Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, the aggregate remaining fund information and the budgetary comparisons for the general fund and major special revenue fund of Mesa Vista Consolidated School District No. 6 (District), as of and for the year ended June 30, 2019, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The District's management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.



We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the District, as of June 30, 2019, and the respective budgetary comparisons for the general fund and major special revenue fund for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the Schedules of the District's Proportionate Share of the Net Pension Liability and Net OPEB Liability, and Schedules of District Contributions on pages 60 - 64 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Management has omitted the Management's Discussion and Analysis that accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require to be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such missing information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. Our opinion on the basic financial statements is not affected by this missing information.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements, the combining and individual fund financial statements, and the budgetary comparisons that collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements. The other schedules required by 2.2.2 NMAC are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The other schedules required by 2.2.2 NMAC as noted in the table of contents, are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the schedules required by 2.2.2 NMAC as noted in the table of contents, are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated November 14, 2019 on our consideration of the District's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the District's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Reporting Entity

Mesa Vista Consolidated School District (District) is a special purpose government corporation governed by an elected five-member Board of Education. The Board of Education is the basic level of government, which has oversight responsibility and control over all activities related to the public school education in the Towns of El Rito and Ojo Caliente, New Mexico and the surrounding areas. The District is responsible for all activities related to public elementary and secondary school education within its jurisdiction. The District receives funding from local, state, and federal government sources and must comply with the requirements of these funding source entities.

In evaluating how to define the District, for financial reporting purposes, management has considered all potential component units. The decision to include any potential component units in the financial reporting entity was made by applying the criteria set forth in GASB Statements No. 14, *The Financial Reporting Entity*, No. 39, *Determining Whether Certain Organizations Are Component Units*, and No. 80, *Blending Requirements for Certain Component Units*. Blended component units, although legally separate entities, are in substance part of the government's operations. Each discretely presented component unit is reported in a separate column in the government-wide financial statements to emphasize that it is legally separate from the government. The additional criteria of GASB Statement No. 80 also requires blending of a component unit incorporated as a not-for profit corporation in which the primary government is the sole corporate member.

The basic, but not the only, criterion for including a potential component unit within the reporting entity is the governing body's ability to exercise oversight responsibility. The most significant manifestation of this ability is financial interdependency. Other manifestations of the ability to exercise oversight responsibility include, but are not limited to, the selection of governing authority, the designation of management, the ability to significantly influence operations, and accountability for fiscal matters. A second criterion used in evaluating potential component units is the scope of public service. Application of this criterion involves considering whether the activity benefits the government and/or its citizens. A third criterion used to evaluate potential component units for inclusion or exclusion from the reporting entity is the existence of special financing relationships, regardless of whether the government is able to exercise oversight responsibilities. Finally, the nature and significance of a potential component unit to the primary government could warrant its inclusion within the reporting entity.

Based upon the application of these criteria, the District has no component units, and is not a component unit of another governmental agency.

The summary of significant accounting policies of the District is presented to assist in the understanding of the District's financial statements. The financial statements and notes are the representation of the District's management who is responsible for their integrity and objectivity. The financial statements of the District conform to generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) as applied to governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The more significant of the government's accounting policies are described below.

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements (i.e., the statement of net position and the statement of changes in net position) report information on all of the non-fiduciary activities of the school district.

For the most part, the effect of interfund activity has been removed from these statements. The Governmental activities, which normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues, are reported separately from business type activities which rely, to a significant extent, on fees and charges for support.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or segment is offset by program revenues. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. Program revenues include 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function or segment and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Taxes and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as general revenues.

Separate financial statements are provided for governmental funds and fiduciary funds, even though the latter are excluded from government-wide financial statements. Major individual governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements.

Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting, and Financial Statement Presentation

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Property taxes are recognized as revenues, net of estimated refunds and estimated uncollectable amounts, in the year for which they are levied. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the government considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current fiscal period. Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, debt service expenditures, as well as expenditures related to compensated absences and claims and judgments, are recorded only when payment is due.

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Ad valorem taxes (property taxes), franchise taxes, licenses, and interest associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual and so have been recognized as revenues of the current fiscal period. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met. Expenditure-driven grants are recognized as revenue when the qualifying expenditures have incurred and all other grant requirements have been met and the susceptible to accrual criteria have been met. All other revenue items are considered to be measurable and available only when cash is received by the government.

The agency funds are custodial in nature (assets equal liabilities) and do not present results of operations or have a measurement focus. Agency funds are accounted for using the accrual basis of accounting. These funds are used to account for assets that the District holds for others in an agency capacity.

Governmental funds are used to account for the District's general government activities, including the collection and distribution of specific or legally restricted monies, the acquisition or construction of capital assets, and the servicing of long-term debt. Governmental Funds include:

The *General Fund* is the government's primary operating fund. It accounts for all financial resources of the general government, except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

The *Special Revenue Funds* account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources that are legally restricted for special purposes.

The *Capital Projects Funds* account for the acquisition of fixed assets or construction of major capital projects not being financed by proprietary or nonexpendable trust funds.

The *Debt Service Funds* are used to account for the resources for, and the payment of, principal, interest and related costs.

Under the requirements of GASB Statement No. 34, *Basic Financial Statements – and Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments*, the District is required to present certain of its governmental funds as major funds based upon certain criteria. The major funds presented in the fund financial statements include the following (in addition to the General Fund):

TITLE I – To account for funding for remedial instruction in language arts for educationally deprived students in low-income area. Funds are received from the Federal Government through the New Mexico State Department of Education under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, Title I, Chapter I, part A, 20 U.S.C. 2701 ef seq.

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS SB-9 – To account for funds provided to finance the purchase of equipment and capital improvements to School District property. Funding is received from a 2 mill property tax levy and interest earned on investments, under New Mexico Senate Bill 9.

DEBT SERVICE FUND – To account for the accumulation of resources for, and the payment of, general long-term debt principal, interest, and related cost.

The government also reports the following fund types:

Governmental funds:

Nonmajor Special Revenue Funds - The District accounts for resources restricted to, or designated for, a specific purpose by the District or a grantor in a special revenue fund.

Nonmajor Capital Projects Funds - The proceeds from long-term debt financing and revenues and expenditures related to authorized construction and other capital asset acquisitions are accounted for in a capital projects fund.

Nonmajor Debt Service Funds – For the accumulation of resources for, and the payment of long-term debt principal, interest, and related cost.

Fiduciary funds:

Agency Funds - The District accounts for resources held for others in a custodial capacity in agency funds. The District's Agency Fund is the Student Activity Fund.

As a general rule the effect of interfund activity has been eliminated from the government-wide financial statements.

In addition to assets, the statement of financial position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred outflows of resources, represents a consumption of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense/expenditure) until then. Also, in addition to liabilities, the statement of financial position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred inflows of resources, represents an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time.

Program revenues included in the Statement of Activities derive directly from the program itself or from parties outside the District's taxpayers or citizenry, as a whole; program revenues reduce the cost of the function to be financed from the District's general revenues. Amounts reported as program revenues include 1) charges to customers or applicants for goods, services, or privileges provided, 2) operating grants and contributions, and 3) capital grants and contributions. Internally dedicated resources are reported as general revenues rather than as program revenues. General revenues include all taxes.

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the District's policy to use restricted resources first, and then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

The District reports all direct expenses by function in the Statement of Activities. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a function. The District does not currently employ indirect cost allocation systems. Depreciation expense is specifically identified by function and is included in the direct expense of each function.

Assets, Liabilities, and Net Position or Equity

Deposits and Investments: The District's cash and cash equivalents are considered to be cash on hand, demand deposits, and short-term investments with original maturities of three months or less from the date of acquisition.

State statutes authorize the investment of the District's funds in a wide variety of instruments including certificates of deposit and other similar obligations, state investment pool, and money market accounts. The District is also allowed to invest in United States Government obligations. All funds of the District must follow the above investment policies.

Deposits of funds may be made in interest or non-interest bearing checking accounts in one or more banks or savings and loan associations within the geographical boundaries of the school district. Deposits may be made to the extent that they are insured by an agency of the United States or by collateral deposited as security or by bond given by the financial institution.

The State Board of Finance shall set the rate of interest on non-demand interest-bearing accounts, but in no case shall the rate of interest be less than one hundred percent of the asked price on United States treasury bills of the same maturity on the date of deposit.

Excess of funds may be temporarily invested in securities which are issued by the State or by the United States government, or by their departments or agencies, and which are either direct obligations of the State or the United States or are backed by the full faith and credit of those governments.

Investments for the District are reported at fair value. The State Treasurer's Investment Pool operates in accordance with appropriate state laws and regulations. The reported value of the pool is the same as the fair value of the pool shares.

Receivables and Payables: Activity between funds that are representative of lending/borrowing arrangements outstanding at the end of the fiscal year are referred to as either "due to/from other funds" (i.e. the current portion of interfund loans) or "advances to/from other funds" (i.e. the non-current portion of interfund loans). All other outstanding balances between funds are reported as "due to/from other funds."

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

The District's property taxes are levied each year on the assessed valuation of property located in the District as of the preceding January 1st. Mill levy rates are set by the State of New Mexico each year for the General Fund, and SB - 9. Taxes are payable in two equal installments on November 10th and April 10th following the levy and become delinquent after 30 days.

All receivables are reported at their gross value and, where appropriate, are reduced by the estimated portion that is expected to be uncollectible.

Inventories: The food inventories are valued at cost using the first-in/first-out (FIFO) method. USDA Commodities are recorded at estimated costs. Inventories of governmental funds are recorded as expenditures when consumed rather than when purchased.

Capital Assets: Capital assets, which include property, plant, and equipment, are reported in the applicable governmental-wide financial statements. The District defines capital assets as assets with an initial, individual cost of more than \$5,000 per Section 12-6-10 NMSA 1978, and an estimated useful life extending beyond a single reporting period. Such assets are recorded at historical cost or estimated historical cost if purchased or constructed. Donated capital assets are recorded at estimated fair market value at the date of donation.

The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend assets lives are not capitalized.

Major outlays for capital assets and improvements are capitalized as projects are constructed. Construction expenditures paid by the New Mexico Public Facilities Authority are included in the District's disclosures and financial statements when appropriate.

Property, plant, and equipment of the primary government are depreciated using the straight line method over the following estimated useful lives:

Buildings & Improvements 25-75 years Equipment & Vehicles 5-50 years

Unearned Revenue: The District recognizes grant revenue at the time the related expense is made if the expenditure of funds is the prime factor for determining eligibility for reimbursement; therefore, amounts received and not expended in the Special Revenue Funds are shows as unearned revenues.

Compensated Absences: The District policy is to permit employees to accumulate earned but unused vacation. Accumulated sick leave is not payable upon termination and is recorded as expenditures when it is paid.

Indirect Costs: The District's General Fund receives indirect cost reimbursements from the various federal programs it administers. These reimbursements are for expenses incurred in performing administrative functions on behalf of the Special Revenue Funds. They are shown as expenditures in the Special Revenue Funds, and as other special federal revenue in the General Fund.

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Salaries and Wages: The District pays all salaries and wages due to teachers on or before June 30th of each year.

Net Position or Fund Equity: In the fund financial statements, governmental funds report reservations of fund balance that are not available for appropriation or are legally restricted by outside parties for use for a specific purpose. Designations of fund balance represent tentative management plans that are subject to change. These designations are established to earmark resources for specific future use and to indicate that the fund equity does not represent available spendable resources.

In the government-wide financial statements, fund equity is classified as net position and is displayed in three components:

Net Investment in capital assets: Consists of capital assets including restricted capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances of any bonds, mortgages, notes, or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets.

Restricted Net Position: Consists of net position with constraints placed on the use either by (1) external groups such as creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulation of other governments; or (2) law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation. Descriptions for the related restrictions for net position are restricted for "debt service or capital projects".

Unrestricted Net Position: All other net position that does not meet the definition of "restricted" or "invested in capital assets, net of related debt."

The Government-wide Statement of Net Position reports \$563,428 of restricted net position of which \$563,428 is restricted by enabling legislation.

The District's policy is to apply restricted resources first when an expense is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net position is available.

Fund Balance – the difference between assets and liabilities in the governmental fund financial statements. Fund balance is among the most widely and frequently used information in state and local government financial reports. GASB developed Statement No. 54 to address the diversity of practice and the resulting lack of consistency that had evolved in fund balance reporting. To reduce confusion, the new standards establish a hierarchy of fund balance classifications based primarily on the extent to which a government is bound to observe spending constraints imposed upon how resources reported in governmental funds may be used.

Statement No. 54 distinguishes fund balances based on the relative strength of the constraints that control the purposes for which specific amounts can be spent. Beginning with the most binding constraints, fund balance amounts are reported in the following classifications:

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Nonspendable – portion of net resources that cannot be spent because of their form or because they must remain intact.

Restricted – amounts constrained by external parties, constitutional provision, or enabling legislation.

Committed – amounts constrained by a government using its highest level of decision-making authority. The Board of Education is the highest level of decision making authority.

Assigned – amounts a government intends to use for a particular purpose.

Unassigned – amounts that are not constrained at all will be reported in the general fund.

Statement No. 54 also clarifies the definitions of individual governmental fund types. It interprets certain terms within the definition of special revenue fund types, while further clarifying the debt service and capital projects fund type definitions. The final standard also specifies how economic stabilization or "rainy-day" amounts should be reported.

Interfund Transactions: Quasi-external transactions are accounted for as revenues, expenditures or expenses. Transactions that constitute reimbursements to a fund from expenditures/expenses initially made from it that are properly applicable to another fund, are recorded as expenditures/expenses in the reimbursing fund and as reductions of expenditures/expenses in the fund that it reimbursed.

All other interfund transactions, except quasi-external transactions and reimbursements are reported as transfers. Nonrecurring or non-routine permanent transfers of equity are reported as residual equity transfers. All other interfund transfers are reported as operating transfers.

Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Revenues

State Equalization Guarantee: School districts in the State of New Mexico receive a 'state equalization guarantee distribution' which is defined as "that amount of money distributed to each school district to ensure that the school district's operating revenue, including its local and federal revenues as defined (in Chapter 22, Section 8-25, NMSA 1978) is at least equal to the school district's program cost".

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

A school district's program costs are determined through the use of various formulas using 'program units' which take into consideration 1) early childhood education; 2) basic education; 3) special education; 4) bilingual-multicultural education, 5) size, etc. Payment is made from the public school fund under the authority of the Director of Public School Finance. The District received \$2,708,308 in state equalization guarantee distributions during the year ended June 30, 2019.

Tax Revenues: The District receives mill levy and ad-valorem tax revenues primarily for capital outlay purposes. Tax revenues are recognized when they are in the hands of the collecting agency.

The District records only the portion of the taxes considered to be 'measurable' and 'available'. The District recognized \$620,373 in tax revenues during the year ended June 30, 2019. Descriptions of the individual capital outlay funds contained in these financial statements include information regarding the authority for the collection and use of these taxes.

Property taxes attach an enforceable lien on property as of January 1. Tax notices are sent to property owners by November 1st of each year to be paid in whole or in two installments by November 10th and April 10th of each year. Taos County collects County, City, and School taxes and distributes them to each fund once per month except in June when taxes are distributed twice to close out the fiscal year.

Transportation Distribution: School districts in the State of New Mexico receive student transportation distributions. The transportation distribution is allocated to each school district in accordance with formulas developed by the State Transportation Director and the Director of Public School Finance. The funds shall be used only for the purpose of making payments to each school district for the "to and from" school transportation costs of students in grades K through twelve attending public school within the school district. The District received \$227,816 in transportation distributions during the year ended June 30, 2019.

Instructional Materials: The New Mexico Public Education Department (PED) received federal material leasing funds from which it makes annual allocations to the various school districts for the purchase of educational materials. Of each allocation, fifty percent is restricted to the requisition of materials listed in the State Board of Education "State Adopted Instructional Material" list, while the other fifty percent of each allocation is available for purchases directly from vendors. Allocations received from the State for the year ended June 30, 2019 totaled \$8,595.

Federal Grants: The District receives revenues from various Federal departments (both direct and indirect), which are legally restricted to expenditures for specific purposes. These programs are reported as Special Revenue Funds. Each program is operated under its own budget, which has been approved by the Federal Department or the flow-through agency (usually the New Mexico Public Education Department). The various budgets are approved by the Local School Board and the New Mexico Public Education Department.

The District also receives reimbursement under the National School Lunch Program for its food services operations.

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Pensions: For purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, and pension expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the Educational Retirement Plan (ERP) and additions to/deductions from ERP's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by ERP. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pensions (OPEB): For purposes of measuring the net OPEB liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to OPEB, and OPEB expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the New Mexico Retiree Health Care Authority (NMRHCA) and additions to and deductions from NMRHCA's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by NMRHCA. For this purpose, NMRHCA recognizes benefit payments when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

Tax Abatements: Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 77 requires the District to disclose information on certain tax abatement agreements affecting the District. Accordingly, the District did not have any tax abatements affecting the District during the year ended June 30, 2019.

Deferred Outflows/Inflows of Resources: Both deferred inflows and outflows are reported in the Statement of Net Position, but are not recognized in the financial statements as revenues, expenses, and reduction of liabilities or increase in assets until the period(s) to which they relate. In addition to assets, the District reports a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element represents a use of net position/fund balance that applies to future periods and will not be recognized as an expenditure until that time.

The District also reports a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. This separate financial statement element represents an acquisition of net position/fund balance that applies to future periods and so will not be recognized as revenue until that time. Revenue must be susceptible to accrual (measurable and available to finance expenditures of the current fiscal period) to be recognized. If assets are recognized in connection with a transaction, but those assets are not yet available to finance expenditures of the current fiscal period, then the assets must be offset by a corresponding liability for deferred inflows of resources.

The District reports deferred outflows of resources for pension and OPEB related amounts for the District's share of the difference between projected and actual earnings, for the District's share of the difference between contributions to the individual plans and the proportionate share of the contributions, and for changes of assumptions or other inputs.

The District reports deferred inflows of resources for pension and OPEB related amounts in the government wide financial statements or the District's share of the difference between expected and actual experience and for the District's share of the difference between contributions to the individual plans and the proportionate share of the contributions.

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, revenue and other fund financial resources are recognized in the period in which they become both measurable and available. Assets recorded in the fund financial statements for which the revenues are not available are reported as a deferred inflow of resources. Deferred inflows of resources are also comprised of property tax and long-term receivables that are unavailable in the fund statements.

NOTE 2. RECONCILIATION OF GOVERNMENT-WIDE AND FUND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances includes reconciliation between net changes in fund balances - total governmental funds and changes in net position of governmental activities as reported in the government-wide statement of activities. One element of that reconciliation explains, "Governmental funds report capital outlays as expenditures. However, in the statement of activities the cost of those assets is allocated over their estimated useful lives and reported as depreciation expense." The detail of this \$159 difference is as follows:

NOTE 3. STEWARDSHIP, COMPLIANCE, AND ACCOUNTABILITY

Budgetary Information

Budgets for the General, Special Revenue, and Capital Projects Funds are prepared by management and are approved by the local Board of Education and the Public School Budget and Planning Unit of the Department of Education. Auxiliary student activity accounts and the state directed activities fund are not budgeted.

These budgets are prepared on the Non-GAAP cash basis, excluding encumbrances, and secure appropriation of funds for only one year. Carryover funds must be appropriated in the budget of the subsequent fiscal year. The budget process in the State of New Mexico requires that the beginning cash balance be appropriated in the budget of the subsequent fiscal year. Such appropriated balance is legally restricted and is therefore presented as a reserved portion of fund balance.

Actual expenditures may not exceed the budget on function basis, i.e., each budgeted expenditure function must be within budgeted amounts. Budgets may be amended in two ways. If a budget transfer is necessary within a major category called a 'series', this may be accomplished with only local Board of Education approval. If a transfer between 'series' or a budget increase is required, approval must also be obtained from Public School Finance Division.

The budgetary information presented in these financial statements has been amended in accordance with the above procedures.

NOTE 3. STEWARDSHIP, COMPLIANCE, AND ACCOUNTABILITY (CONTINUED)

The District follows these procedures in establishing the budgetary data reflected in the financial statements:

- In April or May, the Superintendent submits to the Board of Education a proposed operating budget of the fiscal year commencing the following July. The operating budget includes proposed expenditures and the means of financing them, and has approval by the Department of Education.
- In May or June, the budget is approved by the Board of Education.
- The school board meeting, while not intended for the general public, is open for the general public unless a closed meeting has been called.
- The Superintendent is authorized to transfer budgeted amounts between departments within any fund; however, the local Board of Education and the State of New Mexico Department of Education must approve any revisions that alter the total expenditures of any fund.
- Budgets for the General, Special Revenue, Capital Projects, and Debt Service Funds are adopted on a
 basis not consistent with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). Encumbrances are
 treated the same way for GAAP purposes and for Budget purposes.
- The Board of Education may approve amendments to the appropriated budget, which are required
 when a change is made affecting budgeted ending fund balance. The appropriated budget for the
 year ended June 30, 2019 was properly amended by the Board through the year. New Mexico state
 law prohibits a Governmental Agency to exceed an individual line item.

NOTE 4. CASH AND TEMPORARY INVESTMENTS

Deposits of funds may be made in interest or non-interest bearing checking accounts in one or more banks or savings and loan associations within the geographical boundaries of the District. Deposits may be made to the extent that they are insured by an agency of the United States or by collateral deposited as security or by bond given by the financial institution.

The rate of interest in non-demand interest-bearing accounts shall be set by the State Board of Finance, but in no cash shall the rate of interest be less than one hundred percent of the asked price on United States treasury bills of the same maturity on the day of deposit.

Excess of funds may be temporarily invested in securities which are issued by the State or by the United States government, or by their departments or agencies, and which are either direct obligations of the State of the United States or are backed by the full faith and credit of those governments.

NOTE 4. CASH AND TEMPORARY INVESTMENTS (CONTINUED)

The collateral pledged is listed in the table of contents of this report and as listed below. The types of collateral allowed are limited to direct obligations of the United States Government and all bonds issued by any agency, district or political subdivision of the State of New Mexico as limited by Section 6-10-16, NMSA 1978.

By operation of federal law, beginning January 1, 2013, funds deposited in a noninterest-bearing transaction account no longer will receive unlimited deposit insurance coverage by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC). Beginning January 1, 2013, all of the District's accounts at an insured depository institution, including all noninterest-bearing transaction accounts, will be insured by the FDIC up to the standard maximum deposit insurance amount of \$250,000, however, time deposits, savings deposits and interest bearing NOW accounts of a public unit in an institution in the SAME STATE will be insured up to \$250,000 in aggregate and separate from the \$250,000 coverage for public unit demand deposits at the same institution.

Deposits

New Mexico State Statutes require collateral pledged for deposits in excess of the federal deposit insurance to be delivered, or a joint safekeeping receipt to be issued, to the District for at least one-half of the amount on deposit with the institution. The schedule listed below will meet the State of New Mexico, Office of the State Auditor's requirements in reporting the insured portion of the deposits

Custodial Credit Risk – Deposits. Custodial risk is the risk that in the event of bank failure, the District's deposits may not be returned to it. The District does not have a deposit policy for custodial credit risk. As of June 30, 2019, \$216,609 of the District's bank balances of \$551,230 were exposed to custodial credit risk. \$216,609 was uninsured and collateralized by collateral held by the pledging bank's trust department not in the District's name, and \$-0- was uninsured and uncollateralized. At June 30, 2019, the carrying amount of these deposits was \$208,953.

NOTE 9. LONG-TERM DEBT

General Obligation Bonds – The District issues general obligation bonds to provide funds for the acquisition and construction of major capital facilities. Bonds are direct obligations and pledge the full faith and credit of the District. The bonds will be paid from taxes levied against property owners living within the School District boundaries. As part of a Public School Capital Outlay program with the Public School Facilities Authority, there was a local match advance of \$440,910. The local match advance is to be repaid by 2021 and does not bear any interest (see Note 15. Prior Year Restatement). The details of the bonds and advance as of June 30, 2019 are as follows:

NOTE 10. RISK MANAGEMENT

The District is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injury to employees; and natural disasters. The New Mexico Public Schools Insurance Authority (NMPSIA) was formed on April 5, 1985 under the New Mexico Public Schools Insurance Authority Act, Chapter 22, Section 2 of the New Mexico Statutes Annotated (NMSA 978), as amended, as an insurance fund to provide health, disability and life insurance coverage (benefits coverage), and property, casualty and workers' compensation insurance coverage (risk coverage) to participating public schools, school board members, public school employees, and retirees within the State of New Mexico. The District is one of 91 members that participate in NMPSIA. Participation in NMPSIA is mandatory for all K-12 public schools except those with enrollment exceeding 60,000 students. Participation is voluntary for other public education institutions. The District pays an annual premium to the pool for its general insurance coverage. The agreement for formation of NMPSIA provides that the pool will be self-sustaining through member premiums. NMPSIA establishes self-insured retentions by line of coverage and procures insurance or reinsurance, where indicated, in excess of the self-insured retention on a per occurrence basis. Annual financial reports can be obtained from NMPSIA or viewed on their website at https://nmpsia.com/information.html.

NOTE 11. CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

Amounts received or receivable from grant agencies are subject to audit and adjustment by grantor agencies, principally the federal government. Any disallowed claims, including amounts already collected, may constitute a liability of the applicable funds. The amount, if any, of expenditures that may be disallowed by the grantor cannot be determined at this time, although the District expects such amounts, if any, to be immaterial.

NOTE 12. PENSION PLAN - EDUCATIONAL RETIREMENT BOARD

Plan description – The New Mexico Educational Retirement Act (ERA) was enacted in 1957. The act created the Educational Employees Retirement Plan (Plan) and, to administer it, the New Mexico Educational Retirement Board (NMERB). The Plan is included in NMERB's comprehensive annual be found on NMERB's financial report. The report can Web site at https://www.nmerb.org/Annual_reports.html.

The Plan is a cost-sharing, multiple-employer pension plan established to provide retirement and disability benefits for certified teachers and other employees of the state's public schools, institutions of higher learning, and state agencies providing educational programs. Additional tenets of the ERA can be found in Section 22-11-1 through 22-11-52, NMSA 1978, as amended.

The Plan is a pension trust fund of the State of New Mexico. The ERA assigns the authority to establish and amend benefit provisions to a seven-member Board of Trustees (Board); the state legislature has the authority to set or amend contribution rates and other terms of the Plan. NMERB is self-funded through investment income and educational employer contributions. The Plan does not receive General Fund Appropriations from the State of New Mexico.

All accumulated assets are held by the Plan in trust to pay benefits, including refunds of contributions as defined in the terms of the Plan. Eligibility for membership in the Plan is a condition of employment, as defined in Section 22-11-2, NMSA 1978. Employees of public schools, universities, colleges, junior colleges, technical-vocational institutions, state special schools, charter schools, and state agencies providing an educational program, who are employed more than 25% of a full-time equivalency, are required to be members of the Plan, unless specifically excluded.

Pension Benefit – A member's retirement benefit is determined by a formula which includes three component parts: 1) the member's final average salary (FAS), 2) the number of years of service credit, and 3) a 0.0235 multiplier. The FAS is the average of the member's salaries for the last five years of service or any other consecutive five-year period, whichever is greater.

Summary of Plan Provisions for Retirement Eligibility – For members employed before July 1, 2010, a member is eligible to retire when one of the following events occurs:

- The member's age and earned service credit add up to the sum of 75 or more,
- The member is at least sixty-five years of age and has five or more years of earned service credit, or

• The member has service credit totaling 25 years or more.

Chapter 288, Laws of 2009 changed the eligibility requirements for new members first employed on, or after, July 1, 2010 and before July 1, 2013. The eligibility for a member who either becomes a new member on or after July 1, 2010 and before July 1, 2013, or at any time prior to July 1, 2010 refunded all member contributions and then becomes re-employed after July 1, 2010 is as follows:

- The member's age and earned service credit add up to the sum of 80 or more,
- The member is at least sixty-seven years of age and has five or more years of earned service credit, or
- The member has service credit totaling 30 years or more.

Section 2-11-23.2, NMSA 1978 added eligibility requirements for new members who were first employed on or after July 1, 2013, or who were employed before July 1, 2013 but terminated employment and subsequently withdrew all contributions, and returned to work for an ERB employer on or after July 1, 2013. These members must meet one of the following requirements.

- The member's minimum age is 55, and has earned 30 or more years of service credit. Those who
 retire earlier than age 55, but with 30 years of earned service credit will have a reduction in benefits
 to the actuarial equivalent of retiring at age 55.
- The member's minimum age and earned service credit add up to the sum of 80 or more. Those who
 retire under the age of 65, and who have fewer than 30 years of earned service credit will receive
 reduced retirement benefits
- The member's age is 67, and has earned 5 or more years of service credit.

Forms of Payment – The benefit is paid as a monthly life annuity with a guarantee that, if the payments made do not exceed the member's accumulated contributions plus accumulated interest, determined as of the date of retirement, the balance will be paid in a lump sum to the member's surviving beneficiary.

Benefit Options - The Plan has three benefit options available.

• Option A – Straight Life Benefit – The single life annuity option has no reductions to the monthly benefit, and there is no continuing benefit due to a beneficiary or estate, except the balance, if any, of member contributions plus interest less benefits paid prior to the member's death.

NOTE 12. PENSION PLAN - EDUCATIONAL RETIREMENT BOARD (CONTINUED)

- Option B Joint 100% Survivor Benefit The single life annuity monthly benefit is reduced to provide for a 100% survivor's benefit. The reduced benefit is payable during the life of the member, with the provision that, upon death, the same benefit is paid to the beneficiary for his or her lifetime. If the beneficiary predeceases the member, the member's monthly benefit is increased to the amount the member would have received under Option A Straight Life benefit. The member's increased monthly benefit commences in the month following the beneficiary's death.
- Option C Joint 50% Survivor Benefit The single life annuity monthly benefit is reduced to provide
 for a 50% survivor's benefit. The reduced benefit is payable during the life of the member, with the
 provision that, upon death, the reduced 50% benefit is paid to the beneficiary for his or her lifetime.
 If the beneficiary predeceases the member, the member's monthly benefit is increased to the
 amount the member would have received under Option A Straight Life benefit. The member's
 increased monthly benefit commences in the month following the beneficiary's death.

Disability Benefit – An NMERB member is eligible for disability benefits if they have acquired at least ten years of earned service credit and is found totally disabled. The disability benefit is equal to 2% of the member's Final Average Salary (FAS) multiplied by the number of years of total service credits. However, the disability benefit shall not be less than the smaller of (a) one-third of the member's FAS or (b) 2% of the member's FAS multiplied by total years of service credit projected to age 60.

Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) – All retired members and beneficiaries receiving benefits receive an automatic adjustment in their benefit on July 1 following the later of 1) the year a member retires, or 2) the year a member reaches age 65 (Tier 1 and Tier 2) or age 67 (Tier 3).

- Tier 1 membership is comprised of employees who became members prior to July 1, 2010
- Tier 2 membership is comprised of employees who became members after July 1, 2010, but prior to July 1, 2013
- Tier 3 membership is comprised of employees who became members on or after July 1, 2013

As of July 1, 2013, for current and future retirees the COLA is immediately reduced until the Plan is 100% funded. The COLA reduction is based on the median retirement benefit of all retirees excluding disability retirements. Retirees with benefits at or below the median and with 25 or more years of service credit will have a 10% COLA reduction; their average COLA will be 1.5%. Once the funding is greater than 90%, the COLA reductions will decrease. The retirees with benefits at or below the median and with 25 or more years of service credit will have a 5% COLA reduction; their average COLA will be 1.7%.

Members on disability retirement are entitled to a COLA commencing on July 1 of the third full year following disability retirement. A member on regular retirement who can prove retirement because of a disability may qualify for a COLA beginning July 1 in the third full year of retirement.

Refund of Contributions – Members may withdraw their contributions only when they terminate covered employment in the State and their former employer(s) certification determination has been received by NMERB. Interest is paid to members when they withdraw their contributions following

termination of employment at a rate set by the Board. Interest is not earned on contributions credited to accounts prior to July 1, 1971, or for contributions held for less than one year.

The contribution requirements are established in statute under Chapter 10, Article 11, NMSA 1978. The requirements may be amended by acts of the New Mexico Legislature. For the fiscal years ended June 30, 2019 and 2018, the District paid employee and employer contributions of \$419,846 and \$441,193, which equal the amount of the required contributions for each fiscal year.

Pension Liabilities, Pension Expense, and Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to Pensions – At June 30, 2019, the District reported a liability of \$9,239,564 for its proportionate share of the net pension liability. The net pension liability was measured as of June 30, 2018, and the total pension liability used to calculate the net pension liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of June 30, 2017. The total pension liability was rolled-forward from the valuation date to the plan year ending June 30, 2018 using generally accepted actuarial principles.

The roll-forward incorporates the impact of the new assumptions adopted by the Board on April 21, 2017. There were no other significant events of changes in benefit provisions that required an adjustment to the roll-forward liabilities as of June 30, 2018. Therefore, the employer's portion was established as of the measurement date of June 30, 2018. The District's proportion of the net pension liability was based on a projection of the District's long-term share of contributions to the pension plan relative to the projected contributions of all participating educational institutions at June 30, 2018, actuarially determined. At June 30, 2018, the District's proportion was 0.0777 %, which was an increase of 0.0163% from its proportion measured as of June 30, 2017.

For the year ended June 30, 2019, the District recognized pension expense of \$864,961. At June 30, 2019, District reported deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions from the following sources:

NOTE 12. PENSION PLAN - EDUCATIONAL RETIREMENT BOARD (CONTINUED)

Actuarial assumptions and methods are set by the Plan's Board of Trustees, based upon recommendations made by the Plan's actuary. The Board adopted new assumptions on April 21, 2017 in conjunction with the six-year actuarial experience study period ending June 30, 2016. At that time, the Board adopted several economic assumption changes, including a decrease in the inflation assumption from 3.00% to 2.50%. The 0.50% decrease in the inflation assumption also led to decreases in the nominal investment return assumption from 7.75% to 7.25%, the assumed annual wage inflation rate from 3.75% to 3.25%, the payroll growth assumption from 3.50% to 3.00%, and the annual assumed COLA from 2.00% to 1.90%.

Discount rate. A single discount rate of 5.69% was used to measure the total pension liability as of June 30, 2018. This rate is .21% less than the 5.90% discount rate used for June 30, 2017.

The June 30, 2018 single discount rate was based on a long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments of 7.25%, and a municipal bond rate of 3.62%. Based on the stated assumptions and the projection of cash flows, the pension plan's fiduciary net position and future contributions were sufficient to finance the benefit payments through the year 2050. As a result, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to projected benefit payments through the 2050 fiscal year, and the municipal bond rate was applied to all benefit payments after that date.

The projections of cash flows used to determine the June 30, 2018 single discount rate assumed that plan member and employer contributions will be made at the current statutory levels.

NOTE 13. POST-EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS – STATE RETIREE HEALTH CARE PLAN

Plan Description - Employees for the District are provided with OPEB through the Retiree Health Care Fund (the Fund) - a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit OPEB plan administered by the New Mexico Retiree Health Care Authority (NMRHCA). NMRHCA was formed February 13, 1990, under the New Mexico Retiree Health Care Act (the Act) of New Mexico Statues Annotated, as amended (NMSA 1978), to administer the Fund under Section 10-7C-1-19 NMSA 1978. The Fund was created to provide comprehensive group health insurance coverage for individuals (and their spouses, dependents and surviving spouses) who have retired or will retire from public service in New Mexico.

NMRHCA is an independent agency of the State of New Mexico. The funds administered by NMRHCA are considered part of the State of New Mexico financial reporting entity and are OPEB trust funds of the State of New Mexico. NMRHCA's financial information is included with the financial presentation of the State of New Mexico.

Benefits provided – The Fund is a multiple employer cost sharing defined benefit healthcare plan that provides eligible retirees (including terminated employees who have accumulated benefits but are not yet receiving them), their spouses, dependents and surviving spouses and dependents with health insurance and prescription drug benefits consisting of a plan, or optional plans of benefits, that can be contributions to the Fund and by co-payments or out-of-pocket payments of eligible retirees.

Contributions – Employer and employee contributions to the Fund total 3% for non-enhanced retirement plans and 3.75% of enhanced retirement plans of each participating employee's salary as required by Section 10-7C-15 NMSA 1978. The contributions are established by statue and are not based on an actuarial calculation. All employer and employee contributions are non-refundable under any circumstance, including termination of the employer's participation in the Fund. Contributions to the Fund from the District were \$53,898 for the year ended June 30, 2019.

OPEB Liabilities, OPEB Expense, Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to OPEB - At June 30, 2019, the District reported a liability of \$2,569,443 for its proportionate share of the net OPEB liability. The net OPEB liability was measured as of June 30, 2018, and the total OPEB liability used to calculate the net OPEB liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of June 30, 2017. The District's proportion of the net OPEB liability was based on actual contributions provided to the Fund for the year ending June 30, 2018. At June 30, 2018, the District's proportion was 0.05909 percent.

For this purpose, employer contributions that are intended to fund benefits of current plan members and their beneficiaries are included. Projected employer contributions that are intended to fund the service costs for future plan members and their beneficiaries are not included. 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NONMAJOR GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS

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SPECIAL REVENUE FUNDS

SPECIAL REVENUE FUNDS

The Special Revenue Funds are used to account for Federal, State, and Local funded grants. These grants are awarded to the District with the purpose of accomplishing specific educational tasks. Grants accounted for in the Special Revenue Funds include:

FOOD SERVICE (21000) — To account for funding for the school hot lunch program. Funding is provided by fees from patrons and USDA food reimbursements, under the National School Lunch Act of 1946, as amended, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, State Law 22-13-13.

ATHLETICS (22000) – To account for revenues received from non-instructional activities for use in the District's athletic and other non-instructional programs. Required by the New Mexico State Department of Education Manual of Procedures for New Mexico School Districts to be accounted for as a separate fund. Authority for this fund is the New Mexico Administrative Code 6.20.2.

ENTITLEMENT IDEA-B (24106) – To account for a federal grant restricted for the operation and maintenance of meeting the special education needs of children with disabilities. Authority for the creation of this fund is the Individuals with Disabilities Act Part B, Sec. 611, as amended; Public Laws 91-230, 93-380, 94-142, 98-199, 99-457, 100-630, and 101-476; 20 U.S.C. 1401-1419, Public Law 105-17.

PRESCHOOL IDEA-B (24109) – To account for a federal grant restricted for the operation and maintenance of meeting the special education needs of children with disabilities. Authority for the creation of this fund is the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, Part B, Sec. 611, as amended; Public Law 105-17.

IDEA-B RESULTS PLAN NON-TITLE I SCHOOLS (24132) – To improve growth rates in the areas of reading and math for students with disabilities.

TEACHER/PRINCIPAL TRAINING (24154) —To provide grants to State Education Agencies on a formula basis to increase student academic achievement through strategies such as improving teacher and principal quality and increasing the number of highly qualified teachers in the classroom and highly qualified principals and assistant principals in schools and hold local educational agencies and schools accountable for improvements in student academic achievement. The authority for the creation of this fund is the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 as amended; Title II, Part A, Public Law 107-110.

SPECIAL REVENUE FUNDS (CONTINUED)

TITLE I SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT (24162) — To provide supplemental educational opportunity for academically disadvantaged children in the area of residing. Campuses are identified for program participation by the percentage of students on free or reduced price lunches. Any school with a free and reduced price lunch percentage that is equal to or greater than the total district percentage becomes eligible for program participation. Any student whose test scores fall below District established criteria and who is attending a Title I campus is eligible to receive Title I services. Poverty is the criteria that identifies a campus; education need determines the students to be served. Federal revenues accounted for in this fund are allocated to the District through the New Mexico Department of Education. Authority for creation of this fund is Part A of Chapter I of Title I of Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) of 1965, as amended, Public Law 103-383.

TITLE XIX MEDICAID (25153) – To account for monies received from the State of New Mexico to be used to provide direct services to 4 year old children in Pre-Kindergarten programs.

RURAL EDUCATION (25233) – To provide financial assistance to rural districts to carry out activities to help improve the quality of teaching and learning in rural schools. The authority for the creation of this fund is the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA), Title VI, Part B, as amended.

LANL FOUNDATION (26113) – Local grant sponsored by Los Alamos National Laboratory that was used to provide a scholarship to a senior high student that was to be used in a four-year program for educational efforts in pursuing an engineering degree at a New Mexico college or university.

DUAL CREDIT TEXTBOOKS (27103) – To purchase college textbooks for students who dual enroll in college credit courses while still attending high school. Authority for the creation of this fund is New Mexico state statute.

READS TO LEAD (27114) – To account for funds received to 1) increase the quality of reading instruction; 2) provide a screening assessment for use in planning data-driven instruction; 3) provide quality professional development for administrators, reading coaches, and teachers; 4) ensure that districts/charter schools have a comprehensive plan for addressing literacy instruction; and 5) reach out to parents and families with free resources in English and Spanish to support children's reading at home. Authority for the creation of this fund is New Mexico House Bill 2.

TRUANCY INITIATIVE (27141) – To account for funds received to hire truancy and dropout prevention coaches with appropriate state licensure. The coaches will monitor and report on the performance of each school assigned a coach. The reporting will include information about truancy and dropout statistics, as well as documentation about various events and programming provided by the school as related to truancy and dropout prevention.

PRE-K INITIATIVE (27149) – To account for funding to address the total development needs of preschool children, including physical, cognitive, social and emotional needs, and shall include health care, nutrition, safety and multicultural sensitivity.

SPECIAL REVENUE FUNDS (CONTINUED)

BREAKFAST FOR ELEMENTARY STUDENTS (27155) – The 2005 Legislative General Appropriations Act allocated \$475,000 to implement Breakfast in the Classroom for elementary schools in need of improvement based on 2004-2005 AYP designation.

NM GROWN FRESH FRUIT & VEGETABLES (27183) - To account for appropriations received from the New Mexico Public Education Department for the purchase of New Mexico grown fresh fruits and vegetables for school meal programs. Authority for the creation of this fund is the New Mexico Public Education Department.

CAPITAL PROJECTS FUNDS

Capital Project Funds are used to account for financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction for major capital facilities. The District has the following separate funds classified as Capital Projects Funds:

BOND BUILDING (31100) – The Bond Building Fund is used to account for the accumulation of resources for the funds provided from the District's bond issues. Resources are used for the purpose of erecting, remodeling, making additions to, or furnishing public school buildings and purchasing or improving public school grounds. Financing is provided by ad valorem taxes as specified by Article of the Finance of Counties, Municipalities, and School Districts Act, and the payment of, general long-term debt principal, interest and related costs.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS MATCH (31200) – To account for the costs relating to erecting, remodeling, making additions to, providing equipment for, or furnishing public school buildings and purchasing or improving public school grounds. Financing is provided through property taxes as specified by Article 26 of the Public School Buildings Act. (House Bill 33)

CAPITAL IMPROVMENTS SB-9 (31700) - To account for a 2.0 mill levy restricted by board resolution for erecting, remodeling, making additions to, providing equipment for, and furnishing school buildings, improving school grounds and maintenance of school buildings and grounds, exclusive of salary expense of employees. Authority for the creation of this fund is NMSA 22-25-1 to 22-25-10. Reported as a capital projects fund.

Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the District's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. We consider the deficiencies described in the accompanying schedule of findings and responses as items 2019-003 and 2019-004 to be material weaknesses.



A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance. We consider the deficiencies described in the accompanying schedule of findings and responses as items 2019-001, 2019-002, and 2019-005 to be significant deficiencies.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the District's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*, and which are described in the accompanying schedule of findings and responses as items 2019-006, 2019-007, 2019-008, 2019-009, 2019-010, and 2019-011.

District's Response to Findings

The District's response to the findings identified in our audit is described in the accompanying schedule of findings and responses. The District's response was not subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and, accordingly we express no opinion on it.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the entity's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.

B. FINANCIAL STATEMENT FINDINGS

2019-001 [Previously 2017-001] Lack of Timely Monitoring of Budget (Significant Deficiency) Repeated and Modified

CONDITION: The District had expenditure functions where actual expenditures exceeded budgetary authority:

Management has not made progress in correcting this audit finding.

CRITERIA: According to NMAC 6.20.2.9(A) every school district shall follow budget requirements stated in Sections 22-8-5 through 22-8-12.2 NMSA 1978, and procedures of the department in preparing, submitting, maintaining and reporting budgetary information. Budgetary control shall be at the function level. Over-expenditure of a function shall not be allowed.

EFFECT: The District is non-compliant with State Law, and the controls established through the use of budgets have been compromised.

CAUSE: Budget adjustment requests were not submitted to the Public Education Department to obtain budgetary authority for these expenditures.

RECOMMENDATION: We recommend that the District establish a policy of budgetary review at year end, to ensure that necessary budget adjustment requests are prepared, submitted, and approved.

MANAGEMENT RESPONSE: Management is aware of this issue and will establish procedures to ensure budgetary compliance. A quarterly budget review will be implemented to ensure budgetary authority is established.

RESPONSIBLE PARTY / TIMELINE TO CORRECT: Business Manager & Superintendent & Governing Board / July 2019.

B. FINANCIAL STATEMENT FINDINGS (CONTINUED)

2019-002 [Previously 2017-002] Unauthorized Interfund Loans (Significant Deficiency) – Repeated and Modified

CONDITION: The District did not maintain sufficient cash amounts within the General Fund to cover operational and program expenditures. Internal controls within the cash management function for fiscal year 2019 were not implemented sufficiently and cash deficits within the program funds did occur. For the year ended June 30, 2019 the General Fund did not maintain enough cash balance to cover program overages of \$318,936.

Management has not made progress in correcting this audit finding.

CRITERIA: According to NMAC 6.20.2.14 Cash Control Standards – A, "School districts shall establish and maintain a cash management program to safeguard cash and provide prompt and accurate reporting that adheres to cash management requirements of the Office of Management and Budget (OMB)Circular A-102, and applicable state and federal laws and regulations" and NMAC 6.20.2.14 Cash Control Standards-E, "The school district shall verify that there is sufficient cash and budget prior to the disbursement of cash. A revenue ledger is required for each revenue code as approved in the finalized budget, and additional revenue ledgers may be added as necessary."

EFFECT: Improper cash management may result in the need to finance normal operations and may potentially result in a going concern issue for the District.

CAUSE: Requests for reimbursement for special revenue funds are not being made timely. The general fund is also experiencing declining cash balances.

RECOMMENDATION: Management should develop a plan to manage cash balances to ensure that cash balances are sufficient to cover the expenditures in the special revenue funds until reimbursements are received from the New Mexico Public Education Department.

MANAGEMENT RESPONSE: Management is aware of this issue as PED is untimely in getting the district reimbursements. Requests for Reimbursements are done on a monthly basis. Cash transfers will be made to the reimbursement funds that were not fully reimbursed in FY18.

RESPONSIBLE PARTY / TIMELINE TO CORRECT: Business Manager/January 2020.

B. FINANCIAL STATEMENT FINDINGS (CONTINUED)

2019-003 [Previously 2018-002] Internal Control Structure (Material Weakness) Repeated and Modified

CONDITION: During our test work, we were not able to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence to test certain transactions selected for testing.

- The estimated amount for compensated absences at June 30, 2019 was \$36,079. The District was unable to provide detailed documentation on how this amount was calculated.
- During our testing of gas card transactions, the appropriate supporting documentation could not be located for three of the four transaction in the amount of \$5,653. Additionally, the "Vehicle Request" form was not available for these three transactions.
- Two Credit Card transactions were selected for testing. Not all the appropriate supporting documentation was available for these two transactions. The total amount of these transactions was \$1,353.
- In a random sample of twenty-five cash disbursements:
 - o For fourteen disbursements the District could not locate the supporting documentation (i.e., invoices) totaling \$36,690.
 - For three disbursements the Purchase Order was dated after the invoice date totaling \$727.
 - o For two food purchase disbursements the listing of coaches and students participating was not included totaling \$134.
 - There was one Purchase Requisition missing the required second signature in the amount of \$50.
 - There were six Purchase Requisitions that could not be located totaling \$2,004.
 - There was one check which was missing the required second signature in the amount of \$673.
- A food inventory was not conducted at year end for fiscal year 2019.

Management has not made progress in correcting this audit finding.

CRITERIA: NMAC 6.20.2.17 states that each school shall establish and implement written policies and procedures for purchasing, which shall be in compliance with the procurement code Section 13-1-21, NMSA 1978. An internal control structure over purchasing shall be established and maintained to assure compliance with school district policy, and state and federal regulations. Per the school's Purchasing policy, "The Business Manager then approves the Purchase Requisition, which is then created into a Purchase Order. The PO is then printed and given to the Office Manager to order supplies that have been approved."

EFFECT: The proper maintenance of supporting documentation relating to financial transactions is necessary to mitigate possible dual payment of invoices and to resolve possible disputes with vendors, etc. Unauthorized transactions leave the District open to possible misappropriations of public monies.

B. FINANCIAL STATEMENT FINDINGS (CONTINUED)

CAUSE: District personnel did not follow established internal control policies and procedures of the District or the New Mexico Public Education Department.

RECOMMENDATION: We recommend the school review its policies and procedures to ensure that all policies and procedures created by the District and the New Mexico Public Education Department are being properly followed.

MANAGEMENT RESPONSE: The amount of management and support turnover in FY19 resulted in a lack of management oversight. With new management in place for FY20 procedures will be implemented to ensure all sufficient back up is organized and in place before any payment is made.

RESPONSIBLE PARTY / TIMELINE TO CORRECT: Business Manager, Superintendent & Governing Board / July 2019.

B. FINANCIAL STATEMENT FINDINGS (CONTINUED)

2019-004 [Previously 2018-003] Activity Funds (Material Weakness) Repeated and Modified

CONDITION: During our testing of the student activity funds we noted that the District is not maintaining proper and complete supporting documentation for fundraising activities:

- Ten activity fund disbursements were selected for testing. Seven of these disbursements were missing the Purchase Requisition, Purchase Order, Vendor Invoice, or Check Copy totaling \$5,788. We also noted that one Purchase Order in the amount \$1,704 was dated after the Vendor's invoice date.
- For two of ten activity fund deposits selected for testing in the amount of \$562, the deposit was not made timely. For four of ten activity fund deposits tested, the person verifying or accepting the deposit for the District did not sign the supporting documentation in the amount of \$4,519. For three of ten activity fund deposits selected for testing, the documentation supporting the deposit could not be located in the amount of \$4,683.

Management has not made progress in correcting this audit finding.

CRITERIA: 6-5-2C NMSA 1978 states that an entity shall implement internal controls designed to prevent accounting errors and violations of state and federal law and rules related to financial matters. NMAC 6.20.2 states that "money received and receipted shall be deposited in the bank within twenty-four (24) hours or one banking day.

EFFECT: The District is non-compliant with State Law and its own internal policies.

CAUSE: The District experienced a loss of many key personnel during the fiscal year including sponsors of the fundraisers. As a result of this, the documentation for the fundraisers cannot be located.

RECOMMENDATION: We recommend that the District implement standardized policies with respect to controls over student activity funds at all of its schools.

MANAGEMENT'S RESPONSE: Management will review policies and procedures with staff to ensure they are following the procurement code and cash receipts policy.

RESPONSIBLE PARTY / TIMELINE TO CORRECT: Superintendent & Business Manager/ January 2020.

B. FINANCIAL STATEMENT FINDINGS (CONTINUED)

2019-005 [Previously 2018-004] Payroll Documentation (Significant Deficiency) Repeated and Modified

CONDITION: While testing a sample of twenty-five payroll transactions we noted the following:

- For nineteen transaction we could not recalculate the gross pay indicated on the payroll register. In aggregate the variance was \$839 for these nineteen transactions.
- Two personnel files did not have evidence that a background check was conducted on the employee.
- Five personnel files did not contain a properly completed Form I-9.
- For five transactions we noted the timesheet was not completed in accordance with District policy. The gross wages for these five transactions were \$2,861.
- For one employee we could not verify that stipend pay of \$217 was properly authorized.

Management has not made progress in correcting this audit finding.

CRITERIA: NMAC 6.20.2.18 states the local board shall establish written payroll policies and procedures, which comply with state and federal regulations on payroll as well as maintaining strict internal controls, close supervision and financial accounting in accordance with GAAP. School districts shall maintain and have available for inspection the following employee record documentation: employment contracts (including increments), personnel/payroll action forms, certification records, employment eligibility verification (federal form I-9 for citizenship certification), federal and state withholding allowance certificates, pay deduction authorizations, pay or position change notices, Educational Retirement Act plan application, and direct deposit authorizations.

EFFECT: Employees potentially could have been paid at an unauthorized rate. Employees not eligible to work in the United States may be receiving payment. Having an employee on staff without proof of a background check leaves the District vulnerable to potential lawsuits.

CAUSE: A transition between two different administrations occurred during the fiscal year. Certain documentation was misplaced during this transition.

RECOMMENDATION: We recommend the District comply with NMAC 6.20.2.18 and obtain the required forms prior to processing the employee's payroll. We also recommend that the District tighten its policies with respect to personnel file maintenance.

MANAGEMENT RESPONSE: The Business Manager supplied the district with a personnel file checklist to ensure all proper documentation is completed and in the file. An internal review will take place to ensure personnel files are up to date with all required documentation.

RESPONSIBLE PARTY / TIMELINE TO CORRECT: Superintendent & Business Manager/July 2019.

C. OTHER FINDINGS, AS REQUIRED BY NEW MEXICO STATE STATUTE, SECTION 12-6-5, NMSA 1978

2019-006 [Previously 2018-007] Audit Committee Member (Other Non-Compliance) Repeated and Modified

CONDITION: During our test-work, we noted that the District did not have all four required audit committee members during the year.

Management has not made progress in correcting this audit finding.

CRITERIA: Per NM State Statute 22-8-12.3: "Each local school board shall appoint an audit committee that consists of two board members, one volunteer member who is a parent of a student attending that school district and one volunteer member who has experience in accounting or financial matters. The superintendent and the school district business manager shall serve as ex-officio members of the committee."

EFFECT: The District is not in compliance with a state statute.

CAUSE: The District has failed to recruit all required audit committee members during the fiscal year.

RECOMMENDATION: We recommend the District recruit all required members as soon as possible for the audit committee to meet state statute requirements.

MANAGEMENT'S RESPONSE: The district has recruited the individuals to make up a complete audit committee in July 2019.

RESPONSIBLE PARTY / TIMELINE TO CORRECT: Superintendent/July 2019.

C. OTHER FINDINGS, AS REQUIRED BY NEW MEXICO STATE STATUTE, SECTION 12-6-5, NMSA 1978 (CONTINUED)

2019-007 [Previously 2018-008] Annual Inventory (Other Non-Compliance) Repeated and Modified

CONDITION: The District did not perform an annual inventory of its capital assets during fiscal year 2019.

Management made some progress in regard to this finding. The Board approved the disposal of items which no longer meet the \$5,000 capitalization threshold and management is in the process of updating their fixed asset records.

CRITERIA: Section 12-6-10 (A) NMSA 1978 requires each agency to conduct an annual physical inventory of moveable chattels and equipment on the inventory list at the end of each fiscal year. The agency shall certify the correctness of the inventory after the physical inventory. This certification should be provided to the School's auditors.

EFFECT: The District did not comply with state requirements regarding capital asset inventory.

CAUSE: Internal controls are not in place to ensure an annual inventory is performed.

RECOMMENDATION: On an annual basis, complete an inventory of the District's capital assets.

MANAGEMENT RESPONSE: Policies and procedures will be reviewed by management to ensure an annual inventory is conducted by year end.

RESPONSIBLE PARTY / TIMELINE TO CORRECT: Superintendent/July 2019.

C. OTHER FINDINGS, AS REQUIRED BY NEW MEXICO STATE STATUTE, SECTION 12-6-5, NMSA 1978 (CONTINUED)

2018-008 [Previously 2018-009] Travel and Per Diem (Other Non-Compliance) Repeated and Modified

CONDITION: We selected five Travel and Per Diem transactions for testing. We noted the following items in our testing:

- Three travel reimbursement forms were missing the required signatures in the amount of \$349.
- Two travel reimbursements did not have the proper supporting documentation (i.e., invoice) totaling \$204.
- For one travel reimbursement the Purchase Order was created after the date of travel in the amount of \$54.

Management has not made progress in correcting this finding.

CRITERIA: Travel and Per Diem in New Mexico is regulated by NMSA 10-8-4. The District also has to follow guidelines established by the New Mexico Department of Education as well as its own internal travel policies.

EFFECT: The District did not comply with established Travel and Per Diem policies.

CAUSE: District personnel did not adhere to the District's internal policies regarding Travel and Per Diem.

RECOMMENDATION: The District should ensure that its Travel and Per Diem policies are adhered to in the future.

MANAGEMENT RESPONSE: Management will review policies and procedures with staff to ensure they are following the procurement code. Payment will not be made until all required signatures and back up is supplied to the business manager.

RESPONSIBLE PARTY / TIMELINE TO CORRECT: Superintendent & Business Manager/ November 2019.

C. OTHER FINDINGS, AS REQUIRED BY NEW MEXICO STATE STATUTE, SECTION 12-6-5, NMSA 1978 (CONTINUED)

2019-009 Procurement (Other Non-Compliance)

CONDITION: We were unable to test compliance with the New Mexico Procurement Code for fiscal year 2019. The District could not locate the documentation related to any procurements that occurred in fiscal year 2019.

CRITERIA: The District is subject to procurement as established in NMSA 13-1-014 and NMSA 13-1-113.

EFFECT: The District was not in compliance with the New Mexico procurement code.

CAUSE: A transition between two different administrations occurred during the fiscal year. Certain documentation was misplaced during this transition.

RECOMMENDATION: We recommend that the District establish procedures to ensure that procurement is conducted in compliance with the New Mexico procurement code and that the supporting documentation for this is properly maintained.

MANAGEMENT RESPONSE: The turnover of management in FY19 caused items to be misplaced. The supporting documentation needed to test procurement code is in place for FY20.

RESPONSIBLE PARTY / TIMELINE TO CORRECT: Superintendent/July 2019.

C. OTHER FINDINGS, AS REQUIRED BY NEW MEXICO STATE STATUTE, SECTION 12-6-5, NMSA 1978 (CONTINUED)

2019-010 Educational Retirement Board Compliance (Other Non-Compliance)

CONDITION: During our compliance testing with the New Mexico Office of the State Auditor Rule 2.2.2.10G(7) NMAC, we noted that there were seven months that the incorrect amount was remitted to the Educational Retirement Board. The District under paid contributions totaling \$14,253 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2019.

CRITERIA: Under the New Mexico State Audit Rule, auditors are required to ensure that contributions to the Educational Retirement Board are correct and made in accordance with the Educational Retirement Act, Sections 22-11-1 to 22-11-55 NMSA 1978.

EFFECT: Contributions to the Educational Retirement Board were underpaid.

CAUSE: The District was using a certain report generated by the accounting software. The District has stopped using that report and is now using a payroll deductions report.

RECOMMENDATION: The Educational Retirement Board Contribution Report should be reviewed for mathematical accuracy by someone other than the preparer of the form. If payroll adjustments are calculated in the preparation of the form, those adjustments should be attached to the contribution form.

MANAGEMENT RESPONSE: The reports used from the district's financial software was generating incorrect reports. The district has changed the report used to ensure all employees are listed and total contributions are being remitted to ERB. The district will reconcile FY19 and pay ERB the underpaid contributions.

RESPONSIBLE PARTY / TIMELINE TO CORRECT: Business Manager/ December 2019.

C. OTHER FINDINGS, AS REQUIRED BY NEW MEXICO STATE STATUTE, SECTION 12-6-5, NMSA 1978 (CONTINUED)

2019-011 Chief Procurement Officer (Other Non-Compliance)

CONDITION: It was noted that the District did not have an active Chief Procurement Officer in place for the year ended June 30, 2019.

CRITERIA: Per 13-1-95.2.A NMSA 1978, "On or before January 1 of each year beginning in 2014, and every time a chief procurement officer is hired, each state agency and local public body shall provide to the state purchasing agent the name of the state agency's or local public body's chief procurement officer and information identifying the state agency's or local public body's central purchasing office, if applicable." Section 13-1-95.2 D NMSA 1978 also requires that the Chief Procurement Officer obtain an initial certification as well as recertification every two years.

EFFECT: The District is not in compliance with New Mexico State Statutes requiring the training, certification, and reporting of a Chief Procurement Officer.

CAUSE: The District did not have a certified Chief Procurement Officer.

RECOMMENDATION: The School should designate an individual with the appropriate skill set and position within the school to be its Chief Procurement Officer. This individual should obtain the necessary certification as soon as possible. Upon certification of a Chief Procurement Officer, the school should register this individual on the New Mexico General Services Department website.

MANAGEMENT'S RESPONSE: In July 2019 the Superintendent was certified as the District's CPO.
