#### INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

Mr. Hector Balderas, State Auditor and Mr. Larry Whitefield, Chairperson and Members of the Board of Supervisors Socorro Soil and Water Conservation District 103 Francisco de Avondo Socorro, New Mexico 87801

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the general fund and the respective budgetary comparison and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Socorro Soil and Water Conservation District (District) as of and for the year ended June 30, 2009, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the District's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes consideration of the internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

### INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT, continued

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the District as of June 30, 2009, and the respective changes in financial position, thereof and the budgetary comparison for the general fund for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

The District has not presented the Management's Discussion and Analysis required by *GASB Statement No. 34* that the Governmental Accounting Standards board has determined is necessary to supplement, although not required to be part of, the basic financial statements.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated May 30, 2012 on our consideration of the District's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the basic financial statements, the general fund and the respective budgetary comparisons and the aggregate remaining fund information, of the Socorro Soil and Water Conservation District (District). The additional schedule listed as supplemental information in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basis financial statements. Such supplemental information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

### I. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

### A. Reporting Entity

The Socorro Soil and Water Conservation District (District) is organized under the provisions of the Soil and Water Conservation District Act (73-20-25 through 73-20-49 NMSA 1978). The District is a governmental subdivision of the state, a public body corporate and politic, organized for control and prevention of flood, sediment, and soil erosion damage, and to further the conservation, development and beneficial use of water and soil resources. The governing body of the District consists of seven elected supervisors, four of whom must be landowners in the District. Three additional supervisors are appointed to the District board. Supervisors serve a term of three years and continue in office until a successor is elected or appointed.

The financial reporting entity as defined by GASB 14 consists of the primary government, organizations for which the primary government is financially accountable and other organizations whose exclusion from the financial reporting entity would cause the financial statements to be misleading.

A primary government is any state government or general-purpose local government and the organizations comprising its legal entity. Although the District is organized as a subdivision of the State and administratively attached to the New Mexico State University, Department of Agriculture, the statutory powers of the District establish it as a primary government with a separate corporate and legal identity. The District has no component units, financially dependent affiliates, nor is it legally liable for actions of other agencies.

The financial statements of the District have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB). To enhance the usefulness of the financial statements, the significant policies of the District are summarized below.

### B. Government-wide and Fund Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements (i.e. the statement of net assets) report information on all of the non-fiduciary activities of the primary government. Governmental activities, which normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues, are reported separately from business-type activities, which rely to a significant extent on fees and charges for support. However, the District does not have any business-type activities.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function, or segment, are offset by program revenues. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. Program revenues include 1) charges to customers or applicants for goods, services, or privileges provided, 2) operating grants from federal and state sources, and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment, and 3) capital grants and contributions. Property taxes and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as general revenues.

Separate financial statements are provided for governmental funds and fiduciary funds, even though the latter are excluded from the government-wide financial statements. Major individual governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements.

### C. Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Property taxes are recognized as revenues in the year for which they are levied. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenues as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the government considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current fiscal period. Expenditures are generally recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, debt service expenditures, as well as expenditures related to compensated absences and claims and judgments, if any, are recorded only when payment is due.

Property taxes and interest associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual and so have been recognized as revenues of the current fiscal period. All other revenue items are considered to be measureable and available only when cash is received by the government.

The agency funds for the Lower Rio Grande Salt Cedar Control Project are custodial in nature (assets equal liabilities) and do not present results of operations or have a measurement focus. Agency funds are accounted for using the accrual basis of accounting. These funds are used to account for assets that the district holds for others in an agency capacity.

Governmental funds are used to account for the District's general governmental activities, including the collection and disbursement of specific or legally restricted monies, the acquisition or construction of capital assets, and the servicing of general long-term debt.

The District reports the following major governmental funds:

The general fund is the District's only operating fund. It accounts for all financial resources of the general government including proceeds of any specific revenue sources that are legally restricted to expenditures for specific purposes. The general fund was also set up to account for the District's Low Interest Loan program. The District receives low interest loans from the New Mexico Interstate Stream Commission (NMISC) to lend landowners in the District funds at low interest rates to finance conservation projects on their property pursuant to the provisions of section 72-14-20 NMSA 1978.

Private-sector standards of accounting and financial reporting issued prior to December 1, 1989, generally are followed in the government-wide financial statements to the extent that those standards do not conflict with or contradict guidance of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the government's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

### D. Assets and Liabilities

1. Cash, Cash Equivalents and Investments

The District's cash and cash equivalents consist of demand deposits and short term investments (certificates of deposit) with original maturities of twelve months or less from the date of acquisition.

State statues authorize the district to invest in obligations of the U.S. Treasury, repurchase agreements, certificates of deposit and the State Treasurer's Investment Pool. Investments for the government, if applicable, are reported at fair value.

### 2. Accounts Receivable and Accounts Payable

Accounts receivable consist of \$1,467 for property tax receivable and \$40 for interest receivable on the certificate of deposit, and \$870 for interest accrued on notes receivable, for a total of \$2,377.

Property taxes attach an enforceable lien as of January 1. Taxes are payable in equal semi-annual installments on November 10 and April 10 of the subsequent year. The taxes became delinquent thirty days after the due date. The taxes are collected by the Socorro County Treasurer and are remitted to the District in the month following collection.

The District's accounts payable represent routine monthly bills for service rendered and products purchased in the current years which are paid for in the next fiscal year. Total accounts payable at year-end were \$10,112, accrued payroll liabilities at year end were \$5,796. The total payables were \$15,908 at year end.

### 3. Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include property and equipment (including software), are reported in the governmental activities column in the government-wide financial statements. Capital assets are defined by state law as assets with an initial cost of \$5,000 and an estimated useful life of more than one year. The total amounts spent for construction, if any, are capitalized and reported in the government-wide financial statements. For donations, the District values these capital assets at the estimated fair value of the item at the date of acquisition. The cost of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value or extend the life of the asset are not capitalized.

Property and equipment of the District is depreciated using the straight line method over the following estimated useful lives:

Vehicles 5 years Field equipment & Storage 7 years Computer equipment 3 years

### 4. Compensated Absence

It is the District's policy to permit employees to accumulate earned but unused vacation, compensable time and sick pay benefits. There is no liability for unpaid accumulated sick leave since the government does not have a policy to pay any amounts when employees separate from service with the District. All vacation pay and compensable time is accrued when incurred in the government-wide financial statements. Generally, a current liability for these amounts is reported in the governmental funds only if they have matured, for example, as a result of resignations and retirements.

According to the District policy full-time employees accrue annual leave at four to six hours per pay period, depending on the years of service. Compensable time earned is hours worked in excess of eight hours per day or forty hours per week.

#### 5. Net Assets and Fund Balance

The difference between the District's assets and liabilities is its net assets. The District's net assets consist of three components – invested in capital assets, which is the cost of capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation; restricted net assets which are liquid assets and have third-party (statutory, bond covenant or granting agency) limitations on their use; and unrestricted net assets. The District had no restricted net assets as of June 30, 2009.

In the fund financial statements, governmental funds report reservations of fund balance for amounts that are not available for appropriation or are legally restricted by outside parties for use for a specific purpose. Certain proceeds (Low Interest Loan from New Mexico Interstate Stream Commission) set aside for their repayment (\$8,861), are classified as reserved for fund balance on the balance sheet because they are maintained in separate bank accounts and their use is limited by the applicable loan agreements. Fund balance designations may be established to indicate tentative plans for financial resource utilization in a future period. The District uses available cash resources to balance the subsequent year budget. The District currently has an unreserved fund balance, designated for subsequent year's expenditures of \$96,700 for this purpose.

### II. Stewardship, compliance and Accountability

### A. Budgetary Information

The budget is prepared on a basis that differs from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP). GAAP basis revenues and expenditures include accrued amounts. The revenues and expenditures reported in the budgetary comparisons are generally recorded on the cash basis. The District uses the following procedures to establish the budgeted amounts reflected in the budgetary comparisons:

- 1. Prior to April 1, the Budget Committee submits to the District Board of Supervisors a proposed revenue and expenditure budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1.
- 2. The Board reviews the budget proposal and makes any necessary adjustments.
- 3. Prior to June 1, the Board approves the budget by passing a resolution.
- 4. Prior to June 20, the approved budget is submitted to the state of New Mexico, Department of Finance and Administration, Local Government Division (DFA-LGD) for approval by the first Monday of September. The Board receives notice of the approved budget.

The legal level at which actual expenditures may not exceed budgeted expenditures is at the total fund level. The Board can revise its budget with the approval of DFA-LGD. Encumbrance accounting is not utilized by the District.

### A. Cash, Cash Equivalents and Investments

As of June 30, 2009, the District had a carrying amount of deposits of \$206,682. The bank balances for deposits were \$209,034, all at local banks. The difference between the carrying amount and the bank balance of deposits is due to deposits in transits of -0- and outstanding checks of \$2,352. The total bank balance of \$209,034 consisted of the following:

#### B. Notes Receivable

The District borrowed funds from the State of New Mexico Interstate Stream Commission for the purpose of having a program for conservation of water for irrigation purpose, and in turn, lend these funds to individual landowners in the District. The District's note receivable balance as of June 30, 2009 represents monies owed to the District by landowners for such projects promoting water conservation. The loan agreements between the District and its landowners are secured by a duly recorded mortgage or other legal encumbrance on the property, real or personal, of the landowner. The District considers the loans to be fully collectible and does not consider that an allowance for doubtful accounts is necessary at June 30, 2009.

### IV. Other information

### A. Employee Retirement Benefits

The District employees did not participate in a pension plan, deferred compensation, or post-employment benefit plan through December 31, 2006. On January 1, 2007, the District employees began participating in the State of New Mexico Public Retirement Act (PERA) pension plan.

Plan Description. Substantially all of the District's full-time employees participate in a public employee retirement system authorized under the Public Employees Retirement Act (Chapter 10, Article 11, NMSA 1978). The Public Employees Retirement Association (PERA) is the administrator of the plan, which is a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit retirement plan. The plan provides for retirement benefits, disability benefits, survivor benefits and cost-of-living adjustments to plan members and beneficiaries. PERA issues a separate, public available financial report that includes financial statements and requires supplementary information for the plan. That report may be obtained by writing to PERA, P.O. Box 2123, Santa Fe, NM 87504-2123. The report is also available on PERA's website at <a href="https://www.pera.state.nm.us">www.pera.state.nm.us</a>.

Funding Policy. Plan members are required to contribute 7% of their gross salary. The District is required to contribute 7% of the gross covered salary. The contribution requirements of plan members and the District are established in State statue under Chapter 10, Article 11, NMSA 1978. The requirements may be amended by acts of the legislature. The District's contributions to PERA for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2009, 2008 and 2007 was \$7,443, \$5,389 and \$2,209, respectively, which equals the amount of the required contributions for the fiscal years.

### B. Risk Management

The District is exposed to various risks of loss due to torts, theft or damage of assets, errors and omissions and natural disasters. The District's supervisors and employees are covered by an errors and omissions liability policy purchased by the New Mexico State University, Department of Agriculture, to which the District is administratively attached. The limits for this policy are \$1,050,000 for each wrongful act and \$1,050,000 for the policy aggregated. The District is required to obtain a corporate surety bond on behalf of persons responsible for District assets. The District has not sustained any losses during the last several years and is not a defendant in any lawsuit. The District currently maintains the following surety bond with the Western Surety Company:

### C. Contingent Liabilities

Amounts received or receivable from grant agencies are subject to audit and adjustment by grantor agencies, principally the state and federal government. Any disallowed claims, including amounts already collected, may constitute a liability of the applicable funds. The amount, if any, of expenditures that may be disallowed by the grantor cannot be determined at this time, although the District does not expect any amounts to be disallowed.

### D. Joint Powers Agreement - Lower Rio Grande Salt Cedar Control Project

During the 2002 session, the New Mexico State Legislature appropriated \$2.5 million to the New Mexico Department of Agriculture to remove salt cedar from the Lower Rio Grande River Basin. As a result of this appropriation, a joint powers agreement was established for this project. Additional appropriations were made in subsequent years. The terms of the agreement are summarized as follows:

We have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities, the general fund and the respective budgetary comparison, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Socorro Soil and Water Conservation District (District) as of and for the year ended June 30, 2009 and have issued our report dated May 30, 2012. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in the Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

### Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we consider the District's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control over financial reporting.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affect the District's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the District's financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the District's internal control.

A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that result in more than a remote likelihood that a material misstatement of the financial statement will not be prevented or detected by the District's internal control.

Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in the internal control that might be significant deficiencies and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all significant deficiencies that are also considered to be material weaknesses. We did not identify deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defines above.

### Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the District's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we preformed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards* which are described in the accompanying schedule of findings and responses as item:

### **CURRENT YEAR AUDIT FINDINGS**

### 2007-01 <u>TIMELINESS OF AUDIT REPORT</u>

Condition: The Socorro Soil and Water Conservation District did not issue the audit report until May 30, 2012.

Criteria: The District was required to submit the audit reports for the year ended June 30, 2009 on or before December 1 subsequent to the entitles' fiscal year end in accordance with State Statue (Chapter 12, Section 6: NMSA 1978) and Section 2.2.2.9.A (1) of the State Auditor Rule.

Cause: The District was unable to submit the June 30, 2009 audit report on a timely basis as a result of not contracting with an auditor until after the due date and then the auditor had health issues that further delayed the audit.

Effect: The District is not in compliance with the New Mexico State Auditor Rules and Regulations. Furthermore, users of the financial statements such as legislators, creditors, note holders, state and federal grantors, etc., do not have timely audit reports and financial statements for their review.

Auditors' Recommendation: The District should ensure that future audit reports are issued in a timely manner. The District should ensure this process is timely in the future through communication with the state auditors' office and timely contracting with an auditor.

Management Response: The District is working with the auditors to complete and submit audit report in a timely manner.

### 2009-01 PAYROLL TAXES

Condition: The PERA deduction was being subtracted from gross wages before the FICA and Medicare taxes were calculated.

Criteria: FICA and Medicare taxes should be calculated on gross wages before the PERA deduction.

Cause: The District misunderstood the application of the PERA pre-tax deduction.

Effect: The combined employee and employer FICA and Medicare taxes were underpaid by about \$1,139 for the fiscal year.

Auditors' Recommendation: The District should utilize an automated payroll processing system to help ensure that the payroll calculations are accurate.

Management Response: The District has implemented an automated payroll process for the preparation of the payroll checks which has corrected the problem. Corrected payroll reports have been filed with the IRS and Social Security Administration and the underpaid payroll taxes have been paid.
