### PRESCHOOL IDEA-B

The Preschool program is for the purpose of enhancing Special Education for handicapped children from ages 3 to 5. The program is funded by the United States government, under the Individuals With Disabilities Act, Part B, Section 619, as amended, Public Laws 94-142, 99-457, 100-630, 101-497, and 101-476.

#### **IDEA-B CEIS**

Up to 15% of combined entitlement and preschool funding may be budgeted as per 34 CFR § 300.226. Must be used consistent with the applicable provisions of IDEA-B, as follows: (1) Must be used only to pay the excess costs of providing special education and related services to children with disabilities: (2) Must be used to supplement State. local, and other Federal funds and not to supplant such funds: and (3) Must not be used to reduce an LEA's maintenance of effort (MOE) for the education of children with disabilities below the preceding year's level except as allowed by 34 CFR §§ 300.204 and 205.

#### **EDUCATION OF HOMELESS**

To ensure that all homeless children and youth have equal access to the same free, appropriate public education available to other children, the Education for Homeless Children and Youth program provides assistance to States, Outlying Areas, and the Department of Interior/Bureau of Indian Education (BIE) to: (1) establish or designate an Office of Coordinator of Education of Homeless Children and Youths; (2) develop and carry out a State plan for the education of homeless children; and (3) make subgrants to local educational agencies to support the education of those children. Authorization: McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, Title VII, Subtitle B.

#### FRESH FRUITS AND VEGETABLES

To assist States, through cash grants, in providing free fresh fruits and vegetables to school children in designated participating schools beginning in school year 2004/2006. Authorization granted under National School Lunch Act, as amended, 42 U.S.C. 1769.

#### IDEA-B "RISK POOL"

The IDEA-B "Risk Pool" program is to provide grants to states, that flow-through to schools, to assist them in providing a free appropriate public education to all children with disabilities. The program is funded by the United States government, under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, Part B, Section 611-617, and part D, Section 674 as amended, 20 U.S.C. 1711-1417 and 1420.

#### **IDEA-B Student Success**

The purpose of this grant award is to support activities included in the school's Educational Plan for Student Success, or areas in need of improvement, identified through the instructional audit.

#### COMPREHENSIVE SCHOOL REFORM

The Comprehensive School Reform (CSR) program support for a clearinghouse of school reform projects. Authorization (040): Elementary and Secondary Education Act, as amended, Title I, Part F.

#### TITLE V

To assist State and Local educational agencies in the reform of elementary and secondary education. Authorized by the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, Title VI, as amended, 20 U.S.C. 7301-7373.

#### TITLE III ENGLISH LANGUAGE

To ensure that limited English proficient children (LEP) and youth, including immigrant children and youth, attain English proficiency and meet the same standards as all children and youth are expected to meet; to provide assistance to Native American, Native Hawaiian, Native American Pacific Islander, and Alaskan native children with certain modifications relative to the unique status of native American language under Federal Law; to develop to the extent possible, the native language skills of such children. The fund is authorized through the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), as amended, Title III, Part A, Sections 3101,3129.

#### TITLE II TEACHER QUALITY

To provide grants to State Education Agencies (SEAs) on a formula basis to increase student academic achievement through strategies such as improving teacher and principal quality and increasing the number of highly qualified teachers in the classroom and highly qualified principals and assistant principals in schools and hold local educational agencies and schools accountable for improvements in the academic achievement. Authorization is granted through the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, as amended, Title II, Part A, Public Law 107-110.

#### TITLE IV DRUG FREE SCHOOLS

To offer a disciplined environment conducive to learning, by preventing violence in and around schools and strengthen programs that prevent the illegal use of alcohol, tobacco, and drugs, involve parents, and coordinated with related Federal, State, and community efforts and resources. Authorized by Elementary and Secondary Education Act, Title IV, Part A, Subpart 1, as amended. 20 U.S.C. 7111-7118.

#### TITLE I SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

To develop parental involvement in the school curriculum. The program is funded by the United States government under P.L. 100-297.

#### TITLE III – IMMIGRANT FUNDING

To ensure that limited English proficient children (LEP) and youth, including immigrant children and youth, attain English proficiency and meet the same standards as all children and youth are expected to meet; to provide assistance to Native American, Native Hawaiian, Native American Pacific Islander, and Alaskan native children with certain modifications relative to the unique status of native American language under Federal Law; to develop to the extent possible, the native language skills of such children. The fund is authorized through the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), as amended, Title III, Part A, Sections 3101,3129.

#### TITLE XIX MEDICAID

To provide financial assistance from the Federal government which flows-through the State of New Mexico to school districts, for payments of medical assistance on behalf of cash assistance recipients, children, pregnant women and the aged who meet income and resource requirements, and other categorically-eligible groups. #### NONMAJOR SPECIAL REVENUE FUNDS

YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2013

#### WALLACE FOUNDATION

The purpose of this program is to provide funding to develop the use and understanding of accountability to build effective leaders in the educational system along with improving student achievement. Funds are acquired from federal sources through the New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration. Funding is provided by the Wallace Foundation a private funding for the State Action for Education Leadership Project.

#### DUAL CREDIT INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS

To be used for courses approved by Higher Education Department (HED) and through a college/university for which the district has an approved agreement.

#### LIBRARY GO BONDS 2010

To be used to fund each library facility for improvement or acquisition and to acquire library books and library resources to support the library program. Funds generated by GO Bonds may not be used to supplant existing or prior library material funding within school districts receiving these monies. This funding will supplement and be in addition to current and existing funding. Authorized through Senate Bill 2010 SB333

#### FORMATIVE ASSESSMENTS

The approved formative assessments are for English language arts and math in grades 4 through 10 per school year 2012-2013. These formative assessments will give teachers essential tools for monitoring student progress and making timely, strategic interventions throughout the school year.

#### READS TO LEAD

To increase the quality of reading instruction.

#### TECHNOLOGY FOR EDUCATION

State funding to provide financial assistance to school districts to improve educational opportunities for all students to close the technology gap between schools and the workplace through enhancement of computer education. The funding is provided by state resources and supplements the federal funding for the Technology Literacy Challenge grant. The creation of the fund is authorized by NMSA 1978 22-15A-1 TO 22-15A-10.

#### INCENTIVE FOR SCHOOL IMPROVEMENTS

These funds are used for school improvements, from lighting to encyclopedias. Funding is provided by the State of New Mexico. The creation of the fund is authorized by NMSA 1978 22-13A-5.

#### BEGINNING TEACHER MENTORING

Funds to assist school districts in the design, implementation, and evaluation of beginning teacher mentoring programs. Funding is provided through the 2000 legislative session, with appropriated funds from the General Appropriations Act.

#### BREAKFAST FOR ELEMENTARY STUDENTS

To provide elementary students with the nutrition necessary to facilitate learning.

#### GO BONDS INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS

To be used for the purchase of textbooks for schools within the District.

#### LIBRARY BOOKS

To support the purchase of library books. Authorized through New Mexico Senate Bill 471.

#### DAIRY MAX

The goal of the awards program is to call attention to the importance of alternate school breakfast. Offering breakfast outside of the classroom increases participation by providing service for children who arrive late or who prefer to socialize rather than eat, and by helping to remove the potential social stigma that the program is meant for low-income students.

#### **INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT**

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in <u>Government Auditing Standards</u> issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, the aggregate remaining fund information, the budgetary comparisons of the general fund and major special revenue funds, of the Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8 as of and for the year ended June 30, 2013, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8's basic financial statements, and the combining and individual funds and related budgetary comparisons of Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8, presented as supplemental information, and have issued our report thereon dated October 22, 2013.

#### **Internal Control Over Financial Reporting**

In planning and performing our audit, of the financial statements, we considered Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies and therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that were not identified. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

#### Compliance and other matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

#### 1. Scope of audit pursuant to OMB Circular A-133

All federal grant operations of Moriarty-Edgewood School District No. 8 (the "School District") are included in the scope of the Office of management and Budget ("OMB") Circular A-133 audit (the "Single Audit"). The Single Audit was performed in accordance with the provisions of the OMB Circular Compliance Supplement (Revised March 2013 the "Compliance Supplement"). Compliance testing of all requirements are described in the Compliance Supplement, was performed for the grants programs noted below. These programs represent all federal award programs and other grants with fiscal 2013 cash and non-cash expenditures to ensure coverage of at least 25% (LOW risk auditee) of federally granted funds. Actual coverage is approximately 32% of total cash and non-cash federal award program expenditures. Total cash expenditures were in the amount of \$3,146,565 and all non-cash expenditures amounted to \$80,259.

Accrued balances at year end represent an excess of reimbursable expenditures over receipts to date. Deferred balance at year-end represent an excess of cash receipts over reimbursable expenditure to date. Generally, accrued or deferred balances covered by differences in the timing of cash receipts and expenditures will be reversed in the remaining grant period.
